#### **Definitions of "Destinations" as a noun**

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "destinations" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- The ultimate goal for which something is done.
- The place designated as the end (as of a race or journey.
- Written directions for finding some location; written on letters or packages that are to be delivered to that location.

address	The code that identifies where a piece of information is stored. An <b>address</b> to the European Parliament.
finish	The act of finishing. The wine has a nutty flavor and a pleasant <b>finish</b> .
goal	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. The aircraft bumped towards our <b>goal</b> some 400 miles to the west.
name and address	A well-known or notable person.
terminus	A final point in space or time; an end or extremity. <i>The exhibition s <b>terminus</b> is 1962.</i>

# Associations of "Destinations" (30 Words)

address	Write the name and address of the intended recipient on an envelope letter or parcel. <i>The chairman address</i> ed the board of trustees.
<u>closing</u>	The act of closing something. The <b>closing</b> weeks of the year.
completion	The state of being finished. Work on the new golf course is nearing <b>completion</b> .
<u>conclude</u>	Formally and finally settle or arrange (an agreement. <i>The committee <b>conclude</b>d the meeting.</i>
conclusion	The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism. <i>Each research group came to a similar conclusion</i> .



<u>decease</u>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life. Upon your <b>decease</b> the capital will pass to your grandchildren.
<u>demise</u>	The time when something ends. <i>The <b>demise</b>d property.</i>
distal	Directed away from the midline or mesial plane of the body. The <b>distal</b> end of the tibia.
<u>dying</u>	(of a period of time) final; closing. <i>He strained to catch her <b>dying</b> words.</i>
ending	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>A nerve ending</i> .
epilogue	A short speech (often in verse) addressed directly to the audience by an actor at the end of a play. <i>The meaning of the book s title is revealed in the <b>epilogue</b>.</i>
eventually	In the end, especially after a long delay, dispute, or series of problems. <b>Eventually</b> after midnight I arrived at the hotel.
expiration	The end of a period of time. At the end of <b>expiration</b> there is still a slight inflation in the lungs.
expiry	The end of a fixed period of time. <i>The <b>expiry</b> of his driver s license.</i>
extremity	The hands and feet. <i>The peninsula s western <b>extremity</b>.</i>
<u>final</u>	The final match between the winners of all previous matches in an elimination tournament. She was doing her history <b>final</b> s.
finale	The closing section of a musical composition. The <b>finale</b> of Beethoven s Ninth Symphony.
<u>finally</u>	After an unspecified period of time or an especially long delay. <i>He <b>finally</b> arrived to join us.</i>
fingertip	The end (tip) of a finger. Police made a <b>fingertip</b> search of the area.
finis	The concluding part of any performance. <i>The market was up at the <b>finis</b>h.</i>
finish	Provide with a finish. When the <b>finish</b> is too thin it is difficult to apply evenly.
finishing	The act of finishing. The speaker s <b>finishing</b> was greeted with applause.



goal	A cage or basket used as a goal in other sports. He achieved his <b>goal</b> of becoming King of England.
hemline	The line formed by the lower edge of a skirt or coat. Modest dress means that <b>hemline</b> s must be below the knee.
last	Especially in enumerating points lastly. Lion Cavern came from <b>last</b> in a slowly run race.
objective	The objective case. Historians try to be <b>objective</b> and impartial.
outcome	A phenomenon that follows and is caused by some previous phenomenon. It is the <b>outcome</b> of the vote that counts.
peroration	A flowery and highly rhetorical oration. <i>He summarized his main points in his <b>peroration</b>.</i>
termination	Something that results. The <b>termination</b> of the agreement.
terminus	A figure of a human bust or an animal ending in a square pillar from which it appears to spring, originally used as a boundary marker in ancient Rome. <i>The exhibition s terminus</i> is 1962.
