- *Completely wanting or lacking.*

### Synonyms of "Devoid" as an adjective (16 Words)

<b>bankrupt of</b>	Financially ruined.
<b>bare of</b>	Lacking embellishment or ornamentation.
<b>barren</b>	(of a female animal) not pregnant or unable to become so. <i>He scored yesterday to end his <b>barren</b> spell.</i>
<b>barren of</b>	Completely wanting or lacking.
<b>bereft of</b>	Sorrowful through loss or deprivation.
<b>deprived of</b>	Marked by deprivation especially of the necessities of life or healthful environmental influences.
<b><u>destitute</u></b>	Extremely poor and lacking the means to provide for oneself. <i>Young recruits <b>destitute</b> of experience.</i>

<b>destitute of</b>	Completely wanting or lacking.
<b>empty of</b>	Devoid of significance or point.
<b>free</b>	(of power or energy) disengaged or available. A <b>free</b> translation of the poem.
<b>free from</b>	Able to act at will; not hampered; not under compulsion or restraint.
<b>free of</b>	Not occupied or in use.
<b>innocent</b>	Not responsible for or directly involved in an event yet suffering its consequences. A street quite <b>innocent</b> of bookshops.
<b>lacking</b>	Not available or in short supply. <b>Lacking</b> in stamina.
<b>vacant of</b>	Void of thought or knowledge.
<b>void of</b>	Containing nothing.

## Usage Examples of "Devoid" as an adjective

- *The sentence was devoid of meaning.*
- *Lisa kept her voice devoid of emotion.*

## Associations of "Devoid" (30 Words)

<b>annul</b>	Declare (a marriage) to have had no legal existence. <i>The contract was <b>annulled</b>.</i>
<b>barren</b>	A barren tract or tracts of land. <i>Your life will be <b>barren</b>.</i>
<b>beggarly</b>	Poverty-stricken; very poor. <i>His circumstances were <b>beggarly</b>.</i>
<b>begging</b>	A solicitation for money or food (especially in the street by an apparently penniless person).
<b>desolate</b>	Leave someone who needs or counts on you; leave in the lurch. A <b>desolate</b> Pennine moor.
<b>destitute</b>	Not having. <i>Young recruits <b>destitute</b> of experience.</i>
<b>empty</b>	Leave behind empty move out of. <i>The room was <b>empty</b> of furniture.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>

<b>expired</b>	Having come to an end or become void after passage of a period of time. <i>An <b>expired</b> passport.</i>
<b>futilely</b>	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<b>homeless</b>	Physically or spiritually homeless or deprived of security. <i>A <b>homeless</b> was found murdered in Central Park.</i>
<b><u>hunger</u></b>	Feel or suffer hunger. <i>When he had fasted forty days and forty nights he afterwards <b>hungered</b>.</i>
<b>indigence</b>	A state of extreme poverty or destitution. <i>Their <b>indigence</b> appalled him.</i>
<b><u>indigent</u></b>	Poor enough to need help from others. <i>A charity for the relief of <b>indigent</b> artists.</i>
<b><u>invalid</u></b>	Injure permanently. <i>He was badly wounded and <b>invalided</b> out of the infantry.</i>
<b><u>needy</u></b>	Needy people collectively. <i>Those from <b>needy</b> backgrounds.</i>
<b>nihilism</b>	A revolutionary doctrine that advocates destruction of the social system for its own sake.
<b>nihilist</b>	Someone who rejects all theories of morality or religious belief. <i>It is impossible to argue against a <b>nihilist</b>.</i>
<b>nil</b>	Non-existent. <i>They beat us three <b>nil</b>.</i>
<b><u>none</u></b>	A canonical hour that is the ninth hour of the day counting from sunrise. <i>Thou shalt have <b>none</b> other gods before me.</i>
<b>nothing</b>	Having no prospect of progress; of no value. <i>A man who cared <b>nothing</b> for her.</i>
<b><u>null</u></b>	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <i><b>Null</b> and void.</i>
<b>pauper</b>	A very poor person. <i>He was buried in a <b>pauper</b> s grave.</i>
<b>penury</b>	The state of being very poor; extreme poverty. <i>He couldn t face another year of <b>penury</b>.</i>
<b>poor</b>	Characterized by or indicating poverty. <i>They lived in the <b>poor</b> section of town.</i>
<b><u>vacant</u></b>	Void of thought or knowledge. <i>A <b>vacant</b> stare.</i>
<b>vain</b>	Having no likelihood of fulfilment; empty. <i>Their flattery made him <b>vain</b>.</i>

**void**

Discharge or drain away (water, gases, etc).

*The Supreme court **voided** the statute.*

**zero**

Adjust an instrument to zero.

*The rifle had been **zeroed** at an elevation of 200.*

**zip**

Fasten the zip of a garment that someone is wearing.

*The runner **zipped** past us at breakneck speed.*
