- *A division or contrast between two things that are or are represented as being opposed or entirely different.*

- chasm** A deep opening in the earth's surface.
*The **chasm** between rich and poor.*
- division** Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category.
*The new clause was agreed without a **division**.*
- divorce** The legal dissolution of a marriage by a court or other competent body.
*My **divorce** comes through in two weeks.*
- duality** Being twofold; a classification into two opposed parts or subclasses.
*This **duality** of purpose was discernible in the appointments.*
- gulf** A large difference or division between two people or groups, or between viewpoints, concepts, or situations.
*The widening **gulf** between the rich and the poor.*
- separation** The action or state of moving or being moved apart.
*He hid in the **separation** between walls.*
- split** A thing that is divided or split.
*Light squeezed through a small **split** in the curtain.*

- *The dichotomy between eastern and western culture.*
- *A rigid dichotomy between science and mysticism.*

Associations of "Dichotomy" (30 Words)

apportion

Give out as one's portion or share.

*They did not **apportion** blame or liability to any one individual.*

asunder

Widely separated especially in space.

*As wide **asunder** as pole from pole.*

bifurcate

Divided into two branches or forks.

*A **bifurcate** tree.*

binary	A pre compiled pre linked program that is ready to run under a given operating system a binary for one operating system will not run on a different operating system. <i>A binary star is a system in which two stars revolve around each other.</i>
cleavage	The breaking of a chemical bond in a molecule resulting in smaller molecules. <i>There was a cleavage between the liberal and conservative members.</i>
cloven	(used of hooves) split, divided.
dichotomous	Exhibiting or characterized by dichotomy. <i>A dichotomous view of the world.</i>
divergent	(of thought) using a variety of premises, especially unfamiliar premises, as bases for inference, and avoiding common limiting assumptions in making deductions. <i>A divergent opinion.</i>
divide	A serious disagreement between two groups of people (typically producing tension or hostility). <i>The last years of her life were divided between Bermuda and Paris.</i>
divided	Having a median strip or island between lanes of traffic moving in opposite directions. <i>The deputy came back carrying a divided metal plate and a cup.</i>
division	A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The plant can also be easily increased by division in autumn.</i>
fracture	Become fractured. <i>The tibia fractured from the blow of the iron pipe.</i>
fragmentation	(computer science) the condition of a file that is broken up and stored in many different locations on a magnetic disk. <i>Fragmentation slows system performance because it takes extra time to locate and assemble the parts of the fragmented file.</i>
isolation	The act of isolating something; setting something apart from others. <i>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
moiety	A distinct part of a large molecule. <i>The enzyme removes the sulphate moiety.</i>
part	Force take or pull apart. <i>The written part of the exam.</i>
partition	Divide a room into smaller rooms or areas by erecting partitions. <i>Partition chromatography.</i>
piece	Assemble something from parts or pieces. <i>He needed a piece of granite.</i>

portion	Money or property brought by a woman to her husband at marriage. <i>He could repeat large portions of Shakespeare.</i>
rive	Split or crack (wood or stone). <i>The party was riven by disagreements over Europe.</i>
schism	Division of a group into opposing factions. <i>Another schism like that and they will wind up in bankruptcy.</i>
scission	A division or split between people or parties; a schism. <i>This bacteriophage catalyses scission of DNA strands.</i>
section	Divide into sections. <i>The history of this work is discussed in the next section.</i>
segmentation	(embryology) the repeated division of a fertilised ovum. <i>Segmentation of myocardial cells.</i>
segregation	A social system that provides separate facilities for minority groups. <i>An official policy of racial segregation.</i>
separated	Separated at the joint. <i>Thought of herself as alone and separated from the others.</i>
separation	The cessation of cohabitation of man and wife (either by mutual agreement or under a court order). <i>The separation of wheat from chaff.</i>
simplistic	Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are. <i>A simplistic theory of the universe.</i>
split	A single thickness of split hide. <i>I told him I wouldn't split on him.</i>
