<b><u>church</u></b>	The body of people who attend or belong to a particular local church. <i>Some people go to <b>church</b> every Sunday.</i>
<b><u>communion</u></b>	A body of people or families living together and sharing everything. <i>The theology which had prevailed in the Roman <b>communion</b>.</i>
<b><u>creed</u></b>	A formal statement of Christian beliefs, especially the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed. <i>People of many <b>creeds</b> and cultures.</i>
<b><u>cult</u></b>	A relatively small group of people having religious beliefs or practices regarded by others as strange or as imposing excessive control over members. <i>The <b>cult</b> of the pursuit of money as an end in itself.</i>
<b><u>designation</u></b>	The act of putting a person into a non-elective position. <i>A leader s <b>designation</b> of his own successor.</i>
<b><u>divinity</u></b>	Any supernatural being worshipped as controlling some part of the world or some aspect of life or who is the personification of a force. <i>Ancient Egyptians believed in the <b>divinity</b> of the Pharaohs.</i>
<b><u>doctrine</u></b>	A belief or set of beliefs held and taught by a Church, political party, or other group. <i>The <b>doctrine</b> of predestination.</i>
<b><u>epithet</u></b>	An epithet used as a term of abuse. <i>People jeered and hurled racial <b>epithets</b>.</i>
<b><u>faith</u></b>	A strong belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny. <i>He cherished the <b>faith</b> of a good woman.</i>
<b>faith community</b>	A strong belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny.
<b>fraternity</b>	A social club for male undergraduates. <i>Members of the hunting <b>fraternity</b>.</i>
<b>grade</b>	A relative position or degree of value in a graded group. <i>She teaches first <b>grade</b>.</i>
<b>label</b>	A small piece of paper, fabric, plastic, or similar material attached to an object and giving information about it. <i>The italic part of speech <b>label</b> follows the pronunciation.</i>
<b>measure</b>	Measuring instrument having a sequence of marks at regular intervals used as a reference in making measurements. <i><b>Measures</b> of two or three syllables are more frequent in English prose.</i>



<b>movement</b>	A campaign undertaken by a political social or artistic movement. <i>It was an expensive watch with a diamond <b>movement</b>.</i>
<b><u>name</u></b>	A word or set of words by which a person or thing is known, addressed, or referred to. <i>He wanted to protect his good <b>name</b>.</i>
<b><u>nickname</u></b>	A familiar or humorous name given to a person or thing instead of or as well as the real name. <i>The <b>nickname</b> for the U S Constitution is Old Ironsides.</i>
<b>order</b>	The position in which a rifle is held after ordering arms. <i>The company's products were in such demand that they got more <b>orders</b> than their call center could handle.</i>
<b>persuasion</b>	A group or sect holding a particular religious belief. <i>The village had two chapels for those of the Primitive Methodist <b>persuasion</b>.</i>
<b>religious group</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
<b>religious persuasion</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
<b><u>school</u></b>	The process of being formally educated at a school. <i><b>School</b> books.</i>
<b>sect</b>	A philosophical or political group, especially one regarded as extreme or dangerous. <i>Two of the older <b>sects</b> the Congregationalists and the Baptists were able to increase their membership dramatically.</i>
<b>sisterhood</b>	The kinship relation between a female offspring and the siblings. <i>Canadian feminists acknowledge their <b>sisterhood</b> with women around the globe.</i>
<b><u>size</u></b>	A person or garment corresponding to a particular numbered size. <i>Firms of all <b>sizes</b>.</i>
<b>sobriquet</b>	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the <b>sobriquet</b> Duchesse.</i>
<b>style</b>	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>The pillars are no exception to the general <b>style</b>.</i>
<b><u>tag</u></b>	A loose or spare end of something; a leftover. <i>He lived up to his <b>tag</b> as the team's saviour.</i>

<b>teaching</b>	The profession of a teacher. <i>The <b>teachings</b> of the Koran.</i>
<b>term</b>	A boundary or limit, especially of time. <i>Their solicitors had agreed <b>terms</b>.</i>
<b>theology</b>	The learned profession acquired by specialized courses in religion (usually taught at a college or seminary). <i>Roman Catholic <b>theology</b>.</i>
<u><b>title</b></u>	(in church use) a fixed sphere of work and source of income as a condition for ordination. <i>Davis won the world <b>title</b> for the first time in 1981.</i>
<u><b>unit</b></u>	The smallest measure of investment in a unit trust. <i>The family <b>unit</b>.</i>
<b>value</b>	The relative degree of lightness or darkness of a particular colour. <i>I establish the colors and principal <b>values</b> by organizing the painting into three <b>values</b> dark medium and light.</i>
<u><b>worship</b></u>	The activity of worshipping. <i>Ancestor <b>worship</b>.</i>

<b>adherent</b>	Sticking fast to an object or surface. <i>The eggs have thick sticky shells to which debris is often <b>adherent</b>.</i>
<b>baptism</b>	A ceremony or occasion at which baptism takes place. <i>Weddings funerals and <b>baptisms</b> are carried out in the parish church.</i>
<b>believing</b>	The cognitive process that leads to convictions. <i>Seeing is <b>believing</b>.</i>
<b>buddhist</b>	Of or relating to or supporting Buddhism.
<b>canon</b>	A priest who is a member of a cathedral chapter. <i>Hopkins was firmly established in the <b>canon</b> of English poetry.</i>
<b>catholicism</b>	The beliefs and practices of a Catholic Church.
<b>church</b>	The body of people who attend or belong to a particular local church. <i>Our <b>church</b> is hosting a picnic next week.</i>
<b>clergyman</b>	A member of the clergy and a spiritual leader of the Christian Church.

<b>congregation</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a permanent committee of the College of Cardinals. <i>The singing of psalms by the whole <b>congregation</b>.</i>
<b>credo</b>	A musical setting of the Nicene Creed, typically as part of a mass. <i>He announced his <b>credo</b> in his first editorial.</i>
<b>creed</b>	A set of beliefs or aims which guide someone's actions. <i>Liberalism was more than a political <b>creed</b>.</i>
<b>deist</b>	Of or relating to deism.
<b>faith</b>	A strongly held belief. <i>Men with strong political <b>faiths</b>.</i>
<b>heterodoxy</b>	Deviation from accepted or orthodox standards or beliefs. <i>His work was marked by elements of theological <b>heterodoxy</b>.</i>
<b>jewish</b>	Of or relating to Jews or their culture or religion.
<b>martyrdom</b>	Any experience that causes intense suffering. <i>You know <b>martyrdom</b> isn't my style.</i>
<b>mormon</b>	The ancient prophet whose writings were revealed to Joseph Smith who founded the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.
<b>pastor</b>	Be pastor of a church or congregation. <i>He continued to study law while <b>pastoring</b> in Chelsea.</i>
<b>pharisaic</b>	Excessively or hypocritically pious.
<b>pilgrimage</b>	Go on a pilgrimage. <i>Now is the thirty first year of my dark <b>pilgrimage</b> on this earth.</i>
<b>pious</b>	Making or constituting a hypocritical display of virtue. <i>A deeply <b>pious</b> woman.</i>
<b>priest</b>	Ordain to the priesthood. <i>The <b>priest</b> celebrated mass at a small altar off the north transept.</i>
<b>protestant</b>	Protesting.
<b>reformation</b>	A religious movement of the 16th century that began as an attempt to reform the Roman Catholic Church and resulted in the creation of Protestant churches. <i>The <b>reformation</b> of the Senate.</i>
<b>religious</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience. <i>She has strong <b>religious</b> convictions.</i>
<b>sacrament</b>	A thing of mysterious and sacred significance; a religious symbol. <i>He heard Mass and received the <b>sacrament</b>.</i>



- saint** Used in titles of religious saints.  
*The poor **saints** which are at Jerusalem.*
- sanctimonious** Excessively or hypocritically pious.  
*What happened to all the **sanctimonious** talk about putting his family first.*
- shrine** Enshrine.  
*A Hindu **shrine** at which offerings are placed twice a day.*
- theism** The doctrine or belief in the existence of a God or gods.  
*There are many different forms of **theism**.*
