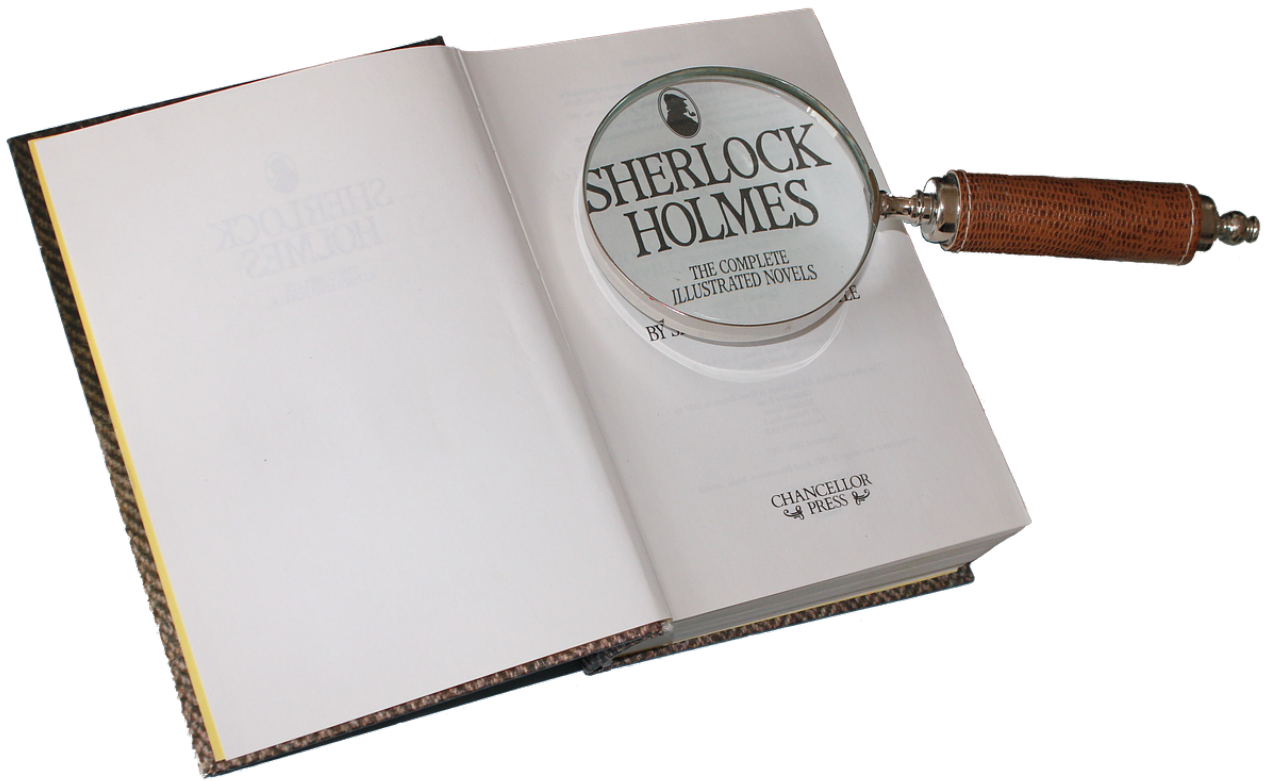
<b>dig up</b>	Thrust down or into.
<b>discern</b>	Detect with the senses. <i>I can <b>discern</b> no difference between the two policies.</i>
<b>discover</b>	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>Firemen <b>discovered</b> a body in the debris.</i>
<b><u>distinguish</u></b>	Detect with the senses. <i>What <b>distinguishes</b> sport from games.</i>
<b>dredge up</b>	Remove with a power shovel, usually from a bottom of a body of water.
<b><u>expose</u></b>	Expose or make accessible to some action or influence. <i>Students were <b>exposed</b> to statistics in high school.</i>
<b>ferret out</b>	Search and discover through persistent investigation.
<b>find</b>	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>These aspects of civilization do not <b>find</b> expression or receive an interpretation.</i>
<b>find out</b>	Decide on and make a declaration about.
<b>find the perpetrator of</b>	Make a discovery, make a new finding.
<b>find the person behind</b>	Discover or determine the existence, presence, or fact of.
<b>get to the bottom of</b>	Go through (mental or physical states or experiences.
<b>hunt down</b>	Chase away, with as with force.
<b>hunt out</b>	Seek, search for.
<b>identify</b>	Give the name or identifying characteristics of refer to by name or some other identifying characteristic property. <i>A system that ensures that the pupil's real needs are identified.</i>
<b>make out</b>	Charge with a function; charge to be.
<b>mark</b>	Make small marks into the surface of. <i>We have <b>marked</b> the area with red stones.</i>
<b>nose out</b>	Search or inquire in a meddlesome way.
<b>note</b>	Make a written note of. <i>He <b>noted</b> down her address on a piece of paper.</i>
<b>notice</b>	Notice or perceive. <i>He <b>noticed</b> the youths behaving suspiciously.</i>
<b><u>observe</u></b>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>It s chilly she <b>observed</b>.</i>
<b><u>perceive</u></b>	To become aware of through the senses. <i>If Guy does not <b>perceive</b> himself as disabled nobody else should.</i>

<b>recognize</b>	Show approval or appreciation of. <i>They were refusing to <b>recognize</b> the puppet regime.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Make or write a comment on. <i>He <b>remarked</b> the man's inflamed eyelids.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	Make (something) known to humans by divine or supernatural means. <i>Brenda was forced to <b>reveal</b> Robbie's whereabouts.</i>
<b>root out</b>	Dig with the snout.
<b>smoke out</b>	Inhale and exhale smoke from cigarettes, cigars, pipes.
<b>solve</b>	Settle, as of a debt. <i><b>Solve</b> an old debt.</i>
<b>spot</b>	Mark or become marked with spots. <i>This dress <b>spots</b> quickly.</i>
<b>track down</b>	Make tracks upon.
<b>turn up</b>	Cause to move along an axis or into a new direction.
<b>uncover</b>	Remove all or part of one's clothes to show one's body. <i><b>Uncover</b> your belly.</i>
<b>unearth</b>	Recover through digging. <i>The CIA <b>unearthed</b> a plot to kill the President.</i>
<b>unmask</b>	Reveal the true nature of. <i><b>Unmask</b> the imposter.</i>

<b><u>discovery</u></b>	(law) compulsory pretrial disclosure of documents relevant to a case; enables one side in a litigation to elicit information from the other side concerning the facts in the case. <i>The <b>discovery</b> of the body.</i>
<b><u>earthquake</u></b>	A sudden violent shaking of the ground, typically causing great destruction, as a result of movements within the earth's crust or volcanic action. <i>Selling the company caused an <b>earthquake</b> among the employees.</i>
<b>eon</b>	The longest division of geological time. <i>Oh that happened <b>eons</b> ago.</i>
<b>espy</b>	Catch sight of. <i>She <b>espied</b> her daughter rounding the corner.</i>
<b><u>eureka</u></b>	A town in northwest California on an arm of the Pacific Ocean.
<b>exploration</b>	A careful systematic search. <i>Onshore oil and gas <b>exploration</b>.</i>
<b>explore</b>	Examine or evaluate (an option or possibility). <i><b>Explore</b> unknown territory in biology.</i>
<b>find</b>	Come upon after searching find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i>I cannot <b>find</b> my gloves.</i>
<b>finding</b>	The action of finding someone or something. <i>The <b>findings</b> in the gastrointestinal tract indicate that he died several hours after dinner.</i>
<b>geologic</b>	Of or relating to or based on geology. <i><b>Geological</b> formations.</i>
<b><u>hotspot</u></b>	An area of volcanic activity. <i>While some were caught in the cross fire at various political <b>hotspots</b> most victims were targeted and killed.</i>
<b><u>invention</u></b>	The creation of something in the mind. <i>The <b>invention</b> of printing in the 15th century.</i>
<b><u>malfunction</u></b>	A failure to function normally. <i>They were sent back to the manufacturers at the first sign of <b>malfunction</b>.</i>
<b><u>mapping</u></b>	A mathematical relation such that each element of a given set (the domain of the function) is associated with an element of another set (the range of the function).
<b><u>newfound</u></b>	Newly discovered. <i>Hudson pointed his ship down the coast of the <b>newfound</b> sea.</i>
<b>notice</b>	Notice or perceive. <i>It was only last year that the singer really began to be <b>noticed</b>.</i>

<b><u>perceive</u></b>	Interpret or regard (someone or something) in a particular way. <i>She finally <b>perceived</b> the futility of her protest.</i>
<b>perception</b>	The neurophysiological processes, including memory, by which an organism becomes aware of and interprets external stimuli. <i>The <b>perception</b> of pain.</i>
<b><u>rummage</u></b>	(of a customs officer) make a thorough search of (a vessel). <i>Our brief was to <b>rummage</b> as many of the vessels as possible.</i>
<b><u>see</u></b>	See or watch. <i>You ll <b>see</b> a lot of cheating in this school.</i>
<b>seismograph</b>	An instrument that measures and records details of earthquakes, such as force and duration.
<b><u>startling</u></b>	So remarkably different or sudden as to cause momentary shock or alarm. <i><b>Startling</b> news.</i>
<b><u>tsunami</u></b>	A cataclysm resulting from a destructive sea wave caused by an earthquake or volcanic eruption. <i>A colossal <b>tsunami</b> destroyed the Minoan civilization in minutes.</i>
<b>volcanic</b>	Relating to or produced by a volcano or volcanoes. <i>A <b>volcanic</b> temper.</i>
