- The dissemination of elements of culture to another region or people.
- The act of dispersing or diffusing something.
- The spreading of something more widely.
- The process in which there is movement of a substance from an area of high concentration of that substance to an area of lower concentration.
- The action of spreading the light from a light source evenly to reduce glare and harsh shadows.
- The property of being diffused or dispersed.


