Associations of "Descended" (30 Words)

abate	Reduce or remove (a nuisance. <i>This action would not have been sufficient to abate the odour nuisance.</i>
declension	The class to which a noun or adjective is assigned according to the manner of this variation. <i>The first declension in Latin.</i>
decline	Refuse to accept. <i>The roof declines here.</i>
declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The rate of decrease became greater.</i>
descending	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>The categories are listed in descending order of usefulness.</i>
descent	A downward slope. <i>The plane had gone into a steep descent.</i>
diminish	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The pain will gradually diminish.</i>
dip	Dip into a liquid while eating. <i>A reference work to dip into time and time again.</i>
down	Bring down or defeat an opponent. <i>One down and only six more to go.</i>
downturn	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i>
downward	Used to indicate that something applies to everyone in a certain hierarchy or set. <i>He lay face downward.</i>

drop	The act of dropping something. <i>They dropped bombs on Caen during the raid.</i>
fall	Go as if by falling. <i>The hills around here fall towards the ocean.</i>
falling	Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i>A falling market.</i>
grantee	A recipient of a grant.
immerse	Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still immersed in her thoughts.</i>
lessen	Make or become less; diminish. <i>The years have lessened the gap in age between us.</i>
low	In or into a low position or state. <i>Low hills.</i>
parachute	Drop from an aircraft by parachute. <i>The former Conservative minister was controversially parachuted into the safe seat.</i>
plummet	A steep and rapid fall or drop. <i>The bird has a circular display flight followed by an earthward plummet.</i>
plunge	Begin with vigor. <i>A car swerved to avoid a bus and plunged into a ravine.</i>
settle	Settle into a position usually on a surface or ground. <i>They had not yet settled on a date for the wedding.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. <i>You can relax on the veranda as the sun sinks low.</i>
slump	Assume a drooping posture or carriage. <i>She slumped against the cushions.</i>
submerge	Cause (something) to be under water. <i>Submerge your head completely.</i>
submergence	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. <i>Politicians may be blamed for submergence of principle.</i>
submerge	Submerge. <i>Pellets were then submersed in agar.</i>
subside	Wear off or die down. <i>The mud subsides when the waters become calm.</i>
under	Under water. <i>An under secretary.</i>
