- (of fire or a similar force) destroy completely.
- Eat greedily.
- Eat (food or prey) hungrily or quickly.
- Destroy completely.
- Read quickly and eagerly.
- Eat up completely, as with great appetite.
- Be totally absorbed by a powerful feeling.
- Eat immoderately.
- Enjoy avidly.

demolish Defeat soundly.

destroy Destroy completely damage irreparably.

Northants have the batting to **destroy** anyone.

devastate Overwhelm or overpower.

She was **devastate**d by the loss of Damian.

down Bring down or defeat an opponent.

Jones **down**ed the ball in the end zone.

eat greedily Use up (resources or materials.

eat heartily Take in solid food.

eat hungrily Take in food; used of animals only.

eat quickly Cause to deteriorate due to the action of water, air, or an acid.

eat up Eat a meal; take a meal.

Eat or swallow (something) whole.

engulf

The bright light engulfed him completely.

Wrap up, cover, or surround completely.

envelop Their assignment was to **envelop** the head of the enemy column and

gobbleMake a gurgling sound, characteristic of turkeys.

He **gobble**d up the rest of his sandwich.

gulpUtter or make a noise, as when swallowing too quickly.

guzzle down Drink greedily or as if with great thirst.

harrow Draw a harrow over land.

lay waste Put in a horizontal position.



look through Search or seek.

Read (something), typically in a thorough or careful way. peruse

Laura **peruse**d a Caravaggio.

Live like a pig in squalor. piq

They will carry out all trenching and **pig**ging.

Cause continual trouble or distress to. <u>plague</u>

He has been **plague**d by ill health.

Move by a rack and pinion. rack

He was **rack**ed with guilt.

Eat greedily. raven

The lions **raven**ed the bodies.

To look at critically or searchingly, or in minute detail. scrutinize

He **scrutinize**d his likeness in the mirror.

Apply oneself to study. study

He has been **study**ing mink for many years.

Enclose or envelop completely as if by swallowing.

swallow I **swallow**ed my anger and kept quiet.

Subject to torture. **torture**

Most of the victims had been brutally **torture**d.

Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. trouble

Sorry to **trouble** you.


wipe out Rub with a circular motion.

- He devoured three sandwiches.
- He devoured half of his burger in one bite.
- She spent her evenings devouring the classics.
- Fire had devoured our home.
- The hungry flames devoured the old house.

A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <u>digest</u>

A digest of their findings. diner

A restaurant that resembles a dining car.

The act of drinking alcoholic beverages to excess. drink

Let s drink to the New Year.

With eagerness; in an eager manner. eagerly

The news was **eagerly** awaited.

Eat a meal take a meal. eat

What s **eat**ing you.

A substance used to alter or enhance the taste of food or drink a flavouring. flavour

Various **flavour**s of firewall are evolving.

A substance that can be used or prepared for use as food. foodstuff

The people depend on sago starch as a basic **foodstuff**.

An excessively greedy eater. glutton

He s a **glutton** for adventure.

Eat hastily without proper chewing. gobble

This small department was **gobble**d up by the Ministry of Transport.

gourmand A person who enjoys eating and often eats too much.

An act of gulping food or drink. gulp

He **gulp**ed for help after choking on a big piece of meat.

Place (seeds) in water in order for them to absorb it. imbibe

If one does not **imbibe** the culture one cannot succeed.

Serve oneself to, or consume regularly. ingest

They **ingest** oxygen from the air.

A chocolate with a liqueur filling. liqueur

An Italian almond flavoured liqueur.

Sever or remove by pinching or snipping.

nip

Nip off the flowers.



overeat Overeat or eat immodestly make a pig of oneself.

If your friends **overeat** you re more likely to **overeat** too.

quaff Drink (something, especially an alcoholic drink) heartily.

Porter is a dark malty **quaff**.

An act of quenching a very hot substance.

quench quenching a very Quench steel.

ravening (of a ferocious wild animal) extremely hungry and hunting for prey.

They turned on each other like **ravening** wolves.

Have flavor; taste of something.

Savor the soup.

Drink in sips.

I sat **sip**ping coffee.

slake Satisfy (desires.

Slake the lime within a day or two of purchase.

Eat noisily.

She slurped her coffee.

sup A sip of liquid.

She **sup**ped up her soup delightedly.

swallow An amount of something swallowed in one action.

He seemed ready to **swallow** any insult.

tang A characteristic quality.

A full **tang** is used for strength.

Feel the need to drink.

thirst

A few could drink while many thirsted.
