- behavior** Behavioral attributes the way a person behaves toward other people.  
*The **behavior** of small particles can be studied in experiments.*
- behaviour** The way in which a machine or natural phenomenon works or functions.  
***Behaviour** patterns.*
- conduct** Manner of acting or controlling yourself.  
*The **conduct** of the elections.*
- demeanour** (behavioral attributes) the way a person behaves toward other people.  
*His happy **demeanour**.*
- deportment** (behavioral attributes) the way a person behaves toward other people.  
*There are team rules governing **deportment** on and off the field.*



## Associations of "Demeanor" (30 Words)

### act

Take action do something.  
*They urged Washington to **act**.*

### **attitude**

A theatrical pose created for effect.  
*He was questioned on his **attitude** to South Africa.*

### bearing

Characteristic way of bearing one's body.  
*A man of precise military **bearing**.*

### behave

Behave in a certain manner show a certain behavior conduct or comport oneself.  
*They were expected to **behave** themselves.*

### **behavior**

Behavioral attributes the way a person behaves toward other people.  
*The **behavior** of small particles can be studied in experiments.*

### **behaviour**

The way in which an animal or person behaves in response to a particular situation or stimulus.  
*The erratic **behaviour** of the old car.*

<b>calm</b>	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to. <i>Remained <b>calm</b> throughout the uproar.</i>
<b>chilly</b>	Not characterized by emotion-C.W.Cunningham. <i>I felt a bit <b>chilly</b>.</i>
<b>comport</b>	Behave well or properly. <i>Articulate students who <b>comported</b> themselves well in interviews.</i>
<b>composed</b>	Having one's feelings and expression under control; calm. <i>A very talented and <b>composed</b> young player.</i>
<b>conduct</b>	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>Heat is <b>conducted</b> to the surface.</i>
<b>coolheaded</b>	Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. <i>Stayed <b>coolheaded</b> in the crisis.</i>
<b>deed</b>	Convey or transfer property or rights by legal deed. <i>They <b>deeded</b> their property to their children.</i>
<b>ethology</b>	The study of human behaviour and social organization from a biological perspective.
<b>icily</b>	In a cold and icy manner.
<b>noiseless</b>	Making no sound. <i>Th inaudible and <b>noiseless</b> foot of time.</i>
<b>nonviolence</b>	Peaceful resistance to a government by fasting or refusing to cooperate.
<b>placid</b>	Not easily upset or excited. <i>A <b>placid</b> contented man.</i>
<b>prissy</b>	Exaggeratedly proper. <i>A middle class family with two <b>prissy</b> children.</i>
<b>prudery</b>	Excessive or affected modesty.
<b>prudish</b>	Exaggeratedly proper. <i>The <b>prudish</b> moral climate of the late 19th century.</i>
<b>quietude</b>	A state of peace and quiet. <i>It highlights her <b>quietude</b> and wise passivity.</i>
<b>repose</b>	Be inherent or innate in. <i>I ll go to him and <b>repose</b> our distresses on his friendly bosom.</i>
<b>sedate</b>	Calm, dignified, and unhurried. <i>A quiet <b>sedate</b> nature.</i>
<b>serene</b>	An expanse of clear sky or calm sea. <i><b>Serene</b> skies and a bright blue sea.</i>
<b>tranquility</b>	A state of peace and quiet.

- tranquilize** Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
- tranquillity** A disposition free from stress or emotion.  
*Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the **tranquillity** of rural life.*
- Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure.
- unflappable** *I prided myself on being **unflappable** even in the most chaotic circumstances.*
- unsociable** Not enjoying or making an effort to behave sociably in the company of others.  
***Unsociable** behavior.*
