ability	The quality of being able to perform; a quality that permits or facilitates achievement or accomplishment. <i>A man of exceptional ability.</i>
accomplishment	The action of accomplishing something. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable accomplishment.</i>
acuity	Sharpness of vision; the visual ability to resolve fine detail (usually measured by a Snellen chart). <i>Visual acuity.</i>
acumen	Shrewdness shown by keen insight. <i>She hides a shrewd business acumen.</i>
acuteness	The quality of having a sharp edge or point. <i>He argued with great acuteness.</i>
adeptness	The quality of being sufficient for the end in view. <i>His quick adeptness was a product of good design.</i>

adroitness	Cleverness or skill. <i>He lacks political adroitness.</i>
agility	Ability to think and understand quickly. <i>Though he was without formal training as dancer or athlete his physical agility was inexhaustible.</i>
artistry	A superior skill that you can learn by study and practice and observation. <i>The artistry of the pianist.</i>
astuteness	Intelligence manifested by being astute (as in business dealings).
capability	An aptitude that may be developed. <i>He had an intuitive capability of bringing the best out in people.</i>
craft	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>The artist learned his craft in Holland.</i>
deftness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
delicacy	Lack of physical strength. <i>I have to treat this matter with the utmost delicacy.</i>
efficiency	An action designed to achieve efficiency. <i>Greater energy efficiency.</i>
effortlessness	The quality of requiring little effort. <i>Such effortlessness is achieved only after hours of practice.</i>
experience	The knowledge or skill acquired by a period of practical experience of something especially that gained in a particular profession. <i>He recalled the experience vividly.</i>
expertise	Skillfulness by virtue of possessing special knowledge. <i>Technical expertise.</i>
facility	A place, amenity, or piece of equipment provided for a particular purpose. <i>The pianist played with great facility.</i>
felicity	The ability to find appropriate expression for one's thoughts. <i>He exposed the kernel of the matter with his customary elegance and felicity.</i>
finesse	Impressive delicacy and skill. <i>Clients want advice and action that calls for considerable finesse.</i>
handiness	The quality of being at hand when needed. <i>He can do any sort of work requiring handiness and dexterity.</i>
intelligence	The collection of information of military or political value. <i>An eminent man of great intelligence.</i>

knack	A tendency to do something. <i>He had a knack for communicating.</i>
manual dexterity	A prescribed drill in handling a rifle.
<u>mastery</u>	The act of mastering or subordinating someone. <i>She played with some mastery.</i>
nimbleness	Intelligence as revealed by quickness and alertness of mind. <i>Nimbleness of wit and imagination.</i>
proficiency	A high degree of skill; expertise. <i>Practice greatly improves proficiency.</i>
sharpness	Harshness of manner. <i>The sharpness of strange spices.</i>
shrewdness	A group of apes. <i>He is a man of some tactical shrewdness.</i>
skill	A particular ability. <i>The skills of cookery.</i>
sleight	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Except by sleight of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
sleight of hand	Adroitness in using the hands.
slickness	A slippery smoothness. <i>He could feel the slickness of the tiller.</i>
<u>talent</u>	A person who possesses unusual innate ability in some field or activity. <i>She displayed a talent for garden design.</i>

deftness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<u>discreet</u>	Intentionally unobtrusive. <i>A discreet cough.</i>
<u>faculty</u>	A group of university departments concerned with a major division of knowledge. <i>His faculty for taking the initiative.</i>
finesse	Bring about or deal with (something) by using great delicacy and skill. <i>Orchestral playing of great finesse.</i>
<u>flair</u>	A shape that spreads outward. <i>None of us had much artistic flair.</i>
handmade	Made by hand or a hand process. <i>Delicate handmade baby dresses.</i>
<u>hone</u>	Sharpen with a hone. <i>The detectives honed in on the suspect.</i>
ingenuity	The quality of being clever, original, and inventive. <i>A plot of great ingenuity.</i>
knack	A tendency to do something. <i>He had a special knack for getting into trouble.</i>
<u>manual</u>	A vehicle with manual transmission. Manual laborer.
skill	Train (a worker) to do a particular task. <i>Training firms are already seeing a boost from companies looking to skill employees in cloud technologies.</i>
sleight	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Except by sleight of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>

tact	Consideration in dealing with others and avoiding giving offense. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with tact and consideration.</i>
talent	People possessing natural aptitude or skill. <i>A mighty steed bought from a Thessalian merchant for thirteen talents.</i>
talented	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A talented young musician.</i>
technique	A way of carrying out a particular task, especially the execution or performance of an artistic work or a scientific procedure. <i>He has excellent technique.</i>
toolmaker	A maker of tools, especially a person who makes and maintains tools for use in a manufacturing process.
wise	United States Jewish leader (born in Hungary) (1874-1949). <i>A wise and perceptive comment.</i>
workmanlike	Showing efficient competence but not inspiration. <i>A steady workmanlike approach.</i>
workmanship	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor workmanship.</i>
