demoniac	Relating to or characteristic of a demon or demons. <i>A goddess with both divine and demoniac qualities.</i>
demoniacal	Relating to or characteristic of a demon or evil spirit. <i>Towards midnight a demoniacal shriek was heard.</i>
<u>demonic</u>	Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i>A demonic hurry.</i>
depraved	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>Depraved criminals.</i>
despicable	Deserving hatred and contempt. <i>A despicable crime.</i>

diabolic	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. <i>Diabolic sorcerers under the influence of devils.</i>
<u>diabolical</u>	Characteristic of the Devil, or so evil as to be suggestive of the Devil. <i>His diabolical cunning.</i>
difficult	Needing much effort or skill to accomplish, deal with, or understand. <i>A difficult child.</i>
<u>dreadful</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>Don't go out the weather is dreadful.</i>
evil	Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil. <i>No man is so evil as to be beyond redemption.</i>
fiendish	Extremely awkward or complex. <i>A fiendish despot.</i>
foul	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <i>Foul or dirty copy.</i>
<u>ghastly</u>	Very objectionable, bad, or unpleasant. <i>One of the most ghastly crimes ever committed.</i>
<u>heinous</u>	(of a person or wrongful act, especially a crime) utterly odious or wicked. <i>A battery of heinous crimes.</i>
hideous	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>A hideous scar.</i>
horrible	Causing or likely to cause horror; shocking. <i>A horrible massacre.</i>
<u>horrifying</u>	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>An alarming even horrifying picture.</i>
immoral	Not adhering to ethical or moral principles. <i>Unseemly and immoral behaviour.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	(of a person) very unreasonable. <i>An impossible situation.</i>
iniquitous	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>These awards remain an iniquitous system.</i>
loathsome	Causing hatred or disgust; repulsive. <i>A loathsome disease.</i>
mephistophelean	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil.
mephistophelian	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. <i>A mephistophelian glint in his eye.</i>

messy	Dirty and disorderly. <i>A child s messy eating habits.</i>
monstrous	Abnormally large. <i>Monstrous bug eyed fish.</i>
nefarious	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i>The nefarious activities of the organized crime syndicates.</i>
odious	Unequivocally detestable- Edmund Burke. <i>Consequences odious to those you govern.</i>
perverted	(of a person or their actions) characterized by sexually abnormal and unacceptable practices or tendencies. <i>He whispered perverted obscenities.</i>
problematic	Making great mental demands; hard to comprehend or solve or believe. <i>A problematic situation at home.</i>
rascally	Playful in an appealingly bold way. <i>The rascally rabble.</i>
roguish	Playful in an appealingly bold way. <i>The captain was set adrift by his roguish crew.</i>
satanic	Of or characteristic of Satan. <i>The Charismatic Movement continues its relentless search for evidence of satanic influence.</i>
shameful	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>The wicked rascally shameful conduct of the bankrupt.</i>
shocking	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation- Thackeray. <i>The most shocking book of its time.</i>
sinful	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i>A sinful way of life.</i>
terrible	Extremely bad or serious. <i>I was sick all night and felt terrible for two days.</i>
thorny	Causing distress, difficulty, or trouble. <i>The thorny question of states rights.</i>
ticklish	(of a cough) characterized by persistent irritation in the throat. <i>Hesitates to be explicit on so ticklish a matter.</i>
tricky	Having concealed difficulty. <i>Applying eyeliner can be a tricky business.</i>

<u>troublesome</u>	Causing difficulty or annoyance. <i>A troublesome infection.</i>
ungodly	Unreasonably early or inconvenient. <i>Ungodly acts.</i>

giant	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>Walton built a retail giant.</i>
gnome	A small garden ornament in the form of a bearded man with a pointed hat. <i>A grizzled gnome of a man.</i>
hydra	Small tubular solitary freshwater hydrozoan polyp. <i>We may be facing a hydra that defies any easy solution.</i>
idolater	A person who worships idols.

imp	A small, mischievous devil or sprite. <i>A cheeky young imp.</i>
knave	A deceitful and unreliable scoundrel.
