Associations of "Delusional" (30 Words)

amnesia	Partial or total loss of memory. <i>They were suffering from amnesia.</i>
<u>bipolar</u>	Of a person suffering from bipolar disorder. <i>A sharply bipolar division of affluent and underclass.</i>
chimerical	Produced by a wildly fanciful imagination- Douglas Bush. <i>His Utopia is not a chimerical commonwealth but a practical improvement on what already exists.</i>
confusion	A situation of panic or disorder. <i>There seems to be some confusion about which system does what.</i>
daydream	Indulge in a daydream. <i>She looked out the window daydreaming.</i>
<u>disarray</u>	A state of disorganization or untidiness. <i>Attendant damsels to help to disarray her.</i>
<u>dream</u>	See hear or feel something in a dream. <i>Maybe you dreamed it.</i>
<u>dystopia</u>	An imagined state or society in which there is great suffering or injustice, typically one that is totalitarian or post-apocalyptic.
<u>fantasy</u>	A genre of imaginative fiction involving magic and adventure, especially in a setting other than the real world. <i>A fantasy world.</i>
forgetfulness	Lapse of memory. <i>She teased him for his forgetfulness.</i>
hallucinate	Experience a hallucination of (something). <i>Ben began hallucinating and having fits.</i>
<u>hallucination</u>	A mistaken or unfounded opinion or idea. <i>His dreams of vast wealth are a hallucination.</i>

hallucinatory	Characterized by or characteristic of hallucination – Jean Stafford. <i>A hallucinatory fantasy.</i>
illusion	An erroneous mental representation. <i>He had no illusions about the trouble she was in.</i>
illusive	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>An illusive haven.</i>
illusory	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>She knew the safety of her room was illusory.</i>
<u>imaginary</u>	Not based on fact; unreal- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>Chris had imaginary conversations with her.</i>
<u>imagination</u>	The ability of the mind to be creative or resourceful. <i>She'd never been blessed with a vivid imagination.</i>
megalomania	A psychological state characterized by delusions of grandeur.
neurosis	A mental or personality disturbance not attributable to any known neurological or organic dysfunction. <i>Freud's two stage account of neurosis.</i>
<u>oblivion</u>	The state of being disregarded or forgotten. <i>Only our armed forces stood between us and oblivion.</i>
<u>paranoia</u>	A psychological disorder characterized by delusions of persecution or grandeur. <i>Mild paranoia afflicts all prime ministers.</i>
paranoiac	Suffering from or relating to paranoia. <i>A bunch of paranoiacs and conspiracy theorists.</i>
<u>paranoid</u>	A person who is paranoid. <i>You think I'm paranoid but I tell you there is something going on.</i>
psychosis	Any severe mental disorder in which contact with reality is lost or highly distorted. <i>They were suffering from a psychosis.</i>
<u>reverie</u>	A fanciful or impractical idea or theory. <i>He defended and explained all the reveries of astrology.</i>
schizophrenia	Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact. <i>Gibraltar's schizophrenia continues to be fed by colonial pride.</i>
<u>surreal</u>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>As irrational and surreal as a dream.</i>
