- Destroy completely.
- Read quickly and eagerly.
- Eat up completely, as with great appetite.
- Be totally absorbed by a powerful feeling.
- Eat immoderately.
- Enjoy avidly.

<u>annihilate</u>	Defeat utterly. A crusade to <b>annihilate</b> evil.
bedevil	(of a person) torment or harass. He <b>bedevil</b> led them with petty practical jokes.
<u>bolt</u>	Secure or lock with a bolt. Don t <b>bolt</b> your food.
bolt down	Swallow hastily.
consume	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. The fire <b>consume</b> d the building.
cram down	Study intensively, as before an exam.




<u>demolish</u>	Defeat soundly. Brown was busy <b>demolish</b> ing a sausage roll.
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. Northants have the batting to <b>destroy</b> anyone.
devastate	Overwhelm or overpower. She was <b>devastate</b> d by the loss of Damian.
<u>down</u>	Bring down or defeat an opponent. Jones <b>down</b> ed the ball in the end zone.
eat greedily	Use up (resources or materials.
eat heartily	Take in solid food.
eat hungrily	Take in food; used of animals only.
eat quickly	Cause to deteriorate due to the action of water, air, or an acid.
eat up	Eat a meal; take a meal.
<u>engulf</u>	Eat or swallow (something) whole. The bright light <b>engulf</b> ed him completely.
envelop	Wrap up, cover, or surround completely. Their assignment was to <b>envelop</b> the head of the enemy column and destroy it.
feast on	Gratify.
go through	Go through in search of something search through someone s belongings in an unauthorized way.
gobble	Make a gurgling sound, characteristic of turkeys. <i>He <b>gobble</b>d up the rest of his sandwich.</i>
gobble down	Make a gurgling sound, characteristic of turkeys.
gobble up	Make a gurgling sound, characteristic of turkeys.
gorge oneself on	Overeat or eat immodestly; make a pig of oneself.
gulp	Utter or make a noise, as when swallowing too quickly. <i>The men <b>gulp</b>ed down their beers.</i>
gulp down	To swallow hurriedly or greedily or in one draught.
guttle	Eat greedily.
guzzle	Eat or drink (something) greedily. <i>This car <b>guzzle</b>s petrol.</i>
guzzle down	Drink greedily or as if with great thirst.
harrow	Draw a harrow over land. Todd could take it whereas I m <b>harrow</b> ed by it.
lay waste	Put in a horizontal position.



look through	Search or seek.
peruse	Read (something), typically in a thorough or careful way. Laura <b>peruse</b> d a Caravaggio.
pig	Live like a pig in squalor. They will carry out all trenching and <b>pig</b> ging.
<u>plague</u>	Cause continual trouble or distress to. He has been <b>plague</b> d by ill health.
rack	Move by a rack and pinion. He was <b>rack</b> ed with guilt.
raven	Eat greedily. The lions <b>raven</b> ed the bodies.
<u>scrutinize</u>	To look at critically or searchingly, or in minute detail. <i>He</i> <b>scrutinize</b> <i>d</i> his likeness in the mirror.
study	Apply oneself to study. He has been <b>study</b> ing mink for many years.
swallow	Enclose or envelop completely as if by swallowing. I <b>swallow</b> ed my anger and kept quiet.
<u>torture</u>	Subject to torture. Most of the victims had been brutally <b>torture</b> d.
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. Sorry to <b>trouble</b> you.
wipe out	Rub with a circular motion.
wolf	Eat hastily. The teenager <b>wolf</b> ed down the pizza.
wolf down	Eat hastily.

<u>beverage</u>	(chiefly in commercial use) a drink other than water. May I take your <b>beverage</b> order.
<u>buffet</u>	A meal set out on a buffet at which guests help themselves. A cold <b>buffet</b> lunch.
chomp	The act of gripping or chewing off with the teeth and jaws. The boy <b>chomp</b> ed his sandwich.
<u>digest</u>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. A <b>digest</b> of their findings.
diner	A restaurant that resembles a dining car.
drink	The act of drinking alcoholic beverages to excess. Let s <b>drink</b> to the New Year.
<u>eagerly</u>	With eagerness; in an eager manner. The news was <b>eagerly</b> awaited.
eat	Eat a meal take a meal. What s <b>eat</b> ing you.
flavour	A substance used to alter or enhance the taste of food or drink a flavouring. <i>Various flavours of firewall are evolving.</i>
foodstuff	A substance that can be used or prepared for use as food. The people depend on sago starch as a basic <b>foodstuff</b> .
glutton	An excessively greedy eater. <i>He s a <b>glutton</b> for adventure.</i>
gobble	Eat hastily without proper chewing. This small department was <b>gobble</b> d up by the Ministry of Transport.
gourmand	A person who enjoys eating and often eats too much.
gulp	An act of gulping food or drink. He <b>gulp</b> ed for help after choking on a big piece of meat.
imbibe	Place (seeds) in water in order for them to absorb it. If one does not <b>imbibe</b> the culture one cannot succeed.
<u>ingest</u>	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly. They <b>ingest</b> oxygen from the air.
liqueur	A chocolate with a liqueur filling. An Italian almond flavoured <b>liqueur</b> .
nip	Sever or remove by pinching or snipping. <i>Nip off the flowers.</i>



overeat	Overeat or eat immodestly make a pig of oneself. If your friends <b>overeat</b> you re more likely to <b>overeat</b> too.
quaff	Drink (something, especially an alcoholic drink) heartily. Porter is a dark malty <b>quaff</b> .
<u>quench</u>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. <i>Quench steel.</i>
ravening	(of a ferocious wild animal) extremely hungry and hunting for prey. They turned on each other like <b>ravening</b> wolves.
<u>savor</u>	Have flavor; taste of something. <i>Savor</i> the soup.
<u>sip</u>	Drink in sips. I sat <b>sip</b> ping coffee.
slake	Satisfy (desires. <b>Slake</b> the lime within a day or two of purchase.
slurp	Eat noisily. She <b>slurp</b> ed her coffee.
sup	A sip of liquid. She <b>sup</b> ped up her soup delightedly.
swallow	An amount of something swallowed in one action. <i>He seemed ready to <b>swallow</b> any insult.</i>
tang	A characteristic quality. A full <b>tang</b> is used for strength.
thirst	Feel the need to drink. A few could drink while many <b>thirst</b> ed.
