archaeologist	An anthropologist who studies prehistoric people and their culture. <i>Chinese archaeologists uncovered life sized terracotta statues.</i>
artifact	A man-made object taken as a whole.
ax	Chop or split with an ax. The NSF <b>ax</b> ed the research program and stopped funding it.
burial	The action or practice of burying a dead body. <i>His remains were shipped home for <b>burial</b>.</i>
<u>burrow</u>	Move through by or as by digging. Worms that <b>burrow</b> through dead wood.
<u>bury</u>	Place (a dead body) in the earth or in a tomb, usually with funeral rites. I tried to <b>bury</b> these unpleasant memories.
colliery	A coal mine and the buildings and equipment associated with it.



<u>delve</u>	Research or make painstaking inquiries into something. The approach from the surface above had awed her so hugely <b>delve</b> d were the tunnels.
disinter	Dig up for reburial or for medical investigation; of dead bodies. <i>He has <b>disinter</b>red an important collection of writings.</i>
dug	An udder or breast or teat.
excavate	Remove the inner part or the core of. <i>Excavate</i> a cavity.
excavation	A site that is being or has been excavated. There s an interesting <b>excavation</b> going on near Princeton.
exhume	Expose (a land surface) that was formerly buried. The bodies were <b>exhume</b> d on the orders of a judge.
fossil	Characteristic of a fossil. Sites rich in <b>fossil</b> s.
hibernate	Be in an inactive or dormant state. Bears must eat a lot of food before they <b>hibernate</b> in their caves.
inhume	Place in a grave or tomb. No hand his bones shall gather or <b>inhume</b> .
inter	Place (a corpse) in a grave or tomb, typically with funeral rites. <i>He was <b>inter</b>red with the military honours due to him.</i>
mallet	A long-handled wooden stick with a head like a hammer, used for hitting a croquet or polo ball.
<u>mine</u>	Excavation in the earth from which ores and minerals are extracted. <i>Mine</i> ores and metals.
<u>pit</u>	A person s armpit. <i>Pit</i> plums and cherries.
plow	Move in a way resembling that of a plow cutting into or going through the soil. Farmer Jones <b>plow</b> ed his east field last week.
<u>quarry</u>	Extract stone or other materials from a quarry. <i>Quarry marble.</i>
sarcophagus	A stone coffin, typically adorned with a sculpture or inscription and associated with the ancient civilizations of Egypt, Rome, and Greece.
<u>scoop</u>	Pick up and move something with a scoop. What s the <b>scoop</b> old timer.
sepulcher	A chamber that is used as a grave.



shovel	A fire iron consisting of a small shovel used to scoop coals or ashes in a fireplace. An area of turf had been dug up by vandals using a pick and <b>shovel</b> .
<u>tomb</u>	A place for the burial of a corpse especially beneath the ground and marked by a tombstone. <i>None escape the <b>tomb</b></i> .
underground	An underground railway especially the one in London. <i>The late sixties <b>underground</b>.</i>
<u>unearth</u>	Drive (an animal, especially a fox) out of a hole or burrow. Workmen <b>unearth</b> ed an ancient artillery shell.
warren	An overcrowded residential area. A warren of narrow aas lit streets.
