### Definitions of "Denote" as a verb

- *Make known; make an announcement.*

### Synonyms of "Denote" as a verb (28 Words)

<b>announce</b>	Make known make an announcement. <i>I have a confession to make she <b>announced</b>.</i>
<b>be a mark of</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be a sign of</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be a symbol of</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be evidence of</b>	Form or compose.

<b>betray</b>	Reveal unintentionally. <i>The men who have <b>betrayed</b> British people s trust.</i>
<b>bring to mind</b>	Cause to come into a particular state or condition.
<b>conjure up</b>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together.
<b>connote</b>	(of a fact) imply as a consequence or condition. <i>Spinsterhood <b>connoted</b> failure.</i>
<u>convey</u>	Transfer to another. <i>Pipes were laid to <b>convey</b> water to the house.</i>
<b>demonstrate</b>	Establish the validity of something, as by an example, explanation or experiment. <i>Their shameful silence <b>demonstrates</b> their ineptitude.</i>
<u>designate</u>	Decree or designate beforehand. <i>The Wye Valley is <b>designated</b> an area of outstanding natural beauty.</i>
<u>exemplify</u>	Illustrate or clarify by giving an example. <i>He exemplified his point with an anecdote.</i>
<b>give away</b>	Give food to.
<u>imply</u>	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>indicate</b>	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>He <b>indicated</b> his opponents.</i>
<b>intimate</b>	Give to understand.
<b>mean</b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>I don t know what you <b>mean</b>.</i>
<b>point to</b>	Give a point to.
<u>refer</u>	Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent. <i>The Royal Navy is <b>referred</b> to as the Senior Service.</i>
<b>represent</b>	Be representative or typical for. <i>Abstraction is well <b>represented</b> in this exhibition.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Make (previously unknown or secret information) known to others. <i>God rarely <b>reveal</b> his plans for Mankind.</i>
<b>show</b>	Show in or as in a picture. <i>I <b>showed</b> the customer the glove section.</i>
<b>signal</b>	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The diner <b>signaled</b> the waiters to bring the menu.</i>
<u>signify</u>	Be an indication of. <i>What does his strange behavior <b>signify</b>.</i>

<b>stand for</b>	Occupy a place or location, also metaphorically.
<b>suggest</b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The temperature wasn't as tropical as the bright sunlight may have <b>suggested</b>.</i>
<b>symbolize</b>	Express indirectly by an image, form, or model; be a symbol. <i>A tendency to <b>symbolize</b> the father as the sun.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Denote" as a verb

- 'multi-' denotes 'many'.
- Her smile denoted that she agreed.
- The level of output per firm is denoted by X.
- She denoted her feelings clearly.
- This mark denotes purity and quality.

## Associations of "Denote" (30 Words)

<b>advert</b>	An advertisement.
<b>allude</b>	(of an artist or a work of art) recall (an earlier work or style) in such a way as to suggest a relationship with it. <i>The photographs <b>allude</b> to Italian Baroque painting.</i>
<b>announce</b>	Announce publicly or officially. <i>I have a confession to make she <b>announced</b>.</i>
<b>asterisk</b>	Mark a word or piece of text with an asterisk. <i>He had <b>asterisked</b> the things about the case that still bothered him.</i>
<b>caret</b>	A mark ( , □ ) placed below the line to indicate a proposed insertion in a text.
<b>definition</b>	Clarity of outline. <i>A question of <b>definition</b>.</i>
<b>display</b>	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>She photographed the peacock which chose that moment to <b>display</b>.</i>
<b>explain</b>	Minimize the significance of an embarrassing fact or action by giving an excuse or justification. <i>They <b>explained</b> that their lives centred on the religious rituals.</i>
<b>express</b>	By express. <i>He <b>expressed</b> complete satisfaction.</i>
<b>figuratively</b>	Used to indicate a departure from a literal use of words; metaphorically. <i>We left a lot of people literally and <b>figuratively</b> in the dark.</i>

<b>gesticulate</b>	Use gestures, especially dramatic ones, instead of speaking or to emphasize one's words. <i>They were shouting and gesticulating frantically at drivers who did not slow down.</i>
<b>imply</b>	Have as a necessary feature. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>indicant</b>	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Symptoms are the prime <b>indicants</b> of disease.</i>
<b>indicate</b>	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i><b>Indicated</b> his wishes in a letter.</i>
<b>insinuate</b>	Introduce or insert (oneself) in a subtle manner. <i>I <b>insinuated</b> my shoulder in the gap.</i>
<b>intend</b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>What do his words <b>intend</b>.</i>
<b>mark</b>	A figure or letter representing the total number of marks awarded in an examination or competition and signifying a person's score. <i>It was in London that he made his <b>mark</b>.</i>
<b>mean</b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>This one <b>meant</b> to be priceless.</i>
<b>mention</b>	An instance of being mentioned in dispatches. <i>She made no <b>mention</b> of her disastrous trip to Paris.</i>
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. <i>New terminologies and <b>notations</b>.</i>
<b>note</b>	Make a written note of. <i>There was a <b>note</b> of uncertainty in his voice.</i>
<b>quotation</b>	A short musical passage or visual image taken from one piece of music or work of art and used in another. <i>The company is being refused a <b>quotation</b> on the New York Stock Exchange.</i>
<b>quote</b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i>A garage <b>quoted</b> him 30.</i>
<b>refer</b>	Make reference to. <i>The star <b>refers</b> to items which are intended for the advanced learner.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Say something as a comment; mention. <i>Tom's looking peaky she <b>remarked</b>.</i>
<b>saying</b>	A collection of short, pithy expressions identified with a particular person, especially a political or religious leader. <i>This is stated in the <b>sayings</b> of the Prophet.</i>

<b><u>signify</u></b>	Be an indication of. <i>I wasn't <b>signifying</b> at her.</i>
<b><u>symbolic</u></b>	Involving the use of symbols or symbolism. <b>Symbolic</b> thinking.
<b>tell</b>	Inform positively and with certainty and confidence. <i>I couldn't <b>tell</b> if he believed me.</i>
<b><u>verbalize</u></b>	Express in speech. <i>This lawyer <b>verbalizes</b> and is rather tedious.</i>
