### Definitions of "Demolish" as a verb

- *Overwhelmingly defeat (a player or team.*
- *Eat up (food) quickly.*
- *Defeat soundly and humiliatingly.*
- *Humiliate or depress completely.*
- *Destroy completely.*
- *Ruin or destroy.*
- *Pull or knock down (a building.*
- *Defeat soundly.*
- *Eat up completely, as with great appetite.*
- *Comprehensively refute (an argument or its proponent.*



## Synonyms of "Demolish" as a verb (42 Words)

<b>beat hollow</b>	Hit repeatedly.
<b><u>bolt</u></b>	Secure or lock with a bolt. <i>The listeners <b>bolted</b> when he discussed his strange ideas.</i>
<b>break up</b>	Break down, literally or metaphorically.
<b>bring down</b>	Be accompanied by.
<b>bulldoze</b>	Flatten with or as if with a bulldozer. <i>She believes that to build status you need to <b>bulldoze</b> everyone else.</i>
<b>consume</b>	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>The effort to pass the exam <b>consumed</b> all his energy.</i>
<b>crush</b>	Crush or bruise. <i>The front of his car was <b>crushed</b> in the collision.</i>
<b>defeat utterly</b>	Thwart the passage of.

**destroy**

Destroy completely damage irreparably.  
*He has been determined to **destroy** her.*

**devour**

Enjoy avidly.  
*He **devoured** three sandwiches.*

**down**

Drink down entirely.  
*175 enemy aircraft had been **downed**.*

**drub**

Hit or beat (someone) repeatedly.  
*The Cleveland Indians **drubbed** Baltimore 9 0.*

**eat**

Eat a meal take a meal.  
*If we had to we could probably **eat** the cost.*

**eat up**

Eat a meal; take a meal.

**finish off**

Come or bring to a finish or an end.

**flatten**

Raze (a building or settlement) to the ground.  
*Her hair had been **flattened** by the storm.*

**give someone a  
drubbing**

Inflict as a punishment.

**go through**

Go through in search of something search through someone s belongings in an unauthorized way.

**gobble**

(of a large organization) incorporate or take over (a smaller one).  
*This small department was **gobbled** up by the Ministry of Transport.*

**gulp down**

Utter or make a noise, as when swallowing too quickly.

**guzzle**

Eat or drink (something) greedily.  
*He would **guzzle** his ale.*

**knock down**

Sound like a car engine that is firing too early.

**level**

Become level or even.  
*The ground **levelled** off.*

**overwhelm**

Cover completely or make imperceptible.  
*They were **overwhelmed** by farewell messages.*

**polish off**

Bring to a highly developed, finished, or refined state.

**pull down**

Rein in to keep from winning a race.

**pulverise**

Make into a powder by breaking up or cause to become dust.

**pulverize**

Become powder or dust.  
***Pulverize** the grains.*

**put an end to**

Cause (someone) to undergo something.

<b>raze</b>	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement). <i>Villages were <b>razed</b> to the ground.</i>
<b>raze to the ground</b>	Tear down so as to make flat with the ground.
<b>reduce to ruins</b>	Be the essential element.
<b>rout</b>	Defeat and cause to retreat in disorder. <i>In a matter of minutes the attackers were <b>routed</b>.</i>
<b>ruin</b>	Fall into ruin. <i>The castle was <b>ruined</b> when dynamite was used to demolish one of the corner towers.</i>
<a href="#"><u>smash</u></a>	Hit (a tennis ball) in a powerful overhead stroke. <i>The thief <b>smashed</b> a window to get into the car.</i>
<a href="#"><u>squash</u></a>	Make one's way into a small or restricted space. <i>Wash and <b>squash</b> the cans before depositing them.</i>
<a href="#"><u>squelch</u></a>	Make a soft sucking sound such as that made by treading heavily through mud. <i>Bedraggled guests <b>squelched</b> across the lawn to seek shelter.</i>
<b>tear down</b>	Separate or cause to separate abruptly.
<b>topple</b>	Cause to topple or tumble by pushing. <i>The push almost <b>toppled</b> him to the ground.</i>
<b>win a resounding victory over</b>	Attain success or reach a desired goal.
<b>wolf down</b>	Eat hastily.
<a href="#"><u>wreck</u></a>	Involve someone in a shipwreck. <i>My letters were in one of the vessels that <b>wreck</b> d.</i>

## Associations of "Demolish" (30 Words)

<b><u>annihilate</u></b>	Destroy utterly; obliterate. <i>Mesons are unstable because the quark and antiquark can <b>annihilate</b> each other.</i>
<b>blighted</b>	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i><b>Blighted</b> urban districts.</i>
<b>break</b>	The occurrence of breaking. <i>The company has attempted to <b>break</b> the strike using non union labour.</i>
<b><u>breakage</u></b>	The act of breaking something. <i>The <b>breakage</b> was unavoidable.</i>
<b>breaker</b>	A device that trips like a switch and opens the circuit when overloaded. <i>A rule <b>breaker</b>.</i>
<b><u>bust</u></b>	A sculpture of a person's head, shoulders, and chest. <i>A woman with big hips and a big <b>bust</b>.</i>

<b>damage</b>	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>The car was badly <b>damaged</b> in the accident.</i>
<b>demolition</b>	The action or process of demolishing or being demolished. <i>The <b>demolition</b> of the huge tower was quite a spectacle.</i>
<b>destroy</b>	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>Northants have the batting to <b>destroy</b> anyone.</i>
<b><u>destruction</u></b>	The termination of something by causing so much damage to it that it cannot be repaired or no longer exists. <i>The avalanche left a trail of <b>destruction</b>.</i>
<b>devastate</b>	Destroy or ruin. <i>He was <b>devastated</b> by his grief when his son died.</i>
<b>devastation</b>	Great destruction or damage. <i>The floods caused widespread <b>devastation</b>.</i>
<b>dilapidated</b>	(of a building or object) in a state of disrepair or ruin as a result of age or neglect. <i>Old <b>dilapidated</b> buildings.</i>
<b>dilapidation</b>	A cause of action to force a tenant to pay for dilapidations. <i>The mill was in a state of <b>dilapidation</b>.</i>
<b><u>dismantle</u></b>	Take (a machine or structure) to pieces. <i>The engines were <b>dismantled</b> and the bits piled into a heap.</i>
<b><u>dispatch</u></b>	An official report (usually sent in haste). <i>In his battle <b>dispatch</b> he described the gunner's bravery.</i>
<b>eliminate</b>	Eliminate from the body. <i>The acid portion of one molecule reacts with the basic portion of the other and water is <b>eliminated</b>.</i>
<b>iconoclasm</b>	The action of attacking or assertively rejecting cherished beliefs and institutions or established values and practices.
<b>kaput</b>	Destroyed or killed. <i>The water pump's broken <b>kaput</b>.</i>
<b>moribund</b>	(of a thing) in terminal decline; lacking vitality or vigour. <i>The <b>moribund</b> commercial property market.</i>
<b>obviate</b>	Avoid or prevent (something undesirable). <i>A parachute can be used to <b>obviate</b> disaster.</i>
<b>raze</b>	Tear down so as to make flat with the ground. <i>Villages were <b>razed</b> to the ground.</i>
<b>removal</b>	The transfer of furniture and other contents when moving house. <i><b>Removal</b> men.</i>

<b>ruin</b>	Fall into ruin. <i>The country lay <b>ruined</b> after the war.</i>
<b>shatter</b>	Damage or destroy. <i>Everyone was <b>shattered</b> by the news.</i>
<b>shipwreck</b>	Cause to experience shipwreck. <i>The angry waves whose fury heralds <b>shipwreck</b>.</i>
<u><b>smash</b></u>	An act or sound of something smashing. <i>Gone are the days when he <b>smashed</b> up hotels.</i>
<b>spoil</b>	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>I've got some ham that I'll <b>spoil</b> if we don't eat it tonight.</i>
<u><b>subversion</b></u>	The act of subverting; as overthrowing or destroying a legally constituted government. <i>The ruthless <b>subversion</b> of democracy.</i>
<u><b>wreck</b></u>	Goods brought ashore by the sea from a wreck. <i>The <b>wreck</b> of their marriage.</i>
