use	What something is used for. <i>He warned against the</i> <b>use</b> <i>of narcotic drugs.</i>
using up	A particular service.

# Associations of "Depletion" (30 Words)

<u>abate</u>	Reduce or remove (a nuisance. <i>The storm <b>abate</b>d.</i>
compressible	Capable of being compressed or made more compact. A <b>compressible</b> box.
<u>curtail</u>	Reduce in extent or quantity; impose a restriction on. <i>Civil liberties were further curtailed.</i>
decline	Grow smaller. The birth rate continued to <b>decline</b> .
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. The amount of homework <b>decrease</b> d towards the end of the semester.
decrement	An amount by which something is reduced or diminished. <i>Relaxation produces a <b>decrement</b> in sympathetic nervous activity.</i>



depreciation	A decrease in price or value. <b>Depreciation</b> of the dollar against the yen.
dilute	(of a solution) having a relatively low concentration of solute. Bleach can be <b>dilute</b> d with cold water.
diminish	Make or become less. The pain will gradually <b>diminish</b> .
diminished	Diminished in size or strength as a result of disease or injury or lack of use. A <i>diminished fifth</i> .
<u>diminution</u>	The statement of a theme in notes of lesser duration (usually half the length of the original. <i>The disease shows no signs of diminution.</i>
<u>down</u>	Drink down entirely. He <b>down</b> ed five pints of cider.
downgrade	An instance of reducing someone or something's rank, status, or level of importance. Some jobs had gradually been <b>downgrade</b> d from skilled to semi skilled.
<u>downturn</u>	A worsening of business or economic activity. A <b>downturn</b> in the housing market.
<u>dwindle</u>	Become smaller or lose substance. <i>Traffic has <b>dwindle</b>d to a trickle.</i>
lessen	Decrease in size, extent, or range. The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessen</b> ed.
<u>lower</u>	Set lower. The <b>lower</b> levels of the building.
<u>minimize</u>	Cause to seem less serious; play down. <i>The aim is to <b>minimize</b> costs.</i>
palliate	Allay or moderate (fears or suspicions. This eliminated or at least <b>palliate</b> d suspicions aroused by German unity.
reduce	Reduce in size reduce physically. Olga was <b>reduce</b> d to stunned silence.
reduction	A copy of a picture or photograph made on a smaller scale than the original. <i>The reduction of classical genetics to molecular biology.</i>
retrench	Make (an employee) redundant. If people are forced to <b>retrench</b> their expenditure trade will suffer.
<u>rundown</u>	An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person. <i>He gave his teammates a <b>rundown</b> on the opposition.</i>



<u>shrink</u>	Reduce in size; reduce physically. The metal is unsuitable for <b>shrink</b> ing on to wooden staves.
shrinkage	The process, fact, or amount of shrinking. The material lost 2 inches per yard in <b>shrinkage</b> .
subside	Wear off or die down. She <b>subside</b> d into the chair.
wane	Decrease in phase. Interest in the project <b>wane</b> d.
<u>weaken</u>	Destroy property or hinder normal operations. Fault lines had <b>weaken</b> ed and shattered the rocks.
<u>wilt</u>	Any of a number of fungal or bacterial diseases of plants characterized by wilting of the foliage. My opponent was <b>wilt</b> ing.
wither	Wither as with a loss of moisture. It is not true that old myths either die or <b>wither</b> away.
