Denies as a Verb

Definitions of "Denies" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “denies” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Deny formally (an allegation of fact by the opposing party) in a legal suit.*
- *Deny oneself (something); restrain, especially from indulging in some pleasure.*
- *Refuse to recognize or acknowledge.*
- *Refuse to grant, as of a petition or request.*
- *Refuse to accept or believe.*
- *Refuse to let have.*
- *Declare untrue; contradict.*



Synonyms of "Denies" as a verb (3 Words)

abnegate Surrender (power or a position).
*They **abnegated** their gods.*

refuse Refuse to let have.
*The car **refused** to start.*

traverse Travel across or through.
*He would **traverse** a number of subjects and disciplines.*



Associations of "Denies" (30 Words)

- abnegation** Renunciation of your own interests in favor of the interests of others.
*People are capable of **abnegation** and unselfishness.*
- apophasis** Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.

<u>contradict</u>	Be in contradiction with. <i>The survey appears to contradict the industry s claims.</i>
controvert	Argue about (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory controverted these results.</i>
<u>denial</u>	(psychiatry) a defense mechanism that denies painful thoughts. <i>His pious denials of responsibility.</i>
<u>disallow</u>	Command against. <i>He was offside and the goal was disallowed.</i>
<u>disavow</u>	Deny any responsibility or support for. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to disavow picket line violence.</i>
disavowal	The denial of any responsibility or support for something; repudiation. <i>His disavowal of his previous writings.</i>
disclaim	Make a disclaimer about. <i>He disclaimed any responsibility.</i>
disown	Cast off. <i>Lovell s rich family had disowned him because of his marriage.</i>
gainsay	Take exception to. <i>None could gainsay her.</i>
impugn	Attack as false or wrong. <i>The father does not impugn her capacity as a good mother.</i>
inadmissible	(especially of evidence in court) not accepted as valid. <i>He held that such evidence was inadmissible.</i>
interdict	Intercept and prevent the movement of (a prohibited commodity or person). <i>Army efforts to interdict enemy supply shipments.</i>
negate	Make ineffective; nullify. <i>Alcohol negates the effects of the drug.</i>
<u>no</u>	Not at all to no extent. <i>I ll get you there in no time.</i>
<u>nullify</u>	Show to be invalid. <i>Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.</i>
<u>objection</u>	A procedure whereby a party to a suit says that a particular line of questioning or a particular witness or a piece of evidence or other matter is improper and should not be continued and asks the court to rule on its impropriety. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
rebut	Prove to be false or incorrect. <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did rebut.</i>

<u>rebuttal</u>	(law) a pleading by the defendant in reply to a plaintiff's surrejoinder.
recant	Formally reject or disavow a formerly held belief, usually under pressure. <i>Galileo was forced to recant his assertion that the earth orbited the sun.</i>
<u>refusal</u>	An instance of a horse stopping short or running aside at a jump. <i>He became tired of his friend s refusal to see him.</i>
refuse	Refuse to accept. <i>He refused my offer of hospitality.</i>
refutation	Any evidence that helps to establish the falsity of something. <i>Scientific theory is always tentative open to refutation.</i>
<u>refute</u>	Prove (a statement or theory) to be wrong or false; disprove. <i>The speaker refuted his opponent s arguments.</i>
reject	Reject with contempt. <i>Union negotiators rejected a 1 5 per cent pay award.</i>
<u>renounce</u>	Turn away from; give up. <i>He renounced alcohol completely.</i>
repudiate	(in the past or in non-Christian religions) disown or divorce (one's wife). <i>She has repudiated policies associated with previous party leaders.</i>
repudiation	The exposure of falseness or pretensions. <i>A repudiation of left wing political ideas.</i>
<u>veto</u>	A rejection by right of veto. <i>His veto on our drinking after the meal was annoying.</i>
