<u>dedication</u>	The quality of being dedicated or committed to a task or purpose. A faintly engraved inscription or <b>dedication</b> .
devotedness	Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God. Many of the gentry were won by his undoubted sincerity and <b>devotedness</b> .
devoutness	Piety by virtue of being devout.
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness</i> in marriage.
fidelity	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
godliness	The quality of being devoutly religious; piety. A man of great <b>godliness</b> .
holiness	The quality of being holy. A life of <b>holiness</b> and total devotion to God.
loyalty	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. They felt no <b>loyalty</b> to a losing team.
piety	The quality of being religious or reverent. Acts of <b>piety</b> and charity.
religious observance	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religious worship	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religiousness	The quality of being extremely conscientious. <i>His care in observing the rules of good health amounted to a kind of religiousness</i> .
saintliness	The quality of resembling a saint. Her selfless behaviour borders on <b>saintliness</b> .
<u>sanctity</u>	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. The site of the tomb was a place of <b>sanctity</b> for the ancient Egyptians.
<u>spirituality</u>	Property or income owned by a church. The shift in priorities allows us to embrace our <b>spirituality</b> in a more profound way.
staunchness	Loyalty in the face of trouble and difficulty.



steadfastness	Steadfast resolution. <i>No side wins without <b>steadfastness</b> in the face of adversity.</i>
trueness	The quality of being loyal. I marveled at the <b>trueness</b> of his aim.
veneration	Great respect; reverence. <i>His respect for the law bordered on</i> <b>veneration</b> .
<u>worship</u>	The activity of worshipping. The church was opened for public <b>worship</b> .

<u>devote</u>	Give all or most of one's time or resources to (a person or activity. The hostile army was <b>devote</b> d with dire execrations to the gods of war.
<u>faith</u>	Complete trust or confidence in someone or something. <i>He cherished the <b>faith</b> of a good woman.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness</i> in marriage.
fealty	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. A property for which she did <b>fealty</b> .
fidelity	The quality of being faithful. The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b> .
holy	A sacred place of pilgrimage. I do not lead a <b>holy</b> life.
nory	I do not lead a <b>holy</b> life.



<u>honesty</u>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the <b>honesty</b> box.
loyalty	The quality of being loyal. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
oblation	The act of offering the bread and wine of the Eucharist. <b>Oblation</b> s for aid to the poor.
passionately	With passion. He argued <b>passionately</b> against war.
piety	Righteousness by virtue of being pious. Acts of <b>piety</b> and charity.
posterity	All of the offspring of a given progenitor. God offered Abraham a <b>posterity</b> like the stars of heaven.
sacrifice	Offer or kill as a religious sacrifice. <i>He <b>sacrifice</b>d his queen on the 34th move.</i>
<u>sanctity</u>	The quality of being holy. The site of the tomb was a place of <b>sanctity</b> for the ancient Egyptians.
<u>selfless</u>	Concerned more with the needs and wishes of others than with one's own; unselfish. An act of <b>selfless</b> devotion.
<u>sincerity</u>	The absence of pretence, deceit, or hypocrisy. They demanded some proof of my <b>sincerity</b> .
troth	A mutual promise to marry. A token of <b>troth</b> .
<u>undying</u>	(especially of an emotion) lasting forever. <i>His <b>undying</b> fame.</i>
votary	A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult. A <b>votary</b> of Aphrodite.
votive	An object offered in fulfilment of a vow, such as a candle used as a vigil light. <i>Votive</i> prayers.
wholehearted	With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion. Gave <b>wholehearted</b> support to her candidacy.
