### Definitions of "Diffuse" as a verb

- *Move outward.*
- *Spread over a wide area or between a large number of people.*
- *Intermingle with another substance by movement, typically in a specified direction or at specified speed.*
- *Cause to become widely known.*
- *Spread or diffuse through.*
- *Cause (light) to spread evenly to reduce glare and harsh shadows.*



## Synonyms of "Diffuse" as a verb (21 Words)

<b>broadcast</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>The second method is to <b>broadcast</b> the seeds together with not more than 1 kg to the acre of rapeseed.</i>
<b>circularise</b>	Canvass by distributing letters.
<b>circularize</b>	Make (a stretch of DNA) into a circular loop. <i>They <b>circularize</b> prospective purchasers at regular intervals.</i>
<u><a href="#">circulate</a></u>	Move continuously or freely through a closed system or area. <i>The air here does not <b>circulate</b>.</i>

<b>imbue</b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably <b>imbued</b> with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
<b>interpenetrate</b>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The two concepts <b>interpenetrate</b> in interesting ways.</i>
<b>pass around</b>	Place into the hands or custody of.
<u><a href="#">permeate</a></u>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The aroma of soup <b>permeated</b> the air.</i>
<u><a href="#">pervade</a></u>	(especially of a smell) spread through and be perceived in every part of. <i>The sense of crisis which <b>pervaded</b> Europe in the 1930s.</i>
<u><a href="#">propagate</a></u>	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>Sound and light <b>propagate</b> in this medium.</i>
<b>riddle</b>	Speak in or pose riddles. <i><b>Riddle</b> me a <b>riddle</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">scatter</a></u>	Sow by scattering. <i>The light is <b>scattered</b> as it strikes particles suspended in the air.</i>
<b>send out</b>	Cause to go somewhere.
<b>spread</b>	Spread across or over. <i>The rumor <b>spread</b>.</i>
<b>spread around</b>	Spread across or over.

**spread out**      Spread out or open from a closed or folded state.

<b>circumlocutory</b>	Using many words where fewer would do, especially in a deliberate attempt to be vague or evasive; long-winded. <i>Had a preference for circumlocutious or <b>circumlocutory</b> rather than forthright expression.</i>
<b>diffused</b>	Transmitted from a broad light source or reflected. <i><b>Diffused</b> light.</i>
<b>digressive</b>	Of superficial relevance if any. <i>A <b>digressive</b> account.</i>

<b>meandering</b>	Of a path e.g. <i>A florid and rather <b>meandering</b> melody.</i>
<b>overlong</b>	Too long. <i>An <b>overlong</b> sermon.</i>
<b>periphrastic</b>	(of a case or tense) formed by a combination of words rather than by inflection (such as did go and of the people rather than went and the people's). <i>A <b>periphrastic</b> study in a worn out poetical fashion Leaving one still with the intolerable wrestle With words and meanings.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	(of speech or writing) using or containing too many words; tediously lengthy. <i>Editing a <b>prolix</b> manuscript.</i>
<b>protracted</b>	Relatively long in duration tediously protracted. <i><b>Protracted</b> negotiations.</i>
<b><u>rambling</u></b>	(of writing or speech) lengthy and confused or inconsequential. <i>A <b>rambling</b> six hour speech.</i>
<b><u>roundabout</u></b>	Not following a short direct route; circuitous. <i>A <b>roundabout</b> paragraph.</i>

<b>scattered</b>	Occurring or found at intervals or various locations rather than all together. <i><b>Scattered</b> showers.</i>
<b>soft</b>	Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe. <i>He must be going <b>soft</b> in the head.</i>
<b>spread out</b>	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent.
<b>verbose</b>	Using or containing too many words. <i>Much academic language is obscure and <b>verbose</b>.</i>
<b>wandering</b>	Migratory. <i>A <b>wandering</b> preacher.</i>
<b>wordy</b>	Consisting of words. <i>Proceedings were delayed by <b>wordy</b> disputes.</i>

<b>dissipate</b>	(with reference to a feeling or emotion) disappear or cause to disappear. <i>He inherited but then <b>dissipated</b> his father s fortune.</i>
<u><b>dissolution</b></u>	Disintegration; decomposition. <i>An advanced state of <b>dissolution</b>.</i>
<b>diversify</b>	Make (more) diverse. <i>We re confident that the new owners will grow and <b>diversify</b> the company globally.</i>
<b>effluence</b>	The process of flowing out.
<b>imbue</b>	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably <b>imbued</b> with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
<b>intersperse</b>	Introduce one's writing or speech with certain expressions. <i><b>Intersperse</b> exclamation marks in the text.</i>
<b>perfuse</b>	Cause to spread or flush or flood through, over, or across. <i><b>Perfuse</b> a liver with a salt solution.</i>
<u><b>permeate</b></u>	Pass through. <i>Water <b>permeates</b> sand easily.</i>
<u><b>pervade</b></u>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The sense of crisis which <b>pervaded</b> Europe in the 1930s.</i>

<b>pervasiveness</b>	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. <i>The <b>pervasiveness</b> of the odor of cabbage in tenement hallways.</i>
<b>proliferate</b>	Grow rapidly. <i>Electromagnetic radiation can only <b>proliferate</b> cancers already present.</i>
<b>proliferation</b>	A rapid increase in number (especially a rapid increase in the number of deadly weapons). <i>Stress levels are high forcing upon them a <b>proliferation</b> of ailments.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	(of speech or writing) using or containing too many words; tediously lengthy. <i>He found the narrative too <b>prolix</b> and discursive.</i>
<b>scatter</b>	The scattering of light other electromagnetic radiation or particles. <i><b>Scatter</b> cards across the table.</i>
<b>scattered</b>	Occurring or distributed over widely spaced and irregular intervals in time or space. <i>Changes in the angular distribution of <b>scattered</b> light.</i>
<b>spray</b>	Be discharged in sprays of liquid. <i>Water <b>sprayed</b> all over the floor.</i>
<b>spread</b>	The fact or process of spreading over an area. <i>The male s antlers can attain a <b>spread</b> of six feet.</i>
