## Associations of "Descended" (30 Words)

<u>abate</u>	Reduce or remove (a nuisance. <i>This action would not have been sufficient to <b>abate</b> the odour nuisance.</i>
declension	The class to which a noun or adjective is assigned according to the manner of this variation. <i>The first <b>declension</b></i> in Latin.
decline	Refuse to accept. The roof <b>decline</b> s here.
declivity	A downward slope. A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b> .
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. The rate of <b>decrease</b> became greater.
descending	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.
<u>descent</u>	A downward slope. The plane had gone into a steep <b>descent</b> .
diminish	Decrease in size, extent, or range. The pain will gradually <b>diminish</b> .
dip	Dip into a liquid while eating. A reference work to <b>dip</b> into time and time again.
<u>down</u>	Bring down or defeat an opponent. One <b>down</b> and only six more to go.
<u>downturn</u>	A worsening of business or economic activity. The market took a <b>downturn</b> .
downward	Used to indicate that something applies to everyone in a certain hierarchy or set. <i>He lay face <b>downward</b></i> .



drop	The act of dropping something. They <b>drop</b> ped bombs on Caen during the raid.
fall	Go as if by falling. The hills around here <b>fall</b> towards the ocean.
<u>falling</u>	Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i>A falling market</i> .
grantee	A recipient of a grant.
immerse	Cause to be immersed. She was still <b>immerse</b> d in her thoughts.
lessen	Make or become less; diminish. The years have <b>lessen</b> ed the gap in age between us.
low	In or into a low position or state. <i>Low hills</i> .
parachute	Drop from an aircraft by parachute. The former Conservative minister was controversially <b>parachute</b> d into the safe seat.
<u>plummet</u>	A steep and rapid fall or drop. The bird has a circular display flight followed by an earthward <b>plummet</b> .
<u>plunge</u>	Begin with vigor. A car swerved to avoid a bus and <b>plunge</b> d into a ravine.
settle	Settle into a position usually on a surface or ground. They had not yet <b>settle</b> d on a date for the wedding.
sink	Cause a ship to sink. You can relax on the veranda as the sun <b>sink</b> s low.
slump	Assume a drooping posture or carriage. She <b>slump</b> ed against the cushions.
<u>submerge</u>	Cause (something) to be under water. <i>Submerge</i> your head completely.
submergence	The action of completely covering or obscuring something. Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.
submerse	Submerge. Pellets were then <b>submerse</b> d in agar.
subside	Wear off or die down. The mud <b>subside</b> s when the waters become calm.
<u>under</u>	Under water. An <b>under</b> secretary.
