arrest	Attract and fix. <i>They got arrested during a police raid.</i>
avert	Turn away (one's eyes or thoughts). <i>Avert a strike.</i>
balk	Miss or refuse (a chance or invitation). <i>He raised every objection he could to balk this plan.</i>
block	Shape into a block or blocks. <i>Block the wheels of a car.</i>
check	Write out a check on a bank account. <i>Check into the rumor.</i>
counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>This will counteract the foolish actions of my colleagues.</i>
curb	Keep to the curb. <i>Curb your dogs.</i>

discourage	Deprive of courage or hope take away hope from cause to feel discouraged. <i>We should discourage this practice among our youth.</i>
dissuade	Turn away from by persuasion. <i>Negative campaigning will only dissuade people.</i>
fend off	Try to manage without help.
foil	Cover or back with foil. <i>A brave policewoman foiled the armed robbery.</i>
forestall	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. <i>He would have spoken but David forestalled him.</i>
frustrate	Prevent (a plan or attempted action) from progressing, succeeding, or being fulfilled. <i>It frustrated me that more couldn't be done for her.</i>
halt	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>She halted in mid sentence.</i>
hamper	Put at a disadvantage. <i>He was hampered in his efforts by the bad weather.</i>
head off	Form a head or come or grow to a head.
help	Give help or assistance be of service. <i>She helped herself to a biscuit.</i>
hinder	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. <i>The brace I have to wear is hindering my movements.</i>
hold back	To close within bounds limit or hold back from movement.
impede	Block passage through. <i>The sap causes swelling which can impede breathing.</i>
inhibit	Make (someone) self-conscious and as a result unable to act naturally. <i>They felt inhibited by the presence of healthcare professionals.</i>
intercept	Cut off or deflect (light or other electromagnetic radiation). <i>I intercepted Edward on his way to work.</i>
keep	Store or keep customarily. <i>There's little to earn and many to keep.</i>
nip in the bud	Squeeze tightly between the fingers.
obstruct	Commit the offence of intentionally hindering (a police officer). <i>They had to alter the course of the stream and obstruct the natural flow of the water.</i>
obviate	Remove (a need or difficulty). <i>A parachute can be used to obviate disaster.</i>

preclude	Keep from happening or arising; make impossible. <i>His difficulties preclude him from leading a normal life.</i>
prevent	Stop (someone) from doing something. <i>We must prevent the cancer from spreading.</i>
put a stop to	Formulate in a particular style or language.
put off	Make an investment.
restrain	Prevent the action or expression of. <i>He had to be restrained from walking out.</i>
save	Save from sins. <i>He saves half his salary.</i>
scare off	Cause to lose courage.
shut out	Prevent from entering shut out.
stave off	Kill intentionally and with premeditation.
stay	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>Jenny decided to stay at home with their young child.</i>
stop	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>Stop the project.</i>
thwart	Oppose (a plan, attempt, or ambition) successfully. <i>He never did anything to thwart his father.</i>
turn aside	Shape by rotating on a lathe or cutting device or a wheel.
ward off	Watch over or shield from danger or harm; protect.

dislodgement	Forced removal from a position of advantage.
dissuade	Persuade (someone) not to take a particular course of action. <i>His friends tried to dissuade him from flying.</i>
embarrass	Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self conscious. <i>He would be embarrassed by estate duty.</i>
firewall	Protect a network or system from unauthorized access with a firewall. <i>He moved the throttle to the firewall.</i>
forbid	Order (someone) not to do something. <i>I was forbidden from seeing him again.</i>
foreclose	Take possession of a mortgaged property when the mortgagor fails to keep up their mortgage payments. <i>The decision effectively foreclosed any possibility of his early rehabilitation.</i>
forestall	Prevent or obstruct (an anticipated event or action) by taking advance action. <i>They will present their resignations to forestall a vote of no confidence.</i>
forfend	Avert or prevent (something evil or unpleasant). <i>The fiend forfend said the grim Earl.</i>
hamper	A basket with a carrying handle and a hinged lid, used for food, cutlery, and plates on a picnic. <i>A laundry hamper.</i>

hinder	Hinder or prevent the progress or accomplishment of. <i>Language barriers hindered communication between scientists.</i>
illegalize	Declare illegal; outlaw.
impede	Block passage through. <i>The sap causes swelling which can impede breathing.</i>
inhibit	Make (someone) self-conscious and as a result unable to act naturally. <i>The earnings rule inhibited some retired people from working.</i>
insulate	Prevent the passage of electricity to or from (something) by covering it in non-conducting material. <i>The village was insulated by every flood of the river.</i>
lightproof	Not penetrable by light. <i>Lightproof containers.</i>
obstruct	Block passage through. <i>An indirect free kick is awarded for intentionally obstructing an opponent.</i>
<u>preclude</u>	(of a situation or condition) prevent someone from doing something. <i>His difficulties preclude him from leading a normal life.</i>
prevent	Stop (someone) from doing something. <i>Action must be taken to prevent further accidents.</i>
<u>thwart</u>	From one side to another side of an area. <i>He was thwarted in his desire to punish Uncle Fred.</i>
