constancy

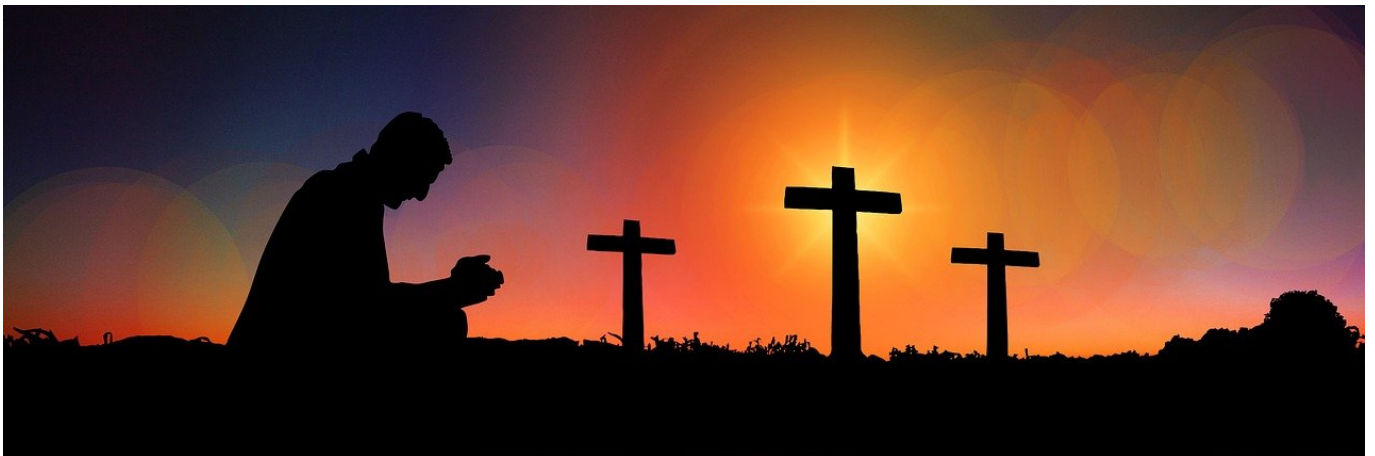
The tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation.
*She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of **constancy**.*

cultism

Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God.

<u>dedication</u>	The quality of being dedicated or committed to a task or purpose. <i>A faintly engraved inscription or dedication.</i>
devotedness	Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God. <i>Many of the gentry were won by his undoubted sincerity and devotedness.</i>
devoutness	Piety by virtue of being devout.
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fidelity	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
godliness	The quality of being devoutly religious; piety. <i>A man of great godliness.</i>
holiness	The quality of being holy. <i>A life of holiness and total devotion to God.</i>
loyalty	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>They felt no loyalty to a losing team.</i>
piety	The quality of being religious or reverent. <i>Acts of piety and charity.</i>
religious observance	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religious worship	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religiousness	The quality of being extremely conscientious. <i>His care in observing the rules of good health amounted to a kind of religiousness.</i>
saintliness	The quality of resembling a saint. <i>Her selfless behaviour borders on saintliness.</i>
<u>sanctity</u>	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of sanctity for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<u>spirituality</u>	Property or income owned by a church. <i>The shift in priorities allows us to embrace our spirituality in a more profound way.</i>
staunchness	Loyalty in the face of trouble and difficulty.

steadfastness	Steadfast resolution. <i>No side wins without steadfastness in the face of adversity.</i>
trueness	The quality of being loyal. <i>I marveled at the trueness of his aim.</i>
veneration	Great respect; reverence. <i>His respect for the law bordered on veneration.</i>
worship	The activity of worshipping. <i>The church was opened for public worship.</i>

<u>allegiance</u>	Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>A complex pattern of cross party allegiances.</i>
<u>commitment</u>	The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose. <i>His business commitments took him to London.</i>
committed	Associated in an exclusive sexual relationship. <i>A committed relationship.</i>
consecrate	Render holy by means of religious rites. <i>A life consecrated to science.</i>
<u>consign</u>	Send to an address. <i>He consigned three paintings to Sotheby s.</i>
dedicate	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>Today the President dedicates the new Second World War memorial in Washington.</i>
dedicated	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high or sacred purpose. <i>A team of dedicated doctors.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	The action of dedicating a church or other building. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome dedication to his wife.</i>
<u>devote</u>	Give all or most of one's time or resources to (a person or activity). <i>The hostile army was devoted with dire execrations to the gods of war.</i>
<u>faith</u>	Complete trust or confidence in someone or something. <i>He cherished the faith of a good woman.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fealty	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>A property for which she did fealty.</i>
fidelity	The quality of being faithful. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
holy	A sacred place of pilgrimage. <i>I do not lead a holy life.</i>

<u>honesty</u>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the honesty box.</i>
loyalty	The quality of being loyal. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
oblation	The act of offering the bread and wine of the Eucharist. <i>Oblations for aid to the poor.</i>
passionately	With passion. <i>He argued passionately against war.</i>
piety	Righteousness by virtue of being pious. <i>Acts of piety and charity.</i>
posterity	All of the offspring of a given progenitor. <i>God offered Abraham a posterity like the stars of heaven.</i>
sacrifice	Offer or kill as a religious sacrifice. <i>He sacrificed his queen on the 34th move.</i>
<u>sanctity</u>	The quality of being holy. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of sanctity for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<u>selfless</u>	Concerned more with the needs and wishes of others than with one's own; unselfish. <i>An act of selfless devotion.</i>
<u>sincerity</u>	The absence of pretence, deceit, or hypocrisy. <i>They demanded some proof of my sincerity.</i>
troth	A mutual promise to marry. <i>A token of troth.</i>
<u>undying</u>	(especially of an emotion) lasting forever. <i>His undying fame.</i>
votary	A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult. <i>A votary of Aphrodite.</i>
votive	An object offered in fulfilment of a vow, such as a candle used as a vigil light. <i>Votive prayers.</i>
wholehearted	With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion. <i>Gave wholehearted support to her candidacy.</i>
