Definitions of "Dichotomy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “dichotomy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Repeated branching into two equal parts.*
- *Being twofold; a classification into two opposed parts or subclasses.*
- *A division or contrast between two things that are or are represented as being opposed or entirely different.*



Synonyms of "Dichotomy" as a noun (7 Words)

<u>chasm</u>	A deep opening in the earth's surface. <i>The chasm between rich and poor.</i>
division	Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The new clause was agreed without a division.</i>
<u>divorce</u>	The legal dissolution of a marriage by a court or other competent body. <i>My divorce comes through in two weeks.</i>
<u>duality</u>	Being twofold; a classification into two opposed parts or subclasses. <i>This duality of purpose was discernible in the appointments.</i>
gulf	A large difference or division between two people or groups, or between viewpoints, concepts, or situations. <i>The widening gulf between the rich and the poor.</i>
<u>separation</u>	The action or state of moving or being moved apart. <i>He hid in the separation between walls.</i>
<u>split</u>	A thing that is divided or split. <i>Light squeezed through a small split in the curtain.</i>

apportion

Give out as one's portion or share.

*They did not **apportion** blame or liability to any one individual.*

asunder

Widely separated especially in space.

*As wide **asunder** as pole from pole.*

bifurcate

Divided into two branches or forks.

*A **bifurcate** tree.*

cleavage	<p>The breaking of a chemical bond in a molecule resulting in smaller molecules.</p> <p>There was a cleavage between the liberal and conservative members.</p>
cloven	(used of hooves) split, divided.
dichotomous	<p>Exhibiting or characterized by dichotomy.</p> <p>A dichotomous view of the world.</p>
divergent	<p>(of thought) using a variety of premises, especially unfamiliar premises, as bases for inference, and avoiding common limiting assumptions in making deductions.</p> <p>A divergent opinion.</p>
divide	<p>A serious disagreement between two groups of people (typically producing tension or hostility).</p> <p>The last years of her life were divided between Bermuda and Paris.</p>
divided	<p>Having a median strip or island between lanes of traffic moving in opposite directions.</p> <p>The deputy came back carrying a divided metal plate and a cup.</p>
division	<p>A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category.</p> <p>The plant can also be easily increased by division in autumn.</p>
fracture	<p>Become fractured.</p> <p>The tibia fractured from the blow of the iron pipe.</p>
fragmentation	<p>(computer science) the condition of a file that is broken up and stored in many different locations on a magnetic disk.</p> <p>Fragmentation slows system performance because it takes extra time to locate and assemble the parts of the fragmented file.</p>
isolation	<p>The act of isolating something; setting something apart from others.</p> <p>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</p>
moiety	<p>A distinct part of a large molecule.</p> <p>The enzyme removes the sulphate moiety.</p>
part	<p>Force take or pull apart.</p> <p>The written part of the exam.</p>
partition	<p>Divide a room into smaller rooms or areas by erecting partitions.</p> <p>Partition chromatography.</p>
piece	<p>Assemble something from parts or pieces.</p> <p>He needed a piece of granite.</p>

<u>portion</u>	Money or property brought by a woman to her husband at marriage. <i>He could repeat large portions of Shakespeare.</i>
rive	Split or crack (wood or stone). <i>The party was riven by disagreements over Europe.</i>
schism	Division of a group into opposing factions. <i>Another schism like that and they will wind up in bankruptcy.</i>
scission	A division or split between people or parties; a schism. <i>This bacteriophage catalyses scission of DNA strands.</i>
<u>section</u>	Divide into sections. <i>The history of this work is discussed in the next section.</i>
segmentation	(embryology) the repeated division of a fertilised ovum. <i>Segmentation of myocardial cells.</i>
segregation	A social system that provides separate facilities for minority groups. <i>An official policy of racial segregation.</i>
separated	Separated at the joint. <i>Thought of herself as alone and separated from the others.</i>
<u>separation</u>	The cessation of cohabitation of man and wife (either by mutual agreement or under a court order). <i>The separation of wheat from chaff.</i>
<u>simplistic</u>	Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are. <i>A simplistic theory of the universe.</i>
<u>split</u>	A single thickness of split hide. <i>I told him I wouldn't split on him.</i>
