Associations of "Depriving" (30 Words)

arrogate	Make undue claims to having. <i>They arrogate to themselves the ability to divine the nation s true interests.</i>
birthright	Personal characteristics that are inherited at birth. <i>She saw a liberal education as the birthright of every child.</i>
buccaneer	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The marauding buccaneers who used to terrorize the Mediterranean coasts.</i>
commandeer	Take possession of (something) by force. <i>The truck was commandeered by a mob.</i>
confiscate	Appropriate (something, especially land) to the public treasury as a penalty. <i>The guards confiscated his camera.</i>
depose	Make a deposition; declare under oath. <i>He had been deposed by a military coup.</i>
despoil	Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was despoiled of its marble wall covering.</i>
disenfranchise	Deprive (someone) of the right to vote. <i>A hard core of kids who are disenfranchised and don t feel connected to the school.</i>
filch	Pilfer or steal (something, especially an item of small value) in a casual way. <i>They filched milk off morning doorsteps.</i>
forfeited	Surrendered as a penalty.
impound	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>Vehicles parked where they cause an obstruction will be impounded.</i>
impoverish	Exhaust the strength or vitality of. <i>The wars had impoverished him.</i>

loot	Take illegally; of intellectual property. <i>The gang escaped with their loot.</i>
marauder	A person who marauds; a raider. <i>A band of English marauders were surprised and overcome.</i>
pillage	Steal (something) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>Rebellious peasants intent on pillage.</i>
piracy	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Software piracy.</i>
plunder	Plunder a town after capture. <i>The contents of the abandoned houses were plundered by members of the new regime.</i>
raid	Conduct a raid on. <i>The police raided the crack house.</i>
ransack	Search thoroughly. <i>Man has ransacked the planet for fuel.</i>
rapine	The act of despoiling a country in warfare. <i>Industrial rapine.</i>
rob	Steal. <i>Someone had robbed my jacket.</i>
spoliation	The action of taking goods or property from somewhere by violent means. <i>The spoliation of the countryside.</i>
steal	An act of stealing something. <i>New York s biggest art steal.</i>
theft	The action or crime of stealing. <i>He was convicted of theft.</i>
thief	A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. <i>The thief stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.</i>
thieve	Be a thief; steal something. <i>They began thieving again.</i>
usurp	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force; take as one's right or possession. <i>He usurped my rights.</i>
usurpation	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i>
