alluring	Powerfully and mysteriously attractive or fascinating; seductive. <i>Her alluring smile.</i>
annihilating	Making light of. <i>Afire with annihilating invective.</i>
annihilative	Wreaking or capable of wreaking complete destruction. <i>Possessing annihilative power.</i>
appealing	(of characters in literature or drama) evoking empathic or sympathetic feelings. <i>The idea of having enough money to retire at fifty is very appealing.</i>
arresting	Denoting a person or agency that seizes and detains someone by legal authority. <i>The arresting officer.</i>
beautiful	Pleasing the senses or mind aesthetically. <i>Beautiful poetry.</i>

<u>beguiling</u>	Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire. <i>Taken in by beguiling tales of overnight fortunes.</i>
bewitching	Capturing interest as if by a spell. Bewitching smile.
calamitous	Having extremely unfortunate or dire consequences; bringing ruin. <i>A calamitous defeat.</i>
captivating	Capturing interest as if by a spell. <i>A captivating smile.</i>
cataclysmic	(of a natural event) large-scale and violent. Cataclysmic nuclear war.
<u>catastrophic</u>	Involving a sudden and large-scale alteration in state. <i>The body undergoes catastrophic collapse towards the state of a black hole.</i>
<u>charismatic</u>	Relating to the charismatic movement in the Christian Church. <i>He was a charismatic figure with great appeal to the public.</i>
<u>charming</u>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>A charming little cottage.</i>
crushing	Physically or spiritually devastating; often used in combination. <i>A crushing blow.</i>
cutting	Capable of cutting something. Cutting winter winds.
<u>dazzling</u>	Amazingly impressive; suggestive of the flashing of lightning. <i>A dazzling display of football.</i>
<u>delightful</u>	Causing delight; charming. <i>The comedy was delightful.</i>
<u>desirable</u>	(of a person) arousing sexual desire. <i>A desirable job.</i>
<u>destructive</u>	Causing destruction or much damage. Destructive criticism.
<u>disastrous</u>	Highly unsuccessful. <i>The battle was a disastrous end to a disastrous campaign.</i>
distressing	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Some very distressing news.</i>
<u>enchancing</u>	Delightfully charming or attractive. Enchanting views.

engaging	Charming and attractive. <i>An engaging smile.</i>
glamorous	(of a person) having a beauty or charm that is sexually attractive. <i>Being a singer must be such a glamorous lifestyle.</i>
gorgeous	Very pleasant or enjoyable. <i>Gorgeous colours and exquisite decoration.</i>
incisive	(of a person or mental process) intelligently analytical and clear-thinking. <i>Incisive teeth.</i>
<u>irresistible</u>	Impossible to resist; overpowering. <i>She felt an irresistible urge to object.</i>
lovely	Very pleasant or enjoyable; delightful. <i>She looked lovely.</i>
<u>luscious</u>	Very sexually attractive. <i>The luscious brush strokes and warm colours of these late masterpieces.</i>
mordant	Harshly ironic or sinister. <i>A mordant sense of humour.</i>
<u>overwhelming</u>	Very great in amount. <i>The temptation to despair may become overwhelming.</i>
penetrating	Having or demonstrating ability to recognize or draw fine distinctions. <i>Her scream was sudden and penetrating.</i>
<u>ravishing</u>	Delightful; entrancing. <i>She looked ravishing.</i>
ruinous	Causing injury or blight; especially affecting with sudden violence or plague or ruin. <i>The castle is ruinous.</i>
savage	Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>A savage race.</i>
<u>seductive</u>	Tending to entice into a desired action or state. <i>A seductive voice.</i>
<u>severe</u>	Severely simple. <i>A hefty six footer with a rather severe mien.</i>
sexually attractive	Having the properties of a magnet; the ability to draw or pull.
shattering	Seemingly loud enough to break something; violently rattling or clattering. <i>The shattering peal of artillery.</i>

<u>shocking</u>	Causing a feeling of surprise and dismay. <i>The most shocking book of its time.</i>
<u>striking</u>	(of an employee) on strike. <i>A striking thing about Picadilly Circus is the statue of Eros in the center.</i>
stunning	Causing or capable of causing bewilderment or shock or insensibility. <i>A stunning detonation with volumes of black smoke.</i>
terrible	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>What a terrible mess.</i>
<u>traumatic</u>	Psychologically painful. <i>She is remembering some deeply traumatic incident in her past.</i>
<u>trenchant</u>	Having keenness and forcefulness and penetration in thought, expression, or intellect. <i>A trenchant argument.</i>
very great	Precisely as stated.
withering	(of heat) intense; scorching. <i>Protective cover to escape withering heat.</i>

aftershock	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
avalanche	Engulf or carry off by an avalanche. <i>We have had an avalanche of applications for the post.</i>
calamitous	Having extremely unfortunate or dire consequences; bringing ruin. <i>Such calamitous events as fires hurricanes and floods.</i>
<u>catastrophic</u>	Involving a sudden and large-scale alteration in state. <i>Catastrophic mismanagement of the economy.</i>
<u>conflagration</u>	A very intense and uncontrolled fire. <i>Tinder dry conditions sparked fears of a conflagration in many drought devastated communities.</i>
crushing	Physically or spiritually devastating; often used in combination. <i>A crushing blow.</i>

damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. <i>The damage to his reputation was considerable.</i>
deadly	As if dead. <i>Deadly poisons.</i>
<u>destructive</u>	Negative and unhelpful. <i>The destructive power of weapons.</i>
<u>detrimental</u>	Causing harm or injury. <i>Recent policies have been detrimental to the interests of many old people.</i>
devastate	Overwhelm or overpower. <i>He was devastated by his grief when his son died.</i>
<u>earthquake</u>	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity. <i>Selling the company caused an earthquake among the employees.</i>
<u>epicenter</u>	The point on the Earth's surface directly above the focus of an earthquake.
<u>fatal</u>	Having momentous consequences; of decisive importance. <i>The fatal day of the election finally arrived.</i>
<u>harmful</u>	Causing or likely to cause harm. <i>Too much sun is harmful to the skin.</i>
<u>hazard</u>	Say (something) in a tentative way. <i>We can form no calculation concerning the laws of hazard.</i>
incapacitate	Injure permanently. <i>He was incapacitated by a heart attack.</i>
injurious	(of language) maliciously insulting; libellous. <i>Food which is injurious to health.</i>
landslide	An overwhelming majority of votes for one party or candidate in an election. <i>Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a landslide.</i>
<u>lethal</u>	Sufficient to cause death. <i>The Krakatoa eruption was the most lethal on record.</i>
mortal	Involving loss of divine grace or spiritual death. <i>Capacities only possible of God rather than mortals.</i>
<u>pernicious</u>	Having a harmful effect, especially in a gradual or subtle way. <i>The pernicious influences of the mass media.</i>
ruinous	Disastrous or destructive. <i>A ruinous course of action.</i>
seismograph	An instrument that measures and records details of earthquakes, such as force and duration.

slayer Someone who kills a person or animal in a violent way.
*David the **slayer** of Goliath.*

stifling Making one feel constrained or oppressed.
*The **stifling** atmosphere.*

suppression The failure to develop some part or organ.
*The heavy handed **suppression** of political dissent.*

toxicity Grave harmfulness or deadliness.
*She went public with allegations of workplace **toxicity** and sexism.*

tsunami An arrival or occurrence of something in overwhelming quantities or amounts.
*A **tsunami** of data pours into the CNBC newsroom every minute of every trading day.*

withering Making light of.
*Protective cover to escape **withering** heat.*
