*The **choice** between good and evil.*

conclusion	The summing-up of an argument or text. <i>His conclusion took the evidence into account.</i>
confirmation	Information that confirms or verifies. <i>High unemployment figures were further confirmation that the economy was in recession.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>I ll make the decision on my own.</i>
<u>deduction</u>	Something that is inferred (deduced or entailed or implied). <i>The dividend will be paid without deduction of tax.</i>
<u>designation</u>	The act of putting a person into a non-elective position. <i>A leader s designation of his own successor.</i>
diagnosis	The identification of the nature of an illness or other problem by examination of the symptoms. <i>Early diagnosis and treatment are essential.</i>
<u>discernment</u>	The ability to judge well. <i>An astonishing lack of discernment.</i>
<u>discovery</u>	Something that is discovered. <i>The drug is not a new discovery.</i>
divination	The art or gift of prophecy (or the pretense of prophecy) by supernatural means. <i>The mediums are hired to perform divinations.</i>
establishment	The action of establishing something or being established. <i>Hotels or catering establishments.</i>
finding	The action of finding someone or something. <i>A local doctor reported the finding of numerous dead rats.</i>
fixing	The action of mending or repairing something. <i>Have all the fixings ready before starting.</i>
naming	The verbal act of naming. <i>The part he failed was the naming of state capitals.</i>
nomination	The condition of having been proposed as a suitable candidate for appointment or election. <i>Send your nominations in by 30th November.</i>
prescription	The authoritative recommendation of an action or procedure. <i>I ve got to pick up my prescription from the chemist s.</i>
purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>State pensions are considered as earned income for tax purposes.</i>

resoluteness	The trait of being resolute. <i>His resoluteness carried him through the battle.</i>
resolution	Computer science the number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>A New Year s resolution.</i>
resolve	A formal resolution by a legislative body or public meeting. <i>She received information that strengthened her resolve.</i>
setting	A piece of metal in which a precious stone or gem is fixed to form a piece of jewellery. <i>A setting of Yevtushenko s bleak poem.</i>
settlement	The process of establishing a settlement or settlements. <i>Most suppliers will offer early settlement discounts.</i>
specification	A restriction that is insisted upon as a condition for an agreement. <i>Give a full specification of the job advertised.</i>
verification	An affidavit attached to a statement confirming the truth of that statement. <i>The verification of official documents.</i>

courage	The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. <i>He fought his illness with great courage.</i>
daring	Causing outrage or surprise by being boldly unconventional. <i>A daring crime.</i>
decide	Cause to decide. <i>She had decided on her plan of action.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>I ll make the decision on my own.</i>
determine	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>My wife had determined that I must swap my old bike for a car.</i>
deterministic	An inevitable consequence of antecedent sufficient causes. <i>A deterministic theory.</i>
encouraged	Inspired with confidence.
firmness	The state of being fixed, definite, or constant. <i>He sang with a wonderful firmness of tone.</i>
fortitude	Strength of mind that enables one to endure adversity with courage. <i>She endured her illness with great fortitude.</i>
<u>hero</u>	A being of great strength and courage celebrated for bold exploits; often the offspring of a mortal and a god. <i>RAF pilots were the heroes of the Battle of Britain.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
manliness	The traditional male quality of being brave and strong. <i>The author s alleged lack of manliness.</i>
mettle	The courage to carry on. <i>The team showed their true mettle in the second half.</i>
<u>proWess</u>	Skill or expertise in a particular activity or field. <i>His proWess as a fisherman.</i>
resolve	The trait of being resolute. <i>The orange light resolved itself into four roadwork lanterns.</i>
resolved	Explained or answered. <i>Constance was resolved not to cry.</i>
resourcefulness	The ability to find quick and clever ways to overcome difficulties. <i>A man of great resourcefulness.</i>

- select** Selected or chosen for special qualifications.
*She **selected** a pair of shoes from among the dozen the salesgirl had shown her.*
- unflinching** Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty.
*He has shown **unflinching** determination throughout the campaign.*
- valor** The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle).
*He received a medal for **valor**.*
- virility** The masculine property of being capable of copulation and procreation.
*Great importance is placed on a man's **virility**.*
