Definitions of "Denotes" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “denotes” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make known; make an announcement.*
- *Be a sign or indication of.*
- *Have as a meaning.*

Synonyms of "Denotes" as a verb (2 Words)

announce Make known make an announcement.
*I have a confession to make she **announced**.*

refer Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent.
*Her mother never **referred** to him again.*

Usage Examples of "Denotes" as a verb

- *She denoted her feelings clearly.*
- *`multi-' denotes `many.*
- *Her smile denoted that she agreed.*

Associations of "Denotes" (30 Words)

advert	An advertisement.
allude	Suggest or call attention to indirectly; hint at. <i>The photographs allude to Italian Baroque painting.</i>
announce	Announce publicly or officially. <i>He announced the winners of the spelling bee.</i>
asterisk	Mark a word or piece of text with an asterisk. <i>He had asterisked the things about the case that still bothered him.</i>
caret	A mark used by an author or editor to indicate where something is to be inserted into a text.
definition	The capacity of a device to make images distinct in outline. <i>A dictionary definition of the verb.</i>
display	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Made a display of strength.</i>
explain	Make plain and comprehensible. <i>He makes athletes explain why they made a mistake.</i>
express	Give expression to. <i>An express shipment.</i>
figuratively	In a figurative sense. <i>I did bump into figuratively speaking quite a few interesting people.</i>
gesticulate	Use gestures, especially dramatic ones, instead of speaking or to emphasize one's words. <i>They were shouting and gesticulating frantically at drivers who did not slow down.</i>
imply	Have as a necessary feature. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.</i>
indicant	A number or ratio (a value on a scale of measurement) derived from a series of observed facts; can reveal relative changes as a function of time. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i>
indicate	Indicate a place direction person or thing either spatially or figuratively. <i>Tetracycline is indicated in such cases.</i>
insinuate	Slide (oneself or a thing) slowly and smoothly into a particular place. <i>He insinuated himself into the king's confidence.</i>
intend	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>What do his words intend.</i>

mark	Insert punctuation marks into. <i>Mark my words.</i>
mean	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>An example sentence would show what this word means.</i>
mention	Make mention of. <i>She made no mention of her disastrous trip to Paris.</i>
notation	A note or annotation. <i>New terminologies and notations.</i>
note	A banknote. <i>He noted down her address on a piece of paper.</i>
quotation	A price offered by a market-maker for the sale or purchase of a stock or other security. <i>A great argument with much quotation of Darwin.</i>
quote	Put quote marks around. <i>He quoted the Bible to her.</i>
refer	Of a word phrase or symbol describe or denote have as a referent. <i>This plant can be referred to a known species.</i>
remark	Regard with attention; notice. <i>I decided to ignore his rude remarks.</i>
saying	A collection of short, pithy expressions identified with a particular person, especially a political or religious leader. <i>This is stated in the sayings of the Prophet.</i>
signify	Be an indication of. <i>I wasn't signifying at her.</i>
symbolic	Significant purely in terms of what is being represented or implied. <i>Symbolic thinking.</i>
tell	Perceive (the difference between one person or thing and another). <i>He's telling the truth.</i>
verbalize	Be verbose. <i>This lawyer verbalizes and is rather tedious.</i>
