- *Prayers or religious observances.*

Faithful support for a cause or political party or religion.  
*A strict **adherence** to etiquette.*

### [allegiance](#)

The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.  
*A complex pattern of cross party **allegiances**.*

### [commitment](#)

The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.  
*With so many business **commitments** time for recreation was limited.*

### **constancy**

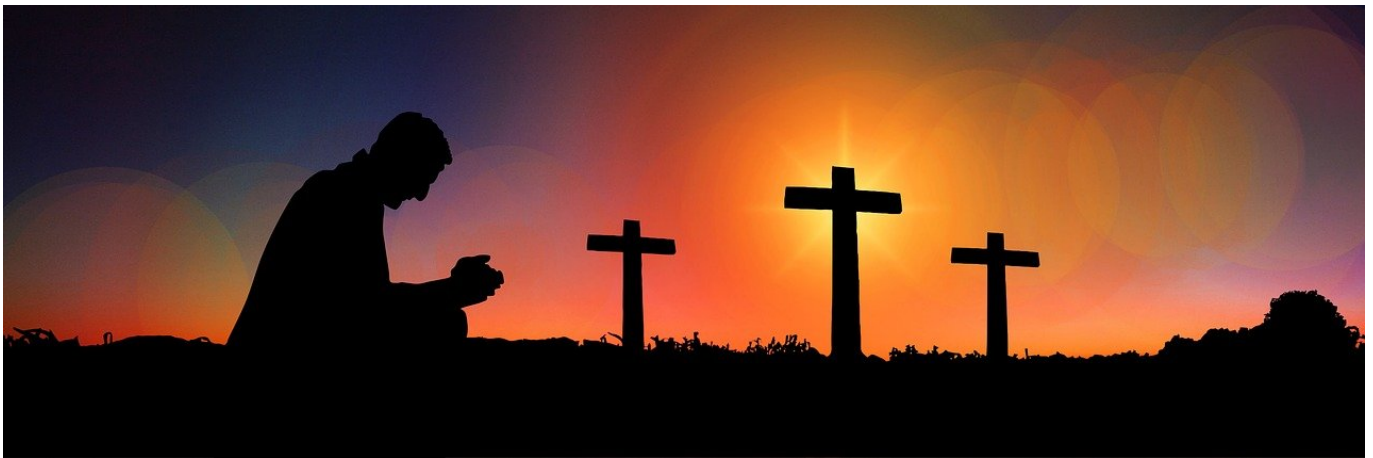
The tendency for perceived objects to give rise to very similar perceptual experiences in spite of wide variations in the conditions of observation.  
*She did not think much of married bliss yet she approved of **constancy**.*

### **cultism**

Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God.

<b><u>dedication</u></b>	The quality of being dedicated or committed to a task or purpose. <i>A faintly engraved inscription or <b>dedication</b>.</i>
<b>devotedness</b>	Religious zeal; the willingness to serve God. <i>Many of the gentry were won by his undoubted sincerity and <b>devotedness</b>.</i>
<b>devoutness</b>	Piety by virtue of being devout.
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	Faithfulness to a person, cause, or belief, demonstrated by continuing loyalty and support. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b>.</i>
<b>godliness</b>	The quality of being devoutly religious; piety. <i>A man of great <b>godliness</b>.</i>
<b>holiness</b>	The quality of being holy. <i>A life of <b>holiness</b> and total devotion to God.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>They felt no <b>loyalty</b> to a losing team.</i>
<b>piety</b>	The quality of being religious or reverent. <i>Acts of <b>piety</b> and charity.</i>
<b>religious observance</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
<b>religious worship</b>	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
<b>religiousness</b>	The quality of being extremely conscientious. <i>His care in observing the rules of good health amounted to a kind of <b>religiousness</b>.</i>
<b>saintliness</b>	The quality of resembling a saint. <i>Her selfless behaviour borders on <b>saintliness</b>.</i>
<b><u>sanctity</u></b>	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of <b>sanctity</b> for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<b><u>spirituality</u></b>	Property or income owned by a church. <i>The shift in priorities allows us to embrace our <b>spirituality</b> in a more profound way.</i>
<b>staunchness</b>	Loyalty in the face of trouble and difficulty.

<b>steadfastness</b>	Steadfast resolution. <i>No side wins without <b>steadfastness</b> in the face of adversity.</i>
<b>trueness</b>	The quality of being loyal. <i>I marveled at the <b>trueness</b> of his aim.</i>
<b>veneration</b>	Great respect; reverence. <i>His respect for the law bordered on <b>veneration</b>.</i>
<b>worship</b>	The activity of worshipping. <i>The church was opened for public <b>worship</b>.</i>

<b><u>allegiance</u></b>	Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>A complex pattern of cross party <b>allegiances</b>.</i>
<b><u>commitment</u></b>	The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose. <i>His business <b>commitments</b> took him to London.</i>
<b>committed</b>	Associated in an exclusive sexual relationship. <i>A <b>committed</b> relationship.</i>
<b>consecrate</b>	Render holy by means of religious rites. <i>A life <b>consecrated</b> to science.</i>
<b><u>consign</u></b>	Send to an address. <i>He <b>consigned</b> three paintings to Sotheby s.</i>
<b>dedicate</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>Today the President <b>dedicates</b> the new Second World War memorial in Washington.</i>
<b>dedicated</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high or sacred purpose. <i>A team of <b>dedicated</b> doctors.</i>
<b><u>dedication</u></b>	The action of dedicating a church or other building. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome <b>dedication</b> to his wife.</i>
<b><u>devote</u></b>	Give all or most of one's time or resources to (a person or activity). <i>The hostile army was <b>devoted</b> with dire execrations to the gods of war.</i>
<b><u>faith</u></b>	Complete trust or confidence in someone or something. <i>He cherished the <b>faith</b> of a good woman.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fealty</b>	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>A property for which she did <b>fealty</b>.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b>.</i>
<b>holy</b>	A sacred place of pilgrimage. <i>I do not lead a <b>holy</b> life.</i>

<b><u>honesty</u></b>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>I bought potatoes and tomatoes from the roadside stall putting 3 in the <b>honesty</b> box.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	The quality of being loyal. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b>oblation</b>	The act of offering the bread and wine of the Eucharist. <i><b>Oblations</b> for aid to the poor.</i>
<b>passionately</b>	With passion. <i>He argued <b>passionately</b> against war.</i>
<b>piety</b>	Righteousness by virtue of being pious. <i>Acts of <b>piety</b> and charity.</i>
<b>posterity</b>	All of the offspring of a given progenitor. <i>God offered Abraham a <b>posterity</b> like the stars of heaven.</i>
<b>sacrifice</b>	Offer or kill as a religious sacrifice. <i>He <b>sacrificed</b> his queen on the 34th move.</i>
<b><u>sanctity</u></b>	The quality of being holy. <i>The site of the tomb was a place of <b>sanctity</b> for the ancient Egyptians.</i>
<b><u>selfless</u></b>	Concerned more with the needs and wishes of others than with one's own; unselfish. <i>An act of <b>selfless</b> devotion.</i>
<b><u>sincerity</u></b>	The absence of pretence, deceit, or hypocrisy. <i>They demanded some proof of my <b>sincerity</b>.</i>
<b>troth</b>	A mutual promise to marry. <i>A token of <b>troth</b>.</i>
<b><u>undying</u></b>	(especially of an emotion) lasting forever. <i>His <b>undying</b> fame.</i>
<b>votary</b>	A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult. <i>A <b>votary</b> of Aphrodite.</i>
<b>votive</b>	An object offered in fulfilment of a vow, such as a candle used as a vigil light. <i><b>Votive</b> prayers.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion. <i>Gave <b>wholehearted</b> support to her candidacy.</i>
