## **Destiny as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Destiny" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “destiny” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Your overall circumstances or condition in life (including everything that happens to you).*
- *The events that will necessarily happen to a particular person or thing in the future.*
- *The hidden power believed to control future events; fate.*
- *The ultimate agency regarded as predetermining the course of events (often personified as a woman).*
- *An event (or a course of events) that will inevitably happen in the future.*



## Synonyms of "Destiny" as a noun (9 Words)

**circumstances** Your overall circumstances or condition in life including everything that happens to you.

*A victim of **circumstances**.*

**doom**

Death, destruction, or some other terrible fate.

*A day like that of the last **doom**.*

**fate**

The course of someone's life, or the outcome of a situation for someone or something, seen as outside their control.

***Fate** decided his course for him.*

**fortune**

Luck, especially good luck.

*Whatever my **fortune** may be.*

**future**

A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the future.

*Work on the building will be shelved for the foreseeable **future**.*

**lot**

A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use.

*He will need a second **lot** of tills to handle the second currency.*

**luck**

Chance considered as a force that causes good or bad things to happen.  
*I don't like Friday it's bad **luck**.*

**portion**

Your overall circumstances or condition in life (including everything that happens to you).

*He could repeat large **portions** of Shakespeare.*

**providence**

The prudence and care exercised by someone in the management of resources.

*It was considered a duty to encourage **providence**.*

- *We are helpless in the face of destiny.*
- *He believed in destiny.*
- *She was unable to control her own destiny.*

<b>fatalism</b>	A submissive mental attitude resulting from acceptance of the doctrine that everything that happens is predetermined and inevitable. <i>He experienced a sense of <b>fatalism</b> that kept his fear at bay.</i>
<b>fatalist</b>	Of or relating to fatalism. <i>A <b>fatalist</b> person.</i>
<b>fate</b>	An event (or a course of events) that will inevitably happen in the future. <i><b>Fate</b> decided his course for him.</i>
<b>fateful</b>	Having momentous consequences; of decisive importance- Saturday Rev. <i>A <b>fateful</b> error.</i>
<b>felicitate</b>	Express congratulations. <i>The award winner was <b>felicitated</b> by the cultural association.</i>
<b>foreknowledge</b>	Knowledge of an event before it occurs. <i>There was the <b>foreknowledge</b> of every role she would dance.</i>
<b>foreordination</b>	Being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).
<b>fortunate</b>	Supremely favored. <i>A federal programme aimed at helping less <b>fortunate</b> families.</i>
<b>fortunately</b>	By good fortune. <i><b>Fortunately</b> no shots were fired and no one was hurt.</i>
<b>fortune</b>	The success or failure of a person or enterprise over a period of time. <i>It was as if <b>fortune</b> guided his hand.</i>
<b>kismet</b>	(Islam) the will of Allah. <i>What chance did I stand against <b>kismet</b>.</i>
<b>luck</b>	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another. <i>They say <b>luck</b> is a lady.</i>
<b>lucky</b>	Having or bringing good fortune. <i><b>Lucky</b> stars.</i>
<b>omen</b>	Indicate as with a sign or an omen. <i>The ghost's appearance was an ill <b>omen</b>.</i>
<b>ominous</b>	Presaging ill fortune. <i>A dead and <b>ominous</b> silence prevailed.</i>
<b>opportunist</b>	Opportunistic. <i>Most burglaries are committed by casual <b>opportunists</b>.</i>

<b>predestination</b>	(in Christian theology) the doctrine that God has ordained all that will happen, especially with regard to the salvation of some and not others. It has been particularly associated with the teachings of St Augustine of Hippo and of Calvin.
<b>predestine</b>	Decree or determine beforehand. <i>Calvinists believed that every person was <b>predestined</b> by God to go to heaven or to hell.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Knowledge of the future (usually said to be obtained from a divine source). <i>The gift of <b>prophecy</b>.</i>
<b>randomly</b>	Without method or conscious decision; indiscriminately. <i>The houses were <b>randomly</b> scattered.</i>
<b>superstition</b>	An irrational belief arising from ignorance or fear. <i>She touched her locket for luck a <b>superstition</b> she d had since childhood.</i>
<b>tallow</b>	Smear something especially the bottom of a boat with tallow. <i>I <b>tallowed</b> my boats with our candles.</i>
<b>want</b>	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>We <b>want</b> to go to the beach.</i>
<b>wish</b>	Prefer or wish to do something. <i>It was his last <b>wish</b>.</i>
