- Eating food or prey hungrily or quickly.
- (of fire or a similar force) destructively consuming.






Synonyms of "Devouring" as an adjective (3 Words)

<u>avid</u>	Ardently or excessively desirous. An avid ambition to succeed.
esurient	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. Fell into the esurient embrance of a predatory enemy.
greedy	Having an excessive desire or appetite for food. <i>Greedy</i> for money and power.






Usage Examples of "Devouring" as an adjective

Associations of "Devouring" (30 Words)

<u>beverage</u>	Any liquid suitable for drinking. May I take your beverage order.
<u>buffet</u>	A meal set out on a buffet at which guests help themselves. <i>A cold buffet lunch.</i>
chomp	The act of gripping or chewing off with the teeth and jaws. <i>She chomped on a roll.</i>
<u>digest</u>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. The government digest ed the entire law into a code.
diner	A restaurant that resembles a dining car.



drink	Drink excessive amounts of alcohol be an alcoholic. The mother drink s in every word of her son on the stage.
<u>eagerly</u>	With eagerness; in an eager manner. Original illustrations are eagerly sought by collectors.
eat	Eat a meal take a meal. These make gr eat party eat s.
flavour	A substance used to alter or enhance the taste of food or drink a flavouring. <i>The faint exasperation that had flavour</i> ed her tone.
foodstuff	A substance that can be used or prepared for use as food. <i>Rationing of staple foodstuffs was introduced</i> .
glutton	An excessively greedy eater. <i>He s a glutton for adventure.</i>
gobble	Eat (something) hurriedly and noisily. <i>He gobbled up the rest of his sandwich.</i>
gourmand	A person who enjoys eating and often eats too much.
gulp	An act of gulping food or drink. <i>He finished it at a single gulp.</i>
imbibe	Take (gas, light or heat) into a solution. If one does not imbibe the culture one cannot succeed.
<u>ingest</u>	Take up mentally. Lead will poison anyone if enough is ingest ed.
liqueur	A chocolate with a liqueur filling. A box of liqueur s.
nip	Sever or remove by pinching or snipping. I m just nip ping down to the Post Office.
overeat	Overeat or eat immodestly make a pig of oneself. If your friends overeat you re more likely to overeat too.
quaff	Drink (something, especially an alcoholic drink) heartily. Porter is a dark malty quaff .
<u>quench</u>	An act of quenching a very hot substance. He only pursued her to quench an aching need.
ravening	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>Ravening</i> wolves.
<u>savor</u>	Derive or receive pleasure from; get enjoyment from; take pleasure in. <i>Savor</i> the soup.
<u>sip</u>	Drink in sips. She took a sip of the red wine.



slake	Satisfy (thirst. Restaurants worked to slake the Italian obsession with food.
slurp	A mouthful of liquid drunk with a loud sucking sound. He slurp ed noisily from a wine glass.
sup	Take solid or liquid food into the mouth a little at a time either by drinking or by eating with a spoon. The latest sup from those blokes at the brewery.
swallow	The act of swallowing. He downed his drink in one swallow .
tang	Any of various kelps especially of the genus Laminaria. The clean salty tang of the sea.
thirst	A feeling of needing or wanting to drink something. A thirst for knowledge.
