- *Separate clearly, as if by boundaries.*



Synonyms of "Demarcate" as a verb (10 Words)

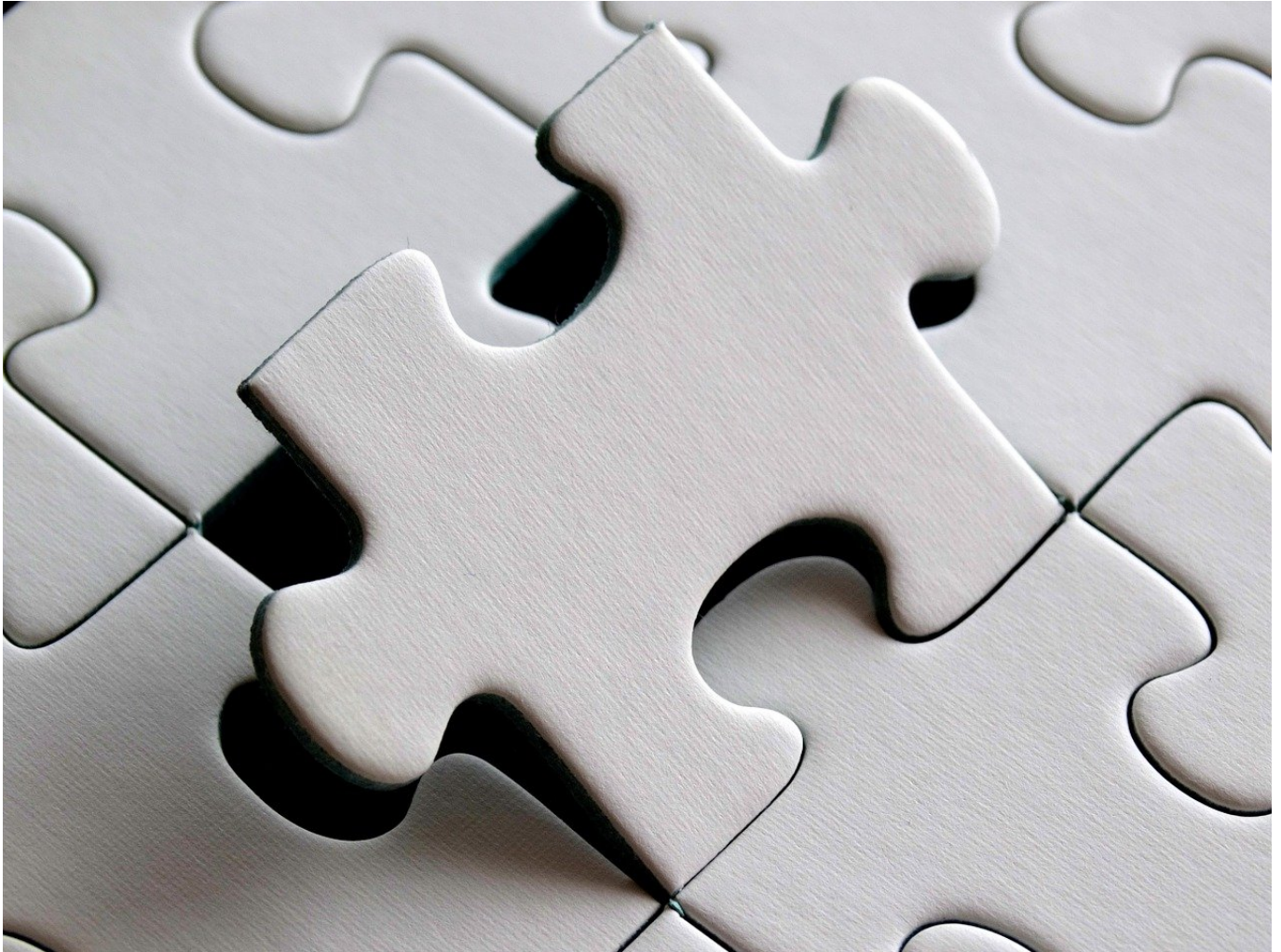
- delimit** Determine the limits or boundaries of.
*Agreements **delimiting** fishing zones.*
- delimitate** Set, mark, or draw the boundaries of something.
- delineate** Indicate the exact position of (a border or boundary).
*His finger found a precisely outlined section **delineated** in red marker.*
- differentiate** Make (someone or something) appear different or distinct.
*The receptors are developed and **differentiated** into sense organs.*
- distinguish** Manage to discern (something barely perceptible).
*It was too dark to **distinguish** anything more than their vague shapes.*
- divide** Separate (something) into portions and share out among a number of people.
*30 does not **divide** by 8.*
- mark** Put a check mark on or near or next to.
*His brand of theatrical pop has **marked** him as one of modern music s most innovative talents.*

mark off	Be a distinctive feature, attribute, or trait; sometimes in a very positive sense.
mark out	Designate as if by a mark.
separate	Become separated into pieces or fragments. <i>The couple separated after 25 years of marriage.</i>



Usage Examples of "Demarcate" as a verb

- *Art was being demarcated from the more objective science.*
- *Plots of land demarcated by barbed wire.*



Associations of "Demarcate" (30 Words)

border

A district near the border between two areas.

*She stitched a **border** on to one of the plain white saris.*

boundary

A hit crossing the limits of the field, scoring four or six runs.

*A **boundary** wall.*

Restrict or confine.

circumscribe *The minister's powers are **circumscribed** both by tradition and the organization of local government.*

confine

Deprive of freedom take into confinement.

*He was **confined** to bed for four days with a bad dose of flu.*

continuum	A continuous sequence in which adjacent elements are not perceptibly different from each other, but the extremes are quite distinct. <i>A continuum of special educational needs.</i>
curb	Restrain a horse by means of a curb. <i>Both men were instinctively curbing their horses.</i>
delimit	Determine the essential quality of. <i>Agreements delimiting fishing zones.</i>
detain	Cause to be slowed down or delayed. <i>She made to open the door but he detained her.</i>
edge	Strike the ball with the edge of the bat strike a ball delivered by the bowler with the edge of the bat. <i>Edge a blade.</i>
encircle	Form or draw a circle around. <i>Encircle the errors.</i>
<u>extent</u>	The size or scale of something. <i>An enclosure ten acres in extent.</i>
finite	Of verbs; relating to forms of the verb that are limited in time by a tense and (usually) show agreement with number and person. <i>Every computer has a finite amount of memory.</i>
geographic	Of or relating to the science of geography. <i>The north and south geographic poles.</i>
insofar	To the degree or extent that. <i>Insofar as it can be ascertained the horse lung is comparable to that of man.</i>
limit	Place limits on extent or access. <i>It is growing rapidly with no limitation in sight.</i>
margin	Annotate or summarize a text in the margins. <i>These he deals forth as the notable Matters margined for better Notice.</i>
<u>minimum</u>	The lowest or smallest amount of a varying quantity (e.g. temperature) allowed, attained, or recorded. <i>Minimum wage.</i>
normalcy	Being within certain limits that define the range of normal functioning.
<u>parameter</u>	A quantity (such as the mean or variance) that characterizes a statistical population and that can be estimated by calculations from sample data. <i>The parameters within which the media work.</i>
periphery	The outside boundary or surface of something. <i>New buildings on the periphery of the hospital site.</i>

precinct	The police station situated in a precinct. <i>At the precinct a desk sergeant ran through her ID.</i>
range	Obtain the range of a target by adjustment after firing past it or short of it or by the use of radar or laser equipment. <i>A wood burning kitchen range.</i>
restrain	Keep under control; keep in check. <i>Amiss had to restrain his impatience.</i>
restrict	Place under restrictions limit access to. <i>At first the Americans tried to restrict news of their involvement in Vietnam.</i>
restriction	The limitation or control of someone or something, or the state of being restricted. <i>Planning restrictions on commercial development.</i>
rim	Run around the rim of. <i>Rim a hat.</i>
scope	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Such questions go beyond the scope of this book.</i>
scrimp	Subsist on a meager allowance. <i>Scratch and scrimp.</i>
stint	Supply sparingly and with restricted quantities. <i>He doesn't stint on wining and dining.</i>
