- *Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically).*
- *(often used ironically) worthy of being treated in a particular way.*
- *Worthy of being treated in a particular way, typically of being given assistance.*



Synonyms of "Deserving" as an adjective (14 Words)

<u>admirable</u>	Inspiring admiration or approval. <i>Trains ran with admirable precision.</i>
<u>commendable</u>	Deserving praise. <i>He showed commendable restraint.</i>
creditable	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>The student's effort on the essay though not outstanding was creditable.</i>
estimable	Deserving of respect or high regard. <i>She was shown into that estimable woman's presence.</i>
excellent	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>Made an excellent speech.</i>
<u>exemplary</u>	Characteristic of its kind or illustrating a general rule. <i>An exemplary jail sentence.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>Donleavy was a fine figure of a man.</i>
laudable	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i>Applaudable efforts to save the environment.</i>
meritorious	Deserving reward or praise. <i>A medal for meritorious conduct.</i>
praiseworthy	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>A significant and praiseworthy increase in computer intelligence.</i>

qualified for	Meeting the proper standards and requirements and training for an office or position or task.
suitable for	Meant or adapted for an occasion or use.
worth	Worthy of being treated in a particular way often used ironically. Worth her weight in gold.
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. A worthy fellow.

aptitude	Suitability or fitness. <i>Children with an aptitude for painting and drawing.</i>
aptness	The quality of being appropriate or suitable. <i>The aptness of the punishment.</i>
blame	Put or pin the blame on. <i>His players had to take the blame for the defeat.</i>
capability	The susceptibility of something to a particular treatment. <i>He worked to the limits of his capability.</i>

exemplary	Being or serving as an illustration of a type. <i>Exemplary behaviour.</i>

<u>flair</u>	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>He has a flair for mathematics.</i>
invaluable	Having incalculable monetary, intellectual, or spiritual worth. <i>An invaluable source of information.</i>
laudable	Worthy of high praise. <i>Laudable though the aim might be the results have been criticized.</i>
merit	Good deeds entitling someone to a future reward from God. <i>Work of great merit.</i>
merited	Properly deserved. <i>A merited success.</i>
meritorious	(of an action or claim) likely to succeed on the merits of the case. <i>Meritorious conduct.</i>
praiseworthy	Worthy of high praise. <i>The government's praiseworthy efforts.</i>
precious	Obviously contrived to charm. <i>Children are precious.</i>
<u>priceless</u>	Having incalculable monetary, intellectual, or spiritual worth. <i>Darling you're priceless.</i>
<u>respectable</u>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>All respectable companies give guarantees.</i>
reward	Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>The holiday was a reward for 40 years service with the company.</i>
suitability	The quality of being right or appropriate for a particular person, purpose, or situation. <i>An important requirement is suitability for long trips.</i>
<u>talent</u>	A former weight and unit of currency, used especially by the ancient Romans and Greeks. <i>Simon is a talent to watch.</i>
valuable	Having great material or monetary value especially for use or exchange. <i>A valuable diamond.</i>
value	Estimate the value of. <i>The mean value of x.</i>
valued	Considered to be important or beneficial; cherished. <i>Triple valued.</i>
worthiness	The quality of being good enough; suitability. <i>Doubts about the worthiness of writing novels.</i>

worthy

Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse.
*A **worthy** fellow.*
