

<u>annihilate</u>	Convert (a subatomic particle) into radiant energy. A fraction of the mass of atomic nuclei is annihilate d.
blighted	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i>A blighted rose.</i>
break	Do a break dance. The book dealer would not break the set.
<u>breakage</u>	Reimbursement for goods damaged while in transit or in use. There had been three breakage s in the overhead wires.
breaker	A quarry worker who splits off blocks of stone. Those steam engines were now gone to the breaker s yard.
<u>bust</u>	Go to pieces. A 36 inch bust .



damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. The damage to his reputation was considerable.
demolition	An event (or the result of an event) that completely destroys something. Ireland s demolition of England.
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. Northants have the batting to destroy anyone.
<u>destruction</u>	A final state. The wanton destruction of human life.
devastate	Cause extensive destruction or ruin utterly. He was devastate d by his grief when his son died.
devastation	The termination of something by causing so much damage to it that it cannot be repaired or no longer exists. <i>Her departure left him in utter devastation.</i>
dilapidated	In deplorable condition. Old dilapidated buildings.
dilapidation	A cause of action to force a tenant to pay for dilapidations. The mill was in a state of dilapidation .
<u>dismantle</u>	Take (a machine or structure) to pieces. <i>The old regime was dismantled.</i>
<u>dispatch</u>	The sending of someone or something to a destination or for a purpose. <i>He conducted meetings for the correspondents and censored their</i> <i>dispatches.</i>
eliminate	Eliminate from the body. Let s eliminate the course on Akkadian hieroglyphics.
iconoclasm	The action of attacking or assertively rejecting cherished beliefs and institutions or established values and practices.
kaput	Destroyed or killed. The water pump s broken kaput .
moribund	(of a thing) in terminal decline; lacking vitality or vigour. A moribund patient.
obviate	Prevent the occurrence of; prevent from happening. The presence of roller blinds obviate d the need for curtains.
raze	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement. Villages were raze d to the ground.
removal	The dismissal of someone from a job. <i>His fellow employees formed guards of honour at the removal and funeral.</i>



ruin	Destruction achieved by causing something to be wrecked or ruined. They don t know how to say no and that s been their ruin .
shatter	Break or cause to break suddenly and violently into pieces. The window was shatter ed by a stone.
shipwreck	Cause to experience shipwreck. The vessel was shipwreck ed.
<u>smash</u>	An act or sound of something smashing. Man dies in motorway smash .
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>Her spoiling my dress was deliberate.</i>
subversion	The act of subverting; as overthrowing or destroying a legally constituted government. The ruthless subversion of democracy.
<u>wreck</u>	Involve someone in a shipwreck. The wreck of their marriage.
