- *Have faith or confidence in.*
- *Be contingent upon (something that is elided).*



## Synonyms of "Depends" as a verb (8 Words)

- bank** Be in the banking business.  
*He has built a four cylinder locomotive for **banking** trains up the Lickey incline.*
- bet** Maintain with or as if with a bet.  
*I **bet** she will be there.*
- calculate** Determine by reasoning, experience, or common sense; reckon or judge.  
*Local authorities have **calculated** that full training would cost around 5 000 per teacher.*
- count** Take account of.  
*Can you **count** the books on your shelf.*
- look** Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction.  
*Lynn immediately **looked** down her face scarlet.*

- reckon** Expect, believe, or suppose.  
*You have to **reckon** with our opponents.*
- rely** Have faith or confidence in.  
*The charity has to **rely** **entirely** on public donations.*
- swear** Make a solemn statement or promise undertaking to do something or affirming that something is the case.  
*Before God I **swear** I am innocent.*

## Associations of "Depends" (30 Words)

<b>addicted</b>	Physically and mentally dependent on a particular substance. <i>She is <b>addicted</b> to chocolate.</i>
<b><u>beholden</u></b>	Under a moral obligation to someone. <i>I don't like to be <b>beholden</b> to anybody.</i>
<b>believe</b>	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>He didn't <b>believe</b> her.</i>
<b>centrality</b>	The quality of being essential or of the greatest importance. <i>The <b>centrality</b> of religion in their lives.</i>

<b>condition</b>	Apply a conditioner to the hair. <i>Harsh working <b>conditions</b>.</i>
<b>confidence</b>	Freedom from doubt; belief in yourself and your abilities. <i>The priest could not reveal her <b>confidences</b>.</i>
<b>confiding</b>	Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>She was in a <b>confiding</b> mood.</i>
<b>constitutive</b>	Constitutional in the structure of something (especially your physical makeup). <i>The state began to exercise a new and <b>constitutive</b> function.</i>
<b>context</b>	The circumstances that form the setting for an event, statement, or idea, and in terms of which it can be fully understood. <i>The proposals need to be considered in the <b>context</b> of new European directives.</i>
<b>credibility</b>	The quality of being believable or trustworthy. <i>The government's loss of <b>credibility</b>.</i>
<b>credible</b>	Capable of being believed. <i>A <b>credible</b> witness.</i>
<b>credit</b>	The money lent or borrowed under a credit arrangement. <i>This deferred tax can be <b>credited</b> to the profit and loss account.</i>
<b>credulity</b>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.</i>
<b>crucially</b>	With decisive or vital importance. <i>A question that may have <b>crucially</b> influenced the decision.</i>
<b>dependence</b>	Addiction to drink or drugs. <i>Japan's <b>dependence</b> on imported oil.</i>
<b>dependent</b>	Held from above and hanging down. <i>A <b>dependent</b> prince.</i>
<b>entirely</b>	Without any others being included or involved. <i><b>Entirely</b> satisfied with the meal.</i>
<b>factor</b>	Be a contributing factor. <i>Last year researchers <b>factored</b> a number 155 digits long.</i>
<b>interdependent</b>	Mutually dependent. <i>We in Europe are all increasingly <b>interdependent</b>.</i>
<b>mutually</b>	In a mutual or shared manner. <i>The agreement was <b>mutually</b> satisfactory.</i>
<b>pendent</b>	Remaining undecided; pending. <i><b>Pendent</b> catkins.</i>

<b><u>recourse</u></b>	Act of turning to for assistance. <i>The bank has <b>recourse</b> against the exporter for losses incurred.</i>
<b><u>reliance</u></b>	A person or thing on which someone depends. <i>The farmer s <b>reliance</b> on pesticides.</i>
<b>reliant</b>	Dependent on someone or something. <i>The company is heavily <b>reliant</b> on the baby market.</i>
<b><u>rely</u></b>	Be dependent on. <i>The charity has to <b>rely entirely</b> on public donations.</i>
<b>sybiotic</b>	Used of organisms (especially of different species) living together but not necessarily in a relation beneficial to each. <i>The fungi form <b>sybiotic</b> associations with the roots of plant species.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>He can be <b>trusted</b> to carry out an impartial investigation.</i>
<b>trustful</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>Great brown eye true and <b>trustful</b>.</i>
<b>trusting</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>It is foolish to be too <b>trusting</b> of other people.</i>
<b>uncritical</b>	Not in accordance with the principles of critical analysis. <i>News sources reflected <b>uncritical</b> estimates of the number of juvenile addicts.</i>
