assiduity	Constant or close attention to what one is doing. The <b>assiduity</b> with which he could wear down his opponents.
assiduousness	Great and constant diligence and attention.
<u>attentiveness</u>	The action of paying close attention to something. Half the children who ate the cereal showed no improvement in <b>attentiveness</b> .
carefulness	The trait of being cautious; being attentive to possible danger. I admired the <b>carefulness</b> of his work.
	The trait of being painstaking and careful. His <b>conscientiousness</b> is second to none and he regularly makes follow up calls to ensure everything is going well.
earnestness	An earnest and sincere feeling. The deadly <b>earnestness</b> of the conversation.
heedfulness	The trait of staying aware of (paying close attention to) your responsibilities.
industriousness	Persevering determination to perform a task.
industry	Economic activity concerned with the processing of raw materials and manufacture of goods in factories. American <b>industry</b> is making increased use of computers to control production.
intentness	The quality of being intent and concentrated. The <b>intentness</b> of his gaze.
meticulousness	Strict attention to minute details.
punctiliousness	Strict attention to minute details.
rigorousness	Something hard to endure.
rigour	Something hard to endure. The <b>rigour</b> s of a harsh winter.
sedulousness	The quality of being constantly diligent and attentive.
studiousness	Diligent study.
thoroughness	Great care and attention to detail. <i>His scholarship was marked by</i> <b>thoroughness</b> and accuracy.






#### Usage Examples of "Diligence" as a noun

# Associations of "Diligence" (30 Words)

assiduity	Constant attentions to someone. The <b>assiduity</b> with which he could wear down his opponents.
<u>assiduous</u>	Showing great care and perseverance. She was <b>assiduous</b> in pointing out every feature.
changeless	Remaining the same. <i>Changeless</i> truths.
conscientious	Guided by or in accordance with conscience or sense of right and wrong. A <b>conscientious</b> man he took his duties very seriously.
constant	A quantity or parameter that does not change its value whatever the value of the variables, under a given set of conditions. <i>Constant</i> as the northern star.
constantly	Continuously over a period of time; always. <i>Constantly</i> kind and gracious.
<u>continually</u>	Seemingly without interruption. This information is <b>continually</b> updated.
diligent	Having or showing care and conscientiousness in one's work or duties. A <b>diligent</b> or patient worker.
eager	A high wave (often dangerous) caused by tidal flow (as by colliding tidal currents or in a narrow estuary. <i>Eager</i> for success.
<u>enterprising</u>	Marked by imagination, initiative, and readiness to undertake new projects. <i>An enterprising</i> foreign policy.
equable	Not easily irritated. <i>He could look sterner than his <b>equable</b> temperament would suggest.</i>
hardworking	Characterized by hard work and perseverance.
indefatigable	Showing sustained enthusiastic action with unflagging vitality. An <b>indefatigable</b> defender of human rights.
<u>industrious</u>	Working hard to promote an enterprise. An <b>industrious</b> people striving to make their country prosperous.
	(of an amount or supply of something) unable to be used up because existing in abundance. <i>An <b>inexhaustible</b> supply of coal.</i>
invariable	(of a noun in an inflected language) having the same form in both the singular and the plural, as does relais in French. <i>His routine was <b>invariable</b></i> .



<u>meticulous</u>	Marked by precise accordance with details. <i>The designs are hand glazed with <b>meticulous</b> care.</i>
<u>painstaking</u>	Done with or employing great care and thoroughness. <i>Painstaking</i> attention to detail.
plodding	Slow-moving and unexciting. <b>Plodding</b> methodical Ralph Bellamy.
scrupulous	(of a person or process) careful, thorough, and extremely attentive to details. <i>Scrupulous</i> attention to details.
sedulous	(of a person or action) showing dedication and diligence. <b>Sedulous</b> pursuit of legal and moral principles.
steadily	In a controlled or unwavering manner. <i>He could still walk <b>steadily</b>.</i>
<u>steady</u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>Sales remain steady</i> .
striving	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
<u>studious</u>	Spending a lot of time studying or reading. <i>He made a <b>studious</b> inspection of the buffet.</i>
<u>tireless</u>	Having or showing great effort or energy. A <b>tireless</b> campaigner.
<u>unchanging</u>	Showing little if any change. The party stood for <b>unchanging</b> principles.
unflagging	Showing sustained enthusiastic action with unflagging vitality. <i>His apparently <b>unflagging</b> enthusiasm impressed her.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <b>Unwavering</b> loyalty.
working	Engaged in manual labour. His <b>working</b> title for the book was Why People Are Poor.
