Synonyms of "Deliverance" as a noun (15 Words)

announcement	The action of making an announcement. <i>An announcement is appearing in the Morning Post tomorrow.</i>
<u>declaration</u>	A formal expression by a meeting; agreed to by a vote. <i>His declaration of innocence.</i>
delivery	Your characteristic style or manner of expressing yourself orally. <i>Injuries sustained during delivery.</i>
discharge	A substance that has been discharged. <i>The discharge of pus.</i>
emancipation	The fact or process of being set free from legal, social, or political restrictions; liberation. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
freeing	The act of liberating someone or something.
<u>liberation</u>	Freedom from limits on thought or behaviour. <i>She worked for women s liberation.</i>
<u>proclamation</u>	A formal public statement. <i>The issuing by the monarch of a proclamation dissolving Parliament.</i>
pronouncement	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the pronouncements of politicians was endemic.</i>

ransom	The holding or freeing of a captive in return for payment of a ransom. <i>The kidnappers demanded a ransom.</i>
release	A device that when pressed will release part of a mechanism. <i>A new release from the London Symphony Orchestra.</i>
rescue	Denoting or relating to a domestic animal that has been removed from a situation of abuse or neglect by a welfare organization. <i>The dramatic rescue of nine trapped coal miners.</i>
saving	The money one has saved, especially through a bank or official scheme. <i>The agents were cheating them out of their life savings.</i>
statement	(in the UK) an official assessment made by a local education authority concerning a child's special educational needs. <i>This is correct as a statement of fact.</i>
utterance	An uninterrupted chain of spoken or written language. <i>He whispered as if to lend his utterances an added confidentiality.</i>



Usage Examples of "Deliverance" as a noun

Associations of "Deliverance" (30 Words)

<u>ambulance</u>	Convey in an ambulance. <i>We called an ambulance.</i>
atonement	Compensation for a wrong. <i>An annual ceremony of confession and atonement for sin.</i>
<u>crisis</u>	The turning point of a disease when an important change takes place, indicating either recovery or death. <i>They went bankrupt during the economic crisis.</i>
danger	A dangerous place. <i>He feared the dangers of traveling by air.</i>
deliver	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>The pitcher delivered the ball.</i>
depositor	A person who has deposited money in a bank or similar institution.
economical	(of a person or lifestyle) careful not to waste money or resources. <i>Aspects of social political and economical life.</i>
financial	The finances or financial situation of an organization or individual. <i>At the end of the year fund managers sell their worst performing stocks and financials have fared badly this year.</i>
frugal	Simple and plain and costing little. <i>A frugal farmer.</i>
help	A person or thing that helps. <i>She has taught herself to cook since the defection of the last of the village helps.</i>
hostage	A person seized or held as security for the fulfilment of a condition. <i>Three hostages were released but only after their families paid an estimated 200 000 to the guerrillas.</i>
lifeboat	A small boat kept on a ship for use in emergency, typically one of a number on deck or suspended from davits.
lifeguard	An attendant employed at a beach or pool to protect swimmers from accidents.

lifesaver	A lifeguard working on a beach. <i>A microwave could be a lifesaver this Christmas.</i>
parsimony	Extreme unwillingness to spend money or use resources. <i>A great tradition of public design has been shattered by government parsimony.</i>
passbook	A record of deposits and withdrawals and interest held by depositors at certain banks.
redemption	The act of purchasing back something previously sold. <i>Serfs began paying redemption dues.</i>
redemptive	Of or relating to or resulting in redemption- E.K.Brown. <i>The healing power of redemptive love.</i>
rescue	Denoting the emergency excavation of archaeological sites threatened by imminent building or road development. <i>The dramatic rescue of nine trapped coal miners.</i>
salvage	Payment made or due to a person who has saved a ship or its cargo. <i>It was the only crumb of comfort he could salvage from the ordeal.</i>
salvation	Deliverance from sin and its consequences, believed by Christians to be brought about by faith in Christ. <i>They turned to individualism as their salvation.</i>
save	Save from sins. <i>I ll save you the trouble.</i>
saving	Characterized by thriftiness. <i>This resulted in a considerable saving in development costs.</i>
scrimp	Be thrifty or parsimonious; economize. <i>Scratch and scrimp.</i>
skimp	A fashionably short or revealing garment. <i>She wore a yellow skimp.</i>
sparing	Avoiding waste. <i>Physicians advised sparing use of the ointment.</i>
sparingly	To a meager degree or in a meager manner. <i>The sharply flavoured leaves should be used sparingly.</i>
stinginess	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
survivor	A person who survives, especially a person remaining alive after an event in which others have died. <i>The survivors of the fire were taken to a hospital.</i>
thrifty	Using money and other resources carefully and not wastefully. <i>He had been brought up to be thrifty and careful.</i>
