<a href="#"><u>layer</u></a>	A sheet, quantity, or thickness of material, typically one of several, covering a surface or body. <i>A managerial <b>layer</b>.</i>
<b>lode</b>	A vein of metal ore in the earth. <i>The tin oxide was very thinly scattered within the <b>lode</b>.</i>
<b>part payment</b>	That which concerns a person with regard to a particular role or situation.
<a href="#"><u>pledge</u></a>	Someone accepted for membership but not yet fully admitted to the group. <i>His saxophone was in <b>pledge</b>.</i>
<b>prepayment</b>	Payment in advance.
<b>repository</b>	A burial vault (usually for some famous person). <i>His mind was a rich <b>repository</b> of the past.</i>
<b>retainer</b>	A dental appliance that holds teeth (or a prosthesis) in position after orthodontic treatment. <i>He s on a <b>retainer</b> as a consultant.</i>
<b>seam</b>	A slight depression in the smoothness of a surface. <i>The buried forests became <b>seams</b> of coal.</i>
<a href="#"><u>security</u></a>	Procedures followed or measures taken to ensure the security of a state or organization. <i>A matter of national <b>security</b>.</i>

**sediment**

Particulate matter that is carried by water or wind and deposited on the surface of the land or the seabed, and may in time become consolidated into rock.

*It takes hundreds of thousands of years to turn the **sediments** into carbonate rock.*

**sedimentation**

The process of settling or being deposited as a sediment.

***Sedimentation** occurs when the droplets sink to the bottom.*

**stake**

A pole or stake set up to mark something as the start or end of a race track.

*A **stake** in the company's future.*

**stratum**

A thin layer within any structure.

*A **stratum** of flint.*

**sublimate**

A solid deposit of a substance which has sublimed.

*Condensation of a **sublimate**.*

**vein**

Any of the vascular bundles or ribs that form the branching framework of conducting and supporting tissues in a leaf or other plant organ.

*All **veins** except the pulmonary **vein** carry unaerated blood.*

<b>precipitate</b>	Send someone or something suddenly into a particular state or condition. <i>Excess moisture is <b>precipitated</b> as rain fog mist or dew.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>He is <b>putting</b> himself at risk.</i>
<b>put away</b>	Adapt.
<b>put down</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.

<b>sit</b>	Sit and travel on the back of animal usually while controlling its motions. <i>Don't introduce a new male when the hens are <b>sitting</b>.</i>
<b>situate</b>	Put (something somewhere) firmly. <i>A conveniently <b>situated</b> hotel.</i>

**stick**

Stick to firmly.

**Stick** the poster onto the wall.

**store**

Retain or enter (information) for future electronic retrieval.

The bear **stores** fat for the period of hibernation when he doesn't eat.

**stow**

Pack or store (an object) carefully and neatly in a particular place.

**Stow** the cart.

**unload**

Leave or unload.

The meeting had been a chance for her to **unload** some of her feelings about her son.

**wedge**

Squeeze like a wedge into a tight space.

She **wedged** her holdall between two bags.

<b>annuitant</b>	A person who receives an annuity.
<b>bill</b>	A list of particulars as a playbill or bill of fare. <i>We were <b>billed</b> for 4 nights in the hotel although we stayed only 3 nights.</i>
<b><u>billing</u></b>	The total amount of business conducted in a given time, especially that of an advertising agency. <i>He shared top <b>billing</b> with his wife.</i>
<b>bonus</b>	Anything that tends to arouse. <i>Big Christmas <b>bonuses</b>.</i>
<b><u>cash</u></b>	Exchange for cash. <i>A discount for <b>cash</b>.</i>
<b><u>charge</u></b>	Energize a battery by passing a current through it in the direction opposite to discharge. <i>They submitted their <b>charges</b> at the end of each month.</i>
<b>compensation</b>	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>The <b>compensation</b> of victims.</i>
<b>cost</b>	Legal expenses, especially those allowed in favour of the winning party or against the losing party in a suit. <i><b>Costs</b> may be awarded to a successful private prosecutor out of central funds.</i>
<b>depositor</b>	A person who keeps money in a bank or building society account.
<b>dividend</b>	An individual's share of a dividend. <i>Buying a rail pass may still pay <b>dividends</b>.</i>
<b><u>expenditure</u></b>	The action of spending funds. <i>The <b>expenditure</b> of taxpayers money.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Offset an item of expenditure as an expense against taxable income. <i>He kept a careful record of his <b>expenses</b> at the meeting.</i>
<b>fee</b>	Make a payment to (someone) in return for services. <i><b>Fee</b> the steward.</i>
<b>honorarium</b>	A payment given for professional services that are rendered nominally without charge.
<b><u>income</u></b>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>Figures showed an overall increase in <b>income</b> this year.</i>
<b>installment</b>	A payment of part of a debt; usually paid at regular intervals.
<b>invoice</b>	Send an invoice to someone. <i>She <b>invoiced</b> the company for her expenses.</i>



<b>mortgage</b>	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>Some people worry that selling off state assets <b>mortgages</b> the country's future.</i>
<b>payment</b>	An act of requiting; returning in kind. <i>A suit with a velvet collar that I got as <b>payment</b> for being in the show.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b>receivable</b>	Able to be received. <i>Accounts <b>receivable</b>.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	The action of repaying a person who has spent or lost money. <i>The family received insurance <b>reimbursements</b>.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<a href="#"><u>salary</u></a>	Pay a salary to. <i>A 15 per cent <b>salary</b> increase.</i>
<b>stinginess</b>	A lack of generosity; a general unwillingness to part with money.
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>It should be financed out of <b>taxation</b>.</i>
<b>unpaid</b>	Without payment. <i>The soup kitchen was run primarily by <b>unpaid</b> helpers.</i>
<b>wage</b>	A fixed regular payment earned for work or services, typically paid on a daily or weekly basis. <i>An income of less than half the average <b>wage</b>.</i>
