| cozen             | Act with artful deceit.<br>Do not think to <b>cozen</b> your contemporaries.  |
| <u>deceit</u>     | The quality of being fraudulent.<br>A web of <b>deceit</b> .  |
| deceive           | (of a thing) give (someone) a mistaken impression.<br>He had <b>deceive</b> d her with another woman.                                     |
| deception         | A thing that deceives.<br><i>Obtaining property by <b>deception</b></i> .   |
| <u>deceptive</u>  | Giving an appearance or impression different from the true one;<br>misleading.<br>Deliberately <b>deceptive</b> packaging.                |
| defraud           | Deprive of by deceit.<br>He used a second identity to <b>defraud</b> the bank of thousands of pounds.                                     |
| dissimulation     | A flock of small birds.<br>His audience consisted of a <b>dissimulation</b> of birds.   |



| fraud             | A person or thing intended to deceive others, typically by unjustifiably claiming or being credited with accomplishments or qualities. <i>Prosecutions for social security frauds</i> .            |

| <u>hoax</u>       | Subject to a playful hoax or joke.<br>A <b>hoax</b> 999 call.  |
| hoodwink          | Conceal one's true motives from especially by elaborately feigning good<br>intentions so as to gain an end.<br>Staff were <b>hoodwink</b> ed into thinking the cucumber was a sawn off<br>shotgun. |
| humbug            | Pretentious or silly talk or writing.<br><i>His comments are sheer <b>humbug</b></i> .   |
| liar              | A person who tells lies.<br>Shelley wasn t a good <b>liar</b> .  |
| mulct             | Deprive of by deceit.<br>A rapacious old woman who would never miss the few dollars <b>mulct</b> ed of<br>her.   |
| peculation        | The fraudulent appropriation of funds or property entrusted to your care<br>but actually owned by someone else.  |
| perfidy           | An act of deliberate betrayal.<br>It was an example of his <b>perfidy</b> .  |
| <u>perpetrate</u> | Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation.<br><i>Perpetrate</i> a crime.   |
| phony             | A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives.  |
| <u>rebel</u>      | Take part in a rebellion renounce a former allegiance.<br><i>Tory <b>rebel</b>s.</i>   |
| scam              | Swindle.<br>An insurance <b>scam</b> .   |
| swindle           | Use deception to deprive (someone) of money or possessions.<br><i>He</i> <b>swindle</b> <i>d</i> me out of my inheritance.   |
| treacherous       | Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Treacherous intrigues.</i>  |
| trick             | A peculiar or characteristic habit or mannerism.<br><i>That offer was a dirty <b>trick</b>.</i>  |
