bamboozle	Cheat or fool. He <b>bamboozle</b> d his professors into thinking that he knew the subject well.
<u>bilk</u>	Evade; elude. Government waste has <b>bilk</b> ed the taxpayer of billions of dollars.
cheat	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>She always <b>cheat</b>s at cards.</i>
cheating	Violating accepted standards or rules.
<u>chicanery</u>	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them. <i>Storylines packed with political chicanery</i> .
<u>conspiracy</u>	A secret plan by a group to do something unlawful or harmful. They were cleared of <b>conspiracy</b> to pervert the course of justice.
cozen	Act with artful deceit. Do not think to <b>cozen</b> your contemporaries.
<u>deceit</u>	The quality of being fraudulent. A web of <b>deceit</b> .
deceive	(of a thing) give (someone) a mistaken impression. He had <b>deceive</b> d her with another woman.
deception	A thing that deceives. <i>Obtaining property by <b>deception</b></i> .
<u>deceptive</u>	Giving an appearance or impression different from the true one; misleading. Deliberately <b>deceptive</b> packaging.
defraud	Deprive of by deceit. He used a second identity to <b>defraud</b> the bank of thousands of pounds.
dissimulation	A flock of small birds. His audience consisted of a <b>dissimulation</b> of birds.



fraud	A person or thing intended to deceive others, typically by unjustifiably claiming or being credited with accomplishments or qualities. <i>Prosecutions for social security frauds</i> .
fraudulent	Intended to deceive – S.T.Coleridge. <i>Fraudulent psychics.</i>
<u>hoax</u>	Subject to a playful hoax or joke. A <b>hoax</b> 999 call.
hoodwink	Conceal one's true motives from especially by elaborately feigning good intentions so as to gain an end. Staff were <b>hoodwink</b> ed into thinking the cucumber was a sawn off shotgun.
humbug	Pretentious or silly talk or writing. <i>His comments are sheer <b>humbug</b></i> .
liar	A person who tells lies. Shelley wasn t a good <b>liar</b> .
mulct	Deprive of by deceit. A rapacious old woman who would never miss the few dollars <b>mulct</b> ed of her.
peculation	The fraudulent appropriation of funds or property entrusted to your care but actually owned by someone else.
perfidy	An act of deliberate betrayal. It was an example of his <b>perfidy</b> .
<u>perpetrate</u>	Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation. <i>Perpetrate</i> a crime.
phony	A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives.
<u>rebel</u>	Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance. <i>Tory <b>rebel</b>s.</i>
scam	Swindle. An insurance <b>scam</b> .
swindle	Use deception to deprive (someone) of money or possessions. <i>He</i> <b>swindle</b> <i>d</i> me out of my inheritance.
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Treacherous intrigues.</i>
trick	A peculiar or characteristic habit or mannerism. <i>That offer was a dirty <b>trick</b>.</i>
