<b>cacodemon</b>	A malevolent spirit or person.
<b>daemon</b>	An evil supernatural being. <i>Socrates claimed to have lived his life according to the dictates of his daimon.</i>
<b>daimon</b>	An evil supernatural being.
<b>devil</b>	A rowdy or mischievous person (usually a young man). <i>What the <b>devil</b>.</i>
<b>evil spirit</b>	That which causes harm or destruction or misfortune- Shakespeare.
<b>expert</b>	A person who is very knowledgeable about or skilful in a particular area. <i>A financial <b>expert</b>.</i>
<b>fallen angel</b>	A sudden decline in strength or number or importance.
<b>fiend</b>	A very wicked or cruel person. <i>A football <b>fiend</b>.</i>
<b>genius</b>	Exceptional intellectual or creative power or other natural ability. <i>This young man is my good <b>genius</b> my guardian angel.</i>
<b>maestro</b>	A distinguished conductor or performer of classical music. <i>The orchestra was strained after clashes with the great <b>maestro</b>.</i>
<b><u>marvel</u></b>	Something that causes feelings of wonder. <i>The <b>marvels</b> of technology.</i>
<b>master</b>	Someone who holds a master's degree from academic institution. <i>He acceded to his <b>master's</b> wishes.</i>
<b>monster</b>	A rude or badly behaved person, typically a child. <i>A world of fable inhabited by other worldly <b>monsters</b>.</i>
<b>numen</b>	The spirit or divine power presiding over a thing or place. <i>The spirit of the place its <b>numen</b> was strong.</i>
<b>ogre</b>	(in folklore) a man-eating giant. <i>It is clear that I am no <b>ogre</b>.</i>
<b>past master</b>	A earlier period in someone's life (especially one that they have reason to keep secret).
<b>prodigy</b>	A sign of something about to happen. <i>A Russian pianist who was a child <b>prodigy</b> in his day.</i>
<b>savage</b>	A member of a people regarded as primitive and uncivilized. <i>The mother of one of the victims has described his assailants as <b>savages</b>.</i>

(in a film, novel, or play) a character whose evil actions or motives are important to the plot.

A pantomime **villain**.

**virtuoso**

Someone who is dazzlingly skilled in any field.

**Virtuoso** guitar playing.

**wizard**

One who practices magic or sorcery.

A financial **wizard**.

<b>ghost</b>	Act as ghostwriter of a work. <i>He looked like he had seen a <b>ghost</b>.</i>
<b>gnome</b>	A legendary dwarfish creature supposed to guard the earth's treasures underground. <i>The <b>gnomes</b> of Zurich.</i>
<b>hellish</b>	Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i><b>Hellish</b> torture.</i>
<b>hydra</b>	Monster with nine heads; when struck off each head was replaced by two new ones. <i>We may be facing a <b>hydra</b> that defies any easy solution.</i>
<b>infernal</b>	An inhabitant of Hell. <i>His roar made the <b>infernals</b> quake.</i>
<b>malevolent</b>	Having or showing a wish to do evil to others. <i>A gossipy <b>malevolent</b> old woman.</i>

<b>maliciousness</b>	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<b>monster</b>	A person or animal that is markedly unusual or deformed. <i>He was an unfeeling treacherous <b>monster</b>.</i>
<b>ogre</b>	(folklore) a giant who likes to eat human beings. <i>It is clear that I am no <b>ogre</b>.</i>
<b>scamp</b>	A wicked or worthless person; a rogue. <i>Some little <b>scamp</b> stuffed tissue paper in between the hammer and the bell.</i>
<b>serpent</b>	A firework that moves in serpentine manner when ignited. <i>Fire breathing flying <b>serpents</b>.</i>
<b><u>temptation</u></b>	The desire to have or do something that you know you should avoid. <i>The <b>temptations</b> of life in London.</i>
