## Despite as a Noun

### Definitions of "Despite" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “despite” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Contemptuous disregard.*
- *Lack of respect accompanied by a feeling of intense dislike.*
- *Contemptuous treatment or behaviour; outrage.*
- *Contempt; disdain.*



## Synonyms of "Despite" as a noun (6 Words)

### contempt

A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous.

*He was held in **contempt**.*

The manifestation of scorn and contempt.

**contemptuousness** *Every subordinate sensed his **contemptuousness** and hated him in return.*

### **derision**

The act of deriding or treating with contempt.

*My stories were greeted with **derision** and disbelief.*

### **disdain**

Lack of respect accompanied by a feeling of intense dislike.

*An aristocratic **disdain** for manual labour.*

### **disrespect**

A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous.

*Growing **disrespect** for the rule of law.*

**scorn**

A feeling and expression of contempt or disdain for someone or something.

*A scandal and a **scorn** to all who look on thee.*



**Usage Examples of "Despite" as a noun**

- *The theatre only earns my despite.*
- *The despite done by him to the holy relics.*
- *She wanted neither favor nor despite.*
- *The despite in which outsiders were held is legendary.*



## Associations of "Despite" (30 Words)

<b>already</b>	Used after a word or phrase to express impatience. <i>It was <b>already</b> past four o'clock.</i>
<b>but</b>	(used at the end of a sentence) though; however. <i>As with all these proposals ifs and <b>but</b>s abound.</i>
<b>contemn</b>	Treat or regard with contempt. <i>It lay in Deronda's nature usually to <b>contemn</b> the feeble.</i>
<b><u>contempt</u></b>	A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous. <i>He was held in <b>contempt</b>.</i>
<b><u>denunciation</u></b>	The action of informing against someone. <i>A <b>denunciation</b> of the bombing.</i>

<b>despise</b>	Look down on with disdain. <i>He <b>despised</b> himself for being selfish.</i>
<b>detested</b>	Treated with dislike or contempt.
<b>disaffection</b>	A state or feeling of being dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>There is growing <b>disaffection</b> with large corporations.</i>
<b><u>discredit</u></b>	Cause to be distrusted or disbelieved. <i>His explanation for the phenomenon was soon <b>discredited</b>.</i>
<b>disdain</b>	Look down on with disdain. <i>She remained standing pointedly <b>disdaining</b> his invitation to sit down.</i>
<b><u>disgust</u></b>	Cause aversion in; offend the moral sense of. <i>They were <b>disgusted</b> by the violence.</i>
<b><u>disrepute</u></b>	The state of being held in low esteem. <i>Because of the scandal the school has fallen into <b>disrepute</b>.</i>
<b>flout</b>	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i><b>Flout</b> the rules.</i>
<b>hate</b>	Intense dislike. <i>Richard s pet <b>hate</b> is filling in his tax returns.</i>
<b>heretofore</b>	Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i>Diseases that <b>heretofore</b> were usually confined to rural areas.</i>
<b>however</b>	To whatever degree or extent. <i><b>However</b> you look at it you can t criticize that.</i>
<b><u>merely</u></b>	And nothing more. <i>Gary a silent boy <b>merely</b> nodded.</i>
<b><u>nevertheless</u></b>	In spite of that; notwithstanding; all the same. <i>While we disliked each other <b>nevertheless</b> we agreed.</i>
<b><u>nonetheless</u></b>	Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was <b>nonetheless</b> attended by some 6 000.</i>
<b>notwithstanding</b>	Nevertheless; in spite of this. <i>I didn't like it. <b>Notwithstanding</b>, I remained calm.</i>
<b>revulsion</b>	A sense of disgust and loathing. <i>News of the attack will be met with sorrow and <b>revulsion</b>.</i>
<b>scorn</b>	Reject with contempt. <i>I met with scoffs I met with <b>scorns</b>.</i>

<b>sicken</b>	Get sick. <i>I hope I m not <b>sickening</b> for a cold.</i>
<b><u>simply</u></b>	Absolutely; completely (used for emphasis). <i>It makes Trevor <b>simply</b> furious.</i>
<b>suffix</b>	Append something especially as a suffix. <b>Suffix</b> words.
<b><u>though</u></b>	However (indicating that a factor qualifies or imposes restrictions on what was said previously). <i>I was hunting for work Jobs were scarce <b>though</b>.</i>
<b>undisguised</b>	(of a feeling) not disguised or concealed; open. <b>Undisguised</b> curiosity.
<b>unformed</b>	Without a definite form or shape. <b>Unformed</b> youths.
<b><u>whatever</u></b>	No matter what happens. <i>Give me <b>whatever</b> peaches you don t want.</i>
<b><u>yet</u></b>	To a greater degree or extent; used with comparisons. <i>Snow snow and <b>yet</b> more snow.</i>
