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## Associations of "Descended" (30 Words)

<a href="#">abate</a>	Reduce or remove (a nuisance. <i>This action would not have been sufficient to <b>abate</b> the odour nuisance.</i>
<b>declension</b>	The class to which a noun or adjective is assigned according to the manner of this variation. <i>The first <b>declension</b> in Latin.</i>
<b>decline</b>	Refuse to accept. <i>The roof <b>declines</b> here.</i>
<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The rate of <b>decrease</b> became greater.</i>
<b>descending</b>	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.</i>
<a href="#">descent</a>	A downward slope. <i>The plane had gone into a steep <b>descent</b>.</i>
<b>diminish</b>	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The pain will gradually <b>diminish</b>.</i>
<b>dip</b>	Dip into a liquid while eating. <i>A reference work to <b>dip</b> into time and time again.</i>
<a href="#">down</a>	Bring down or defeat an opponent. <i>One <b>down</b> and only six more to go.</i>
<a href="#">downturn</a>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>The market took a <b>downturn</b>.</i>
<b>downward</b>	Used to indicate that something applies to everyone in a certain hierarchy or set. <i>He lay face <b>downward</b>.</i>

<b>drop</b>	The act of dropping something. <i>They <b>dropped</b> bombs on Caen during the raid.</i>
<b>fall</b>	Go as if by falling. <i>The hills around here <b>fall</b> towards the ocean.</i>
<b>falling</b>	Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i>A <b>falling</b> market.</i>
<b>grantee</b>	A recipient of a grant.
<b>immerse</b>	Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still <b>immersed</b> in her thoughts.</i>
<b>lessen</b>	Make or become less; diminish. <i>The years have <b>lessened</b> the gap in age between us.</i>
<b>low</b>	In or into a low position or state. <i><b>Low</b> hills.</i>
<b>parachute</b>	Drop from an aircraft by parachute. <i>The former Conservative minister was controversially <b>parachuted</b> into the safe seat.</i>
<b>plummet</b>	A steep and rapid fall or drop. <i>The bird has a circular display flight followed by an earthward <b>plummet</b>.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	Begin with vigor. <i>A car swerved to avoid a bus and <b>plunged</b> into a ravine.</i>
<b>settle</b>	Settle into a position usually on a surface or ground. <i>They had not yet <b>settled</b> on a date for the wedding.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause a ship to sink. <i>You can relax on the veranda as the sun <b>sinks</b> low.</i>
<b>slump</b>	Assume a drooping posture or carriage. <i>She <b>slumped</b> against the cushions.</i>
<b>submerge</b>	Cause (something) to be under water. <i><b>Submerge</b> your head completely.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.</i>
<b>submerge</b>	Submerge. <i>Pellets were then <b>submersed</b> in agar.</i>
<b>subside</b>	Wear off or die down. <i>The mud <b>subsides</b> when the waters become calm.</i>
<b>under</b>	Under water. <i>An <b>under</b> secretary.</i>
