Associations of "Devil s" (30 Words)

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| accursed | Used to express strong dislike of or anger at someone or something. <i>This accursed country.</i> |
| colossus | A statue that is much bigger than life size. <i>The Russian Empire was the colossus of European politics.</i> |
| dastard | A despicable coward. <i>The unprovoked and dastardly attack by Japan on December 7th.</i> |
| dastardly | Wicked and cruel. <i>Pirates and their dastardly deeds.</i> |
| demon | A forceful or skilful performer of a specified activity. <i>Each of the damned souls was guarded by a group of hideous demons.</i> |
| deviltry | Wicked and cruel behavior. |
| diabolic | Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i>The cold calculation and diabolic art of some statesmen.</i> |
| dwarf | A person who is of unusually or abnormally small stature because of a congenital condition a person affected by dwarfism. <i>The buildings surround and dwarf All Saints church.</i> |
| exorcise | Completely remove (something unpleasant) from one’s mind or memory. <i>She wanted to exorcise some of the pain.</i> |
| fiend | A person motivated by irrational enthusiasm (as for a cause)-Winston Churchill. <i>Britain s most notorious sex fiend.</i> |
| frivolity | Lack of seriousness; light-heartedness. <i>A night of fun and frivolity.</i> |
| ghost | Act as ghostwriter of a work. <i>A ghost ship.</i> |

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| giant | Used in names of very large animals and plants e.g. giant hogweed, giant tortoise. <i>Giant multinational corporations.</i> |
| gnome | A short pithy saying expressing a general truth. <i>The gnomes of Zurich.</i> |
| hydra | A long faint constellation in the southern hemisphere near the equator stretching between Virgo and Cancer. <i>We may be facing a hydra that defies any easy solution.</i> |
| idolater | A person who worships idols. |
| imp | One who is playfully mischievous. <i>A cheeky young imp.</i> |
| knave | (in cards) a jack. |
| monster | A cruel, wicked and inhuman person. <i>He was an unfeeling, treacherous monster.</i> |
| ogre | (folklore) a giant who likes to eat human beings. <i>It is clear that I am no ogre.</i> |
| rapscallion | A mischievous person. <i>They were the rapscallions behind this practical joke.</i> |
| rascal | A mischievous or cheeky person, especially a child or man (typically used in an affectionate way). <i>A lovable rascal.</i> |
| rogue | A seedling or plant deviating from the standard variety. <i>A rogue cop who took the law into his own hands.</i> |
| scamp | One who is playfully mischievous. <i>That man was a scamp, a damn thief.</i> |
| scoundrel | A wicked or evil person; someone who does evil deliberately. <i>That scoundrel sets a bad example for the other young men.</i> |
| seduction | The action of seducing someone. <i>The seductions of the mainland.</i> |
| temptation | The desire to have or do something that you know you should avoid. <i>He felt the temptation and his will power weakened.</i> |
| troll | A fisherman's lure that is used in trolling. <i>The child trolled her hoop.</i> |
| urchin | A goblin. <i>He was surrounded by a dozen street urchins in rags.</i> |
| villain | A wicked or evil person; someone who does evil deliberately. <i>Some people have been tricked by villains with false identity cards.</i> |
