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Associations of "Denounced" (30 Words)

abnegation	The action of renouncing or rejecting something. <i>People are capable of abnegation and unselfishness.</i>
anathema	A formal ecclesiastical curse accompanied by excommunication. <i>The Pope laid special emphasis on the second of these anathemas.</i>
apostasy	The abandonment or renunciation of a religious or political belief or principle. <i>The execution of their leader for apostasy brought widespread criticism.</i>
belittle	Dismiss (someone or something) as unimportant. <i>Don t belittle his influence.</i>
condemn	Sentence (someone) to a particular punishment, especially death. <i>She could see in his eyes that her stumble had condemned her.</i>
criticize	Act as a critic. <i>The opposition criticized the government s failure to consult adequately.</i>
curse	Invoke or use a curse against. <i>A witch put a curse on his whole family.</i>
decry	Publicly denounce. <i>They decried human rights abuses.</i>
defame	Damage the good reputation of (someone); slander or libel. <i>The journalists have defamed me.</i>
defection	The state of having rejected your religious beliefs or your political party or a cause (often in favor of opposing beliefs or causes). <i>His defection from the Labour Party.</i>
denigrate	Cause to seem less serious; play down. <i>Doom and gloom merchants who denigrate their own country.</i>
deprecate	Belittle. <i>This feature is deprecated and will be removed in later versions.</i>

derogate	Cause to seem less serious; play down. <i>It is typical of him to derogate the powers of reason.</i>
detract	Take away (a specified amount) from the worth or value of a quality or achievement. <i>The complaint was timed to detract attention from the ethics issue.</i>
disapprobation	Strong disapproval, typically on moral grounds. <i>She braved her mother's disapprobation and slipped out to enjoy herself.</i>
disapproval	The expression of disapproval. <i>Jill replied with a hint of disapproval in her voice.</i>
disparage	Express a negative opinion of. <i>He never missed an opportunity to disparage his competitors.</i>
disparaging	Expressing the opinion that something is of little worth; derogatory. <i>Disparaging remarks about council houses.</i>
lessen	Make or become less; diminish. <i>The warmth of the afternoon lessened.</i>
oppose	Actively resist (a person or system). <i>The board opposed his motion.</i>
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>I reject the idea of starting a war.</i>
renunciation	Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid. <i>A renunciation of violence.</i>
repudiate	Deny the truth or validity of. <i>The parents repudiated their son.</i>
repudiation	Refusal to acknowledge or pay a debt or honor a contract (especially by public authorities). <i>The breach is not so serious as to amount to a repudiation of the whole contract.</i>
revile	Spread negative information about. <i>He was now reviled by the party that he had helped to lead.</i>
slander	Words falsely spoken that damage the reputation of another. <i>He is suing the TV company for slander.</i>
stigmatize	Mark with a stigma or stigmata. <i>Francis stigmatized in fashion as his Lord.</i>
swear	An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word. <i>I asked him if he would swear a statement to this effect.</i>

vilify Spread negative information about.
He has been vilified in the press.

vociferously In a loud and forceful manner.
*The country **vociferously** opposed the war.*
