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## Associations of "Depriving" (30 Words)

<b>arrogate</b>	Make undue claims to having. <i>They <b>arrogate</b> to themselves the ability to divine the nation s true interests.</i>
<b>birthright</b>	Personal characteristics that are inherited at birth. <i>She saw a liberal education as the <b>birthright</b> of every child.</i>
<a href="#"><b>buccaneer</b></a>	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The marauding <b>buccaneers</b> who used to terrorize the Mediterranean coasts.</i>
<a href="#"><b>commandeer</b></a>	Take possession of (something) by force. <i>The truck was <b>commandeered</b> by a mob.</i>
<a href="#"><b>confiscate</b></a>	Appropriate (something, especially land) to the public treasury as a penalty. <i>The guards <b>confiscated</b> his camera.</i>
<b>depose</b>	Make a deposition; declare under oath. <i>He had been <b>deposed</b> by a military coup.</i>
<b>despoil</b>	Steal or violently remove valuable possessions from; plunder. <i>The church was <b>despoiled</b> of its marble wall covering.</i>
<a href="#"><b>disenfranchise</b></a>	Deprive (someone) of the right to vote. <i>A hard core of kids who are <b>disenfranchised</b> and don t feel connected to the school.</i>
<b>filch</b>	Pilfer or steal (something, especially an item of small value) in a casual way. <i>They <b>filched</b> milk off morning doorsteps.</i>
<b>forfeited</b>	Surrendered as a penalty.
<b>impound</b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>Vehicles parked where they cause an obstruction will be <b>impounded</b>.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Exhaust the strength or vitality of. <i>The wars had <b>impoverished</b> him.</i>

<b>loot</b>	Take illegally; of intellectual property. <i>The gang escaped with their <b>loot</b>.</i>
<b>marauder</b>	A person who marauds; a raider. <i>A band of English <b>marauders</b> were surprised and overcome.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Steal (something) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>Rebellious peasants intent on <b>pillage</b>.</i>
<b>piracy</b>	A practice similar to piracy but in other contexts especially hijacking. <i>Software <b>piracy</b>.</i>
<b>plunder</b>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>The contents of the abandoned houses were <b>plundered</b> by members of the new regime.</i>
<b>raid</b>	Conduct a raid on. <i>The police <b>raided</b> the crack house.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Search thoroughly. <i>Man has <b>ransacked</b> the planet for fuel.</i>
<b>rapine</b>	The act of despoiling a country in warfare. <i>Industrial <b>rapine</b>.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Steal. <i>Someone had <b>robbed</b> my jacket.</i>
<b>spoliation</b>	The action of taking goods or property from somewhere by violent means. <i>The <b>spoliation</b> of the countryside.</i>
<b>steal</b>	An act of stealing something. <i>New York s biggest art <b>steal</b>.</i>
<b>theft</b>	The action or crime of stealing. <i>He was convicted of <b>theft</b>.</i>
<b>thief</b>	A person who steals another person's property, especially by stealth and without using force or threat of violence. <i>The <b>thief</b> stole the drugs from a doctor s surgery.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Be a thief; steal something. <i>They began <b>thieving</b> again.</i>
<b>usurp</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force; take as one's right or possession. <i>He <b>usurped</b> my rights.</i>
<b>usurpation</b>	Entry to another's property without right or permission. <i>A succession of generals who ruled by <b>usurpation</b>.</i>
