- *Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles.*

Synonyms of "Depravity" as a noun (33 Words)

corruption	Inducement (as of a public official) by improper means (as bribery) to violate duty (as by committing a felony). <i>The luxury and corruption among the upper classes.</i>
corruptness	Lack of integrity or honesty (especially susceptibility to bribery); use of a position of trust for dishonest gain.

<u>debauchery</u>	Excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs.
degeneracy	The state of being degenerate in mental or moral qualities. <i>Moral degeneracy followed intellectual degeneration.</i>
<u>degradation</u>	A low or downcast state- H.L.Menchken. <i>A trail of human misery and degradation.</i>
depravation	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles.
deviance	Deviate behavior. <i>A study of crime and deviance.</i>
dissipation	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure. <i>Energy dissipation.</i>
dissoluteness	The process of going into solution.
immorality	Morally objectionable behavior. <i>The immorality of basing the defense of the West on the threat of mutual assured destruction.</i>
impiety	Unrighteousness by virtue of lacking respect for a god. <i>He blamed the fall of the city on the impiety of the people.</i>
impurity	The condition of being impure. <i>A struggle to rid the soul of sin and impurity.</i>
indecenty	An indecent act or expression. <i>Seven offences of rape and indecenty.</i>
lasciviousness	Feeling morbid sexual desire or a propensity to lewdness.
lecherousness	A strong sexual desire.
lechery	Unrestrained indulgence in sexual activity. <i>The vice of lechery.</i>
lewdness	The trait of behaving in an obscene manner.
licentiousness	Dissolute indulgence in sensual pleasure.
obscenity	The trait of behaving in an obscene manner. <i>A stream of invective and obscenity.</i>
profanity	Irreligious or irreverent behaviour. <i>An outburst of profanity.</i>
profligacy	Reckless extravagance or wastefulness in the use of resources. <i>The emperor s sexual profligacy.</i>
prurience	Feeling morbid sexual desire or a propensity to lewdness.
putrefaction	The process of decay or rotting in a body or other organic matter. <i>Rome had fallen into moral putrefaction.</i>
salaciousness	The trait of behaving in an obscene manner.

shamelessness	Behavior marked by a bold defiance of the proprieties and lack of shame.
sin	Estrangement from god. <i>A sin in the eyes of God.</i>
sinfulness	Estrangement from god.
sordidness	Unworthiness by virtue of lacking higher values.
turpitude	Depraved or wicked behaviour or character. <i>Acts of moral turpitude.</i>
ungodliness	Impiety by virtue of not being a godly person.
unrighteousness	Failure to adhere to moral principles. <i>Forgave us our sins and cleansed us of all unrighteousness.</i>
vice	Immoral or wicked behaviour. <i>Cigars happen to be my father s vice.</i>

bacchanal	A priest, worshipper, or follower of Bacchus. <i>The debauched and alcoholic president was said to be organizing unceasing bacchanals.</i>
corrupt	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>Humanity they knew to be corrupt from the day of Adam s creation.</i>
debauch	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>His life had been spent in debauch.</i>
debauchery	Excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs.
decay	Undergo decay or decomposition. <i>The unoccupied house started to decay.</i>
decayed	Having fallen into disrepair; deteriorated. <i>The restoration of decayed churches.</i>
decomposition	In a decomposed state. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>

degeneracy	The state or quality of being degenerate. <i>Moral degeneracy followed intellectual degeneration.</i>
degenerate	An immoral or corrupt person. <i>The debate degenerated into a brawl.</i>
degeneration	The process of declining from a higher to a lower level of effective power or vitality or essential quality. <i>Overgrazing has caused serious degeneration of grassland.</i>
degraded	Lowered in value. <i>She had felt cheap and degraded.</i>
depraved	Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>Depraved criminals.</i>
foul	Hit a foul ball. <i>The land was foul with weeds.</i>
immoral	Not adhering to ethical or moral principles. <i>They considered colonialism immoral.</i>
lascivious	Feeling or revealing an overt sexual interest or desire. <i>He gave her a lascivious wink.</i>
licentious	Promiscuous and unprincipled in sexual matters. <i>The ruler's tyrannical and licentious behaviour.</i>
perverse	Sexually perverted. <i>Kate's perverse decision not to cooperate held good.</i>
putrefaction	The process of decay or rotting in a body or other organic matter. <i>The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of putrefaction.</i>
putrid	Very unpleasant; repulsive. <i>A butcher who sold putrid meat.</i>
racketeer	Someone who commits crimes for profit (especially one who obtains money by fraud or extortion).
reprobate	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>Reprobate behaviour.</i>
rot	Rotten or decayed matter. <i>The education system has been allowed to rot.</i>
rotten	Unwell. <i>We used to send him up something rotten.</i>
spoilage	The action or process of spoiling, especially the deterioration of food and other perishable goods.
turpitude	A corrupt or depraved or degenerate act or practice. <i>The various turpitudes of modern society.</i>

underhand With hand brought forward and up from below shoulder level.
*Achieved success in business only by **underhand** methods.*

venal Showing or motivated by susceptibility to bribery; corrupt.
*A **venal** police officer.*
