| appointment | <i>Government ministers and other political appointments are frequently replaced.</i> |
| assignment | A task or piece of work allocated to someone as part of a job or course of study. <i>An assignment of leasehold property.</i> |

| <u>denomination</u> | The face value of a banknote, coin, or postage stamp. <i>Two cards of the same denomination.</i> |
| earmarking | A distinctive characteristic or attribute. |
| election | The action of electing or the fact of being elected. <i>The 1860 presidential election.</i> |
| honorific | An expression of respect. <i>The Japanese use many honorifics.</i> |
| identification | A person's sense of identity with someone or something. <i>Do you have any identification.</i> |
| label | A classifying phrase or name applied to a person or thing, especially one that is inaccurate or restrictive. <i>Price labels.</i> |
| labelling | An identifying or descriptive marker that is attached to an object. |
| naming | The verbal act of naming. <i>The part he failed was the naming of state capitals.</i> |
| nomination | The act of officially naming a candidate. <i>There was keen competition for the nomination.</i> |
| particularization | An individualized description of a particular instance. |
| picking | The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first picking of berries to the market.</i> |
| pinpointing | A very brief moment. |
| selection | A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>Blocks ranging in area from 158 to 3 102 acres have been thrown open for selection.</i> |
| specification | (patent law) a document drawn up by the applicant for a patent of invention that provides an explicit and detailed description of the nature and use of an invention. <i>One of the telescope s mirrors had been manufactured to incorrect specifications.</i> |
| <u>stipulation</u> | An agreement or concession made by parties in a judicial proceeding (or by their attorneys) relating to the business before the court; must be in writing unless they are part of the court record. <i>A stipulation of fact was made in order to avoid delay.</i> |

title

A heading that names a statute or legislative bill; may give a brief summary of the matters it deals with.

*He looked for books with the word jazz in the **title**.*

| appoint | Create and charge with a task or function. <i>They appointed a day in May for the meeting.</i> |
| appointed | Subject to appointment. <i>The one appointed for guard duty.</i> |
| appointment | The act of disposing of property by virtue of the power of appointment. <i>Government ministers and other political appointments are frequently replaced.</i> |
| assign | Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. <i>Congress had assigned the task to the agency.</i> |
| assignment | A transfer of property by deed of conveyance. <i>An assignment of leasehold property.</i> |

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| authorize | Grant authorization or clearance for. <i>The rock star never authorized this slanderous biography.</i> |
| candidate | A person or thing regarded as suitable for or likely to receive a particular fate, treatment, or position. <i>She was the perfect candidate for a biography.</i> |
| commissioned | Given official approval to act. <i>Commissioned broker.</i> |
| commissioner | A member of a commission. <i>A baseball commissioner.</i> |
| delegate | A person sent or authorized to represent others, in particular an elected representative sent to a conference. <i>Edward was delegated to meet new arrivals.</i> |
| denominate | (of sums of money) be expressed in a specified monetary unit. <i>Two principal types of word associates can be denominated paradigmatic and syntagmatic.</i> |
| <u>designate</u> | Decree or designate beforehand. <i>The Wye Valley is designated an area of outstanding natural beauty.</i> |
| distribute | Cause to be distributed. <i>The journal is distributed worldwide.</i> |
| excellency | An outstanding feature; something in which something or someone excels. <i>The characteristic excellencies of Wordsworth's poetry are listed.</i> |
| inaugural | An inaugural speech especially one made by an incoming US president. <i>His inaugural concert as Music Director.</i> |
| mayor | The head of a city government. |
| minister | Act as a minister of religion. <i>Bishops in England were faced with a loss of priests to minister the sacraments.</i> |
| <u>name</u> | Mention by name. <i>She decided to name the child Edward.</i> |
| nominate | Put forward nominate for appointment to an office or for an honor or position. <i>The nominate race and two subspecies occur.</i> |
| ordain | (of God or fate) decide (something) in advance. <i>The king ordained that these courts should be revived.</i> |
| ordained | Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>An ordained priest.</i> |

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| president | The office of the United States head of state. <i>The Irish president.</i> |
| reassign | Appoint (someone) to a different post or role. <i>He ordered the ministries to reassign the vehicles.</i> |
| reconfirm | Confirm again. <i>Berghofer resigned but was reconfirmed as mayor of Dresden shortly afterwards.</i> |
| reservation | A district that is reserved for particular purpose. <i>Do you have a reservation.</i> |
| respectfully | Used to express politeness to mitigate the effect of a refusal or disagreement. <i>I respectfully declined their invitation.</i> |
| successor | A thing or person that immediately replaces something or someone. <i>He was President Lincoln s successor.</i> |
