committed	In or denoting a long-term emotional relationship. A committed Marxist.
constant	Unvarying in nature. A constant lover.
dedicated	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. A dedicated high speed rail link from the Channel Tunnel.
devout	Sincerely earnest. She was a devout Catholic.
faithful	True to the facts or the original. Faithful employees.
loyal	Steadfast in allegiance or duty. He remained loyal to the government.
staunch	Firm and dependable especially in loyalty. A staunch Catholic.
steadfast	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. A steadfast ally.
true	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. Pythagoras was the first true mathematician.



Usage Examples of "Devoted" as an adjective

- A life devoted to poetry.
- Devoted friends.
- A devoted husband and father.
- He was a devoted husband.

- *Leo was devoted to his job.*
- *Large sums devoted to the care of the poor.*
- *There is a museum devoted to her work.*



Associations of "Devoted" (30 Words)

<u>allegiance</u>	The loyalty that citizens owe to their country (or subjects to their sovereign. <i>Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear allegiance to the republic.</i>
allegiant	Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government. <i>It is impossible to be allegiant to two opposing forces.</i>
<u>chauvinism</u>	Exaggerated or aggressive patriotism. <i>We stand together to stamp out chauvinism and bigotry.</i>
chauvinistic	Feeling or displaying aggressive or exaggerated patriotism. <i>A chauvinistic aggressive brand of nationalism.</i>
dedicated	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>Dedicated teachers.</i>

dote	Lavish (someone) with affection or gifts. <i>Having an older brother who dotes you a lot is the best thing ever.</i>
dutiful	Willingly obedient out of a sense of duty and respect. <i>A dutiful citizen.</i>
epigone	An inferior imitator of some distinguished writer, artist, or musician. <i>The humdrum compositions of some of Beethoven s epigones.</i>
exclusively	To the exclusion of others; only. <i>He works for Mr Smith exclusively.</i>
<u>faithful</u>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>Employees who had notched up decades of faithful service.</i>
faithfully	In a loyal manner. <i>She translated the novel as faithfully as possible.</i>
follower	A person who takes an active interest in a particular activity. <i>He is a keen follower of football.</i>
henchman	A squire or page of honour to a person of rank. <i>The dictator s henchman.</i>
jingoism	An appeal intended to arouse patriotic emotions. <i>The popular jingoism that swept the lower middle classes.</i>
liege	A person holding a fief; a person who owes allegiance and service to a feudal lord. <i>The Scots obeyed him as their liege lord.</i>
<u>loyal</u>	Inspired by love for your country. <i>Loyal subjects.</i>
<u>minion</u>	A follower or underling of a powerful person, especially a servile or unimportant one. <i>He gets oppressed minions like me to fob them off.</i>
nationalist	Relating to nationalists or nationalism. <i>He was a staunch nationalist during his 22 years in power.</i>
<u>patriot</u>	An automated surface-to-air missile designed for early detection and interception of incoming missiles or aircraft. <i>A true patriot.</i>
patriotic	Having or expressing devotion to and vigorous support for one's country. <i>Today s game will be played before a fiercely patriotic crowd.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>The supporting cast includes old reliables like Mitchell.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>Did it solely for money.</i>

- staunch** (of a wall) of strong or firm construction.
*A **staunch** supporter of the anti nuclear lobby.*
- toady** A pufferfish.
*She imagined him **toadying** to his rich clients.*
- trusted** Worthy of trust or confidence.
*A **trusted** adviser.*
- trustful** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall.
*Great brown eye true and **trustful**.*
- trusting** Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust.
*A shy and **trusting** child.*
- trustworthy** Worthy of trust or belief.
*A **trustworthy** report.*
- underling** A person lower in status or rank.
*She was shouting orders at **underlings** between gulps of coffee.*
