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Associations of "Depended" (30 Words)

addicted	Physically and mentally dependent on a particular substance. <i>Addicted to cocaine.</i>
beholden	Under a moral obligation to someone. <i>I don't like to be beholden to anybody.</i>
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>I believe we've already met.</i>
centrality	The state of being accessible from a variety of places. <i>The centrality and sovereignty of the state.</i>
condition	Apply a conditioner to the hair. <i>I condition my hair regularly.</i>
confidence	The telling of private matters or secrets with mutual trust. <i>She's brimming with confidence.</i>
confiding	Willing to tell someone about a secret or private matter and trust them not to repeat it to others. <i>She was in a confiding mood.</i>
constitutive	Forming a part or constituent of something. <i>Poverty is a constitutive element of a particular form of economic growth.</i>
context	The circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea, and in terms of which it can be fully understood. <i>The proposals need to be considered in the context of new European directives.</i>
credibility	The quality of being trusted and believed in. <i>The book's anecdotes have scant regard for credibility.</i>
credible	Able to be believed; convincing. <i>She was not the credible fool he expected.</i>
credit	The money lent or borrowed under a credit arrangement. <i>We credited her for saving our jobs.</i>

<u>credulity</u>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their credulity and inexperience.</i>
crucially	With decisive or vital importance. <i>Both movies are crucially dependent on the performance of the male lead.</i>
<u>dependence</u>	Being abnormally tolerant to and dependent on something that is psychologically or physically habit-forming (especially alcohol or narcotic drugs). <i>The dependence of our medical schools on grant funds.</i>
dependent	Held from above. <i>An economy heavily dependent on oil exports.</i>
entirely	Completely (often used for emphasis). <i>Entirely satisfied with the meal.</i>
<u>factor</u>	Be a contributing factor. <i>His skill was a factor in ensuring that so much was achieved.</i>
<u>interdependent</u>	Mutually dependent. <i>We in Europe are all increasingly interdependent.</i>
mutually	With mutual action; in a mutual relationship. <i>Adoption and fostering are not necessarily mutually exclusive alternatives.</i>
pendent	Held from above and hanging down. <i>The use of jurisdiction to decide pendent claims.</i>
<u>recourse</u>	Something or someone turned to for assistance or security. <i>The bank has recourse against the exporter for losses incurred.</i>
<u>reliance</u>	A person or thing on which someone depends. <i>The farmer s reliance on pesticides.</i>
reliant	Dependent on someone or something. <i>The company is heavily reliant on the baby market.</i>
<u>rely</u>	Depend on with full trust or confidence. <i>The charity has to rely entirely on public donations.</i>
symbiotic	Denoting a mutually beneficial relationship between different people or groups. <i>The reader can have a symbiotic relationship with the writer.</i>
trust	An organization or company managed by trustees. <i>He betrayed their trust.</i>
trustful	Having or marked by a total belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone. <i>A trustful acceptance of authority.</i>

trusting

Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust.
*It is foolish to be too **trusting** of other people.*

uncritical

Marked by disregard for critical standards or procedures.
***Uncritical** reasoning.*
